## Lighted Field Will Greet Opening Softball League Monday Eve

## Young Democratic Club Will Be Organized Monday Evening

### SIX CLUB LEAGUE ORGANIZED HERE

#### GENERAL MOTORS BLAST LID OF NOCTURNAL PLAY WITH LUMBERMEN MON.

Dimmitt and Castro county will have an innovation in summer sports beginning Monday evening when the opening clash of the City Softball League will be played under the glare of arc lights on the new municipal field just east of the Court House. The General Motors club piloted by Pat Dean will open the nocturnal play against the Lumbermen managed by Ozro Stephens shortly after 8:30 o'clock Monday evening, or at the conclusion of the organization meeting of the Young Democratic Club which will be held the same evening beginning at 7:30 p. m.

Interest is growing by leaps and bounds throughout the community and it is even possible that other communities of the county such as Nazareth, Hart and others will organize softball clubs to participate against the six Dimmitt teams.

Nearly one hundred players have signified their intention to enter the play this summer and with the installation of lights at the local field even a greater number is anticipated by the officials of the league, according to Sandy Youts, secretary-treasurer.

Final plans have been worked out and the schedule for the first half of the league play approved. Managers have selected their teams and everything is in readiness for the completion of the lighting system which likely will be finished by the end of the week. Games will be played four evenings each week on Monday's, Tuesday's, Thursday's and Friday's.

Following the opening game on Monday, Tuesday's conflict will witness the entry of the Castro County News managed by Sam Braswell, Jr., attempting to subdue the spark of youth of the High School team. Thursday evening's battle will see the debut of Frank Cunyus' Druggists against Harold Gladman's Bakers. These games will begin at 8:30 p. m. at the municipal softball grounds directly east of the courthouse.

### Walton Reports Fine Lamb Crop

Colin Walton who has won grand championship in his fat lambs the last two years at Fort Worth reports 95 living lambs from 60 ewes dropped during April. This is the same bunch of ewes from which the grand champion lambs were produced last October, thus these ewes have produced an average of better than 2 1-2 lambs per head in seven months time. This spring's lambs will be fattened out for sale in November and the ewes will be fattened out and sold at the same time.

### 95 PER CENT VOTE FOR PLAN

#### CASTRO COUNTY GROWERS RETURN LANDSLIDE MAJORITY FOR PROGRAM.

Casting a heavy vote Castro County wheat growers almost unanimously expressed their desire for the continuation of the Wheat Program last Saturday. Final canvass by the Castro County Allotment Committee of the votes disclosed the fact that 417 contract signers favored the retention of the program while 15 opposed. Of the non-signers 101 voted for the referendum while 19 opposed the program. Thus 96.5 per cent of the contract signers favored the proposal while 94 percent of the non-signers voted to retain the program.

The county agent's office is gratified with the response of the Castro county wheat producers for their splendid turn-out to the polls for Saturday's referendum election, indicating again the interest being taken by the farmers in the welfare of their own programs.

Signing of the final papers for the 1935 Corn-Hog Reduction contracts is being completed this week and contracts will go forward to Washington by the end of the week. 223 applications have been approved for applicants who had contracts last year, and 24 applications for new contracts have been made, and these will be completed and approved within a few weeks.

### 1935 Wheat Forms Being Completed

Forms for compliance on 1935 wheat crop are being completed at this time, and are being signed up as rapidly as the producers come in to the County Agent's office. It is expected that these forms will be completed within thirty days and payment on the last of the 1934 crop and first 1935 will be made late in the summer or early in the fall.

### COTTON CHECKS RECEIVED HERE

#### 1935 COTTON ACREAGE REDUCTION CONTRACTS BEING SIGNED THIS WEEK.

New 1935 cotton acreage reduction contracts, also Bankhead applications are being signed up in the county agent's office this week. June 10th has been set as the final date for accepting applications for certificates under the Bankhead Act and every producer must submit an application who expects to plant cotton this year and receive tax free certificates. Growers are urged to submit their application at the earliest possible date in order that there may be no unnecessary delay in getting them approved by the State Board.

