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NAVIGATION OF THE TRINITY RIVER SAID TO BE ON THE WAY

More than 40 years ago builders of Dallas opened their purses and supplied the funds for the canalizing of the Trinity river from Galveston bay to the North Texas metropolis. They cleared the river of its silt and its rotting accumulation of driftwood of bygone years. They bought a boat, the steamer Harvey, and when flood springtime came the steamer Harvey made the trip from Galveston to the Dallas docks. Then the project blew up. Its financial agents died or tightened their purse strings or lost their possessions. Now Col. Amon G. Carter and the citizens of Fort Worth are determined that the Trinity shall be made navigable and that freighters and passenger boats some day shall touch at the Fort Worth docks.

A Washington dispatch of Dec. 7 is very interesting to the backers of the project and to the enthusiasts who insist that all Texas rivers should be made navigable. Read it: "Secretary George W. Dern today allotted \$93,000 for a survey of the Trinity river from Galveston bay to Fort Worth. Government engineers okeed the project." Fifty years ago the Trinity was navigable from Galveston bay to all interior points along the river for a distance of 300 miles. Then the railroads were built and the barges and their captains and crews went out of business. It is true that the workers lives forever and the dreamer dies in a day? Secretary Dern has a splendid alibi. He acted on the recommendation of the board of engineers for rivers and harbors. This the board recommendation: "Preliminary investigation shows that the survey was warranted in the interest of commerce and navigation." Let it go at that.

ANOTHER BLAST FROM THE ECONOMY LEAGUE

There is a National Economy league with headquarters in New York. Its officers made public a petition addressed to the President and congress. Their bulletin urged "a true balancing of the budget at the earliest practical date." It declared the cost of the administration's program "is becoming so vast that unless the expenditures check the national credit will be endangered." Then it crossed its wires by this declaration: "In making expenditures for relief the federal government must do its part in such circumstances. At the same time the marked tendency of states and local communities to lie down on the national government must be firmly resisted."

National Administrator Harry L. Hopkins cracked down on Texas. He wired the governor of Texas that Texans must come across with relief bond coin after a certain date—meaning before the coming of Jan. 1. Administrator Hopkins has been making advance payments to the Texas relief set-up. Now he asks to see the color of the Texas coin. Well, "business is business." This isn't all—business will continue to be business in the years to come. This is a paragraph from Hopkins to the Texas governor: "It should be clearly understood, however, that we will thereafter (Dec. 21) insist upon full compliance with the definite commitment of the state of Texas to provide state funds on a matching basis for relief purposes and we will grant no further funds until this commitment is complied with."

It may have been a bark but it certainly had a biting effect. It is up to the governor and the lawmakers as well as the citizens of Texas.

If a city wants anything, the one way to get it is to get out and hustle for it.

PWA Is Used For Reduction of Utility Rates

 FORT WORTH, Tex.—City authorities here are finding a valuable "silent partner" in the PWA in their duel with public service companies for rate reductions.

The fight, an increasing one which has gone on for years, has suddenly developed into apparent advantage for the city council, which is using the PWA as something of a Damoclean sword over the service companies.

An example of how the council gained its end was revealed in negotiations with the Texas Electric Company. The council wanted reduced commercial electrical rates. It demanded the Texas Electric Company reduce its rates.

Unless its demands were met, the council said in an ultimatum, the city would apply to the Public Works Administration for funds with which to erect a municipal plant.

For several weeks the dueling went on, with the council evidently holding the proverbial "screw" and applying them effectively. Whatever the method, the outcome was a reduction of the commercial electric rate for this city.

The domestic rate already is very reasonable, it was pointed out compared with other cities who have privately owned electric systems.

With that tucked under its belt, the council now has put up its fists at the North Texas Traction company in an effort to force down trolley and bus prices. Trolley fares now are 8 cents and bus fares 10 cents.

The council has instructed City Manager George D. Fairtrace to investigate the cost of a municipal bus system.

At the same time, Fairtrace and other city officials were instructed to confer with A. F. Townsend, receiver for the North Texas Traction company, on reduction of street car and bus fares to a level with those in Dallas where the fare is 7 cents.

Outcome of this duel apparently is several weeks in the future, since it will take sometime to obtain estimates of how much it will cost to institute a municipally owned bus system.

Since this is the first time that service businesses and amusements are included in a census, it will be possible to ascertain where the consumer's dollar is spent, in what kinds of stores, for what kinds of merchandise, and how much of it is spent for services and amusement. After all, the consumer is the foundation stone of our entire business structure, according to Director Austin. All planning must therefore be based on that foundation, concerning which accurate knowledge is essential.

The complete employment data will show relative employment opportunities in the different distributing, service and amusement businesses which absorb about one-fifth of all persons gainfully employed in this country. The seasonal fluctuations in employment
