### WHAT HAPPENED 'THE MORNING AFTER'

President Roosevelt's personal message appears to have solidified the ranks of the democratic members of house buand senate. It was not a surprise message. It was a message straight from the shoulder in the simple language of the people. It was a recital of public recovery program boworks in the eseven months of a dead year. His second message, known as his budget message, contained his recommendations, speaking of appropriations and needed additional legislation to carry on until 1934 and to pave the way for balancing the budget in 1936. As for the budget message, it called for \$10,000,000,000 annual appropriation to carry on all the recovery programs in order to bring about the restoration of all industry, including agricultue and to pave the way fo the construction of a solid basis for all activities in coming years. New York financiers, including the heads of all the federal reserve banks, predicted that the money would be forthcoming and the plans of the administration would not be disturbed.

On the market page of The Austin American "the morning after" quotations were interesting. Read the headlines: "Cotton Goes Up in Spite of Sales-Market Colses With Rise of 14 to 23 Points;" "Wall Street Comes Back After Surprise at Budget;" "Budget Message Sends Grains = Up;" "No Additional Tax Point Stimulates Market."

It would be well for the reader to watch the tickings of the ticker in this daily. Congress is grinding. All the democrats predict that the session will end in May. All he recovery program will continue to function. All the relief program will function until early summer time. All employment programs will be carried on according to regular plan. Woodrow Wilson had a program which he classified as "watchful waiting." Thinking men will place in their scrapbooks the annual personal message of the President as well as his budget message. These documents are valuable for reference purposes. Americans who are not thinking men would do well to practice thinking after reading, watch the daily proceedings of the congress and form their own conclusions as to the future of the American world as well as the nations of the earth and their peoples.

As for Americans, there is only one slogan: CARRY ON. Indeed, this has ben the real slogan for more than years since the birth of the American republic and the first ringing out of the glad music of Old Liberty Bell.

## PLACE THIS EXCERPT IN THE SCRAPBOOK

"I continue in my conviction that industrial progress and prosperity can only be attained by bringing purchassing power of that portion of our population which in one form or another is dependent upon agriculture up to a level which will restore a proper balance to every section of the country and every form of work." President Roosevelt said it, addressing the American congress. Here's hoping for a short session of that congress; thorough cooperation on the part of all friendly criticisms at all times and wise and intelligent legislation so necessary at this time to aid in a slow but sure recovery, of all American industries and the giving of employment to all classes and conditions who are able and willing to work.

Congress should be careful to avoid any suspicion that any particular section of the country is trying to get an advantage over another. Of course, they would not try to do anything like that, but it is just as well to refresh their memories that they are working for a common end-the interest of the country as a whole and the prosperity of its people.