77 cotton reduction checks covering the first 1935 rental payment on old contracts were received this week. Balance of the checks have been delayed in most cases by change in the legal status of the farm but are expected in the near future.

### BURKETT TEMPORARY DIRECTOR

#### ORGANIZATION OF CLUB WILL BE HELD IN COURT ROOM AT 7:30 O'CLOCK

A delegation of interested Dimmitt and Castro county citizens, headed by Judge Percy Estes and supplemented by Messrs. Swain Burkett, Sam Braswell, Jr., Chas. McLean, Sandy Youts and Greer Estes, attended the organization meeting of the Young Democratic Club of Deaf Smith county at Hereford Tuesday night. The session before whom appeared O. C. (Red) Christie, state secretary, and the chairman of the Amarillo Young Democratic Club, proved interesting and imbued the local delegation with the desire to formulate a unit of the state and national organization within Castro County, the first meeting scheduled to be held in the court room of the court house here Monday evening at 7:30 o'clock.

According to the Secretary the organization is for the primary purpose of creating interest and broadening the viewpoint of understanding of state and federal governmental proceedings for the young men and women who have become of voting age since the World War. However, it was pointed out that there was no age limit to the membership and the entire citizenship of the county is invited and encouraged to become affiliated with the local club. It is not wholly a political unit to dictate the voting policies of the individual members, and according to the state speaker, no electioneering for the party candidates will be tolerated other than a united vote for the chosen party nominee. Major constitutional and governmental issues will be discussed in local meetings with literature both pro and con being supplied by the state central office, thus lending a personal knowledge of the activities of our state and national law making bodies.

Following the Hereford meeting the local delegation met with Mr. Christie and worked out preliminary plans for a local county club. Swain Burkett, local attorney, was chosen as the temporary director of organization in Castro County. Membership cards and other literature were secured and affiliation made with the State organization.

Mr. Burkett has appointed committees to conduct membership drives throughout the county and in the Monday organization meeting election will be held for the following local officers: President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Sergeant-at-arms, Parliamentarian, Executive committee (one from each commissioner's precinct), and county chairman.

The membership fee which includes local, state and national dues for one year will be 50-cents. Director Burkett especially is desirous of delegations from Nazareth, Hart, Sunnyside, Cleo, Flagg and all other communities of the county to be represented at the organization meeting, as this is purely a county-wide club.

The state convention of the Young Democratic Clubs of Texas will be held in Amarillo Friday and Saturday, June 7 and 8. Those promising to attend the convention include James and Elliott Roosevelt, sons of the President; Governor Allred, Attorney General Wm. McGraw, Secretary of State Gerald Mann, and the organization's president, John L. McCarty of Dalhart.

ADVISING CASTRO COUNTY GRADUATES

With schools closing in Castro County the graduates are the recipients of much free advice. Not to be snowed under, they are bold enough to tell the present world what they think about it. The battle, as usual, is a drawn one.

The Castro County News does not wish to tell the scholars of Dimmitt and Castro County what they must do with their lives. We ask them, however, to appreciate the fact that they have just begun to learn about the world and the things that are in it. The fight for intelligence is only beginning.

Book sense is easily acquired by those who, as the school children say, put out. It is the reward of study and attention. Harder than the acquisition of intelligence however, is the wisdom and self control that come with experience. The graduates will find this to be true, although they will not believe it now.

Youth undertakes many things that older people tolerantly permit. Fired with enthusiasm, and a purity of purpose, the young wish to go forward, to improve rapidly, and say so. They attack frontally, where wisdom, as it is understood by their elders, advises a flank attack, which is slower but more apt to be successful.

We want all those who leave the schools of Castro County this year to understand that they have the best wishes of all the older people. Your elders will watch with interest your renewal of a fight that they abandoned after some desultory skirmishing years ago. They will not envy your success. Rather they will acclaim it, and join you in hailing the new day that you cherish and they desire.

DIMMITT'S BEST CHANCE

If any citizen of Dimmitt would travel widely throughout the United States there would be discovered many places where people live and do their best to get along. In fact, the revelation of the similarity of towns and cities would be surprising.

One would discover, for example, towns and cities that have Dimmitt surpassed in any respect that the proud dweller in our midst might wish to brag upon. There are cities with industries so far ahead of our own that to dream of equality were a foolish mockery; there are cities so much larger than Dimmitt that to imagine equality in size were but an insane delusion; there are cities so far ahead of us in what so many call the conveniences and luxuries of life that nothing but an idle mind would attempt comparison.

The statements made in the above paragraph being true along any line that might be taken up, why is it that so many of our people imagine that by "boosting," which is sometimes nothing but "blowing" they can fool the world while they blind themselves? There is, to our mind, nothing so foolish as a small town or city trying to create a "big" impression, trying to leave visitors and non-visitors under the misleading opinion that the sun rises and sets exclusively in Dimmitt.

The Castro County News would not be misjudged. No one will accuse it of laggardly supporting the various efforts that have been made towards the improvement of Dimmitt. At the same time, common sense and truth require that we recognize, in our undertakings the relative position occupied by Dimmitt and that we bend our efforts towards ends that will promote the good of the people of this community.

Getting down to bed-rock, at bottom, there are in every town and city families and individuals trying to be honest, clean and intelligent, who seek only a fair return from life for the labor that they furnish, and, at the same time, ask only an opportunity for proper self-development for themselves and children. In this great field, which is the end of life itself, Dimmitt stands on an equality with London, New York, or any other settlement on the face of the globe. In this arena of activity we can compete, not only upon equality, but very often, on account of the absence of adverse conditions, under more favorable circumstances, than many larger cities.

Inasmuch as Presidents Harding, Coolidge, Hoover and Roosevelt have vetoed bonus bills, one must come to the conclusion that there is something wrong with the presidents or the bonus legislation.

The Castro County News is not perfect and circulates, so far as we are aware, among people who likewise make mistakes.

Sunday School by HENRY-LESSON RADCLIFFE

OUR DAY OF WORSHIP

4:20-24; Col. 3:15-17.)

International Sunday School Lesson for June 2, 1935.

Golden Text: "God is a spirit: And they that worship him must worship in spirit and truth."—John 4:24.

(Lesson Text: Psalm 100; John

The act of creation in Genesis tells how God created the earth, the heaven and man in six days and "on the seventh day God ended his work . . . and rested . . . God blessed the seventh day and sanctified it." Thus from earliest times we find a day given—apart from rest, contemplative worship and thankfulness.

The number "seven" is unusual

in the Hebrew calendar, as pointed out by G. D. Boardman: "Seven was to be the aggregate number of the Holy Convocations of the Hebrew year (Lev. 23) the seventh day was to be the Sabbath-day; the seventh week after Passover the Sabbath-week; the seventh month the Sabbath-month; the seventh year the Sabbath-year; the seven times seventh year the great Sabbath-year of the Sabbath-years; namely, the year of Jubilee; seven weeks were appointed as the interval between Pentecost and Passover; seven days as the length of the feasts of the Passover and Tabernacles and the candlestick was to be seven branched; seven days were appointed for ceremonial lustration, and for the interval between birth and circumcision; seven was the number in compacts, in treaties of peace, in marriage settlements; seven is solemnly emblazoned in the Hebrew term for oath, the term signifying 'to swear' literally meaning 'to do seven times.'"

The Fourth Commandment is the longest of the Ten and the only one which begins with, "remember." There are three parts. First a command to work, "six days shalt thou labor and do all thy work." Laziness is prohibited and the man who lives a useless life violates this commandment. Second, we are told to rest. "Our Sabbath is not meant to be a day of mere inactivity, of indolence," says Cleland B. McAfee. "It is a day of rest from the employments and recreations that occupy our strength and time on other days; it is the divinely appointed break in the grind of life. The Sabbath is meant to change our routine, to break into it and give us a new angle of vision upon our lives. We do not get it by doing nothing. We get it by resting, by bringing other lines of activity into play."

Third, we should worship. "It is a Sabbath unto the Lord your God," says Cleland B. McAfee. "It is a day intended to serve our spiritual lives, not our physical lives principally or only. The great appeal of the day is not to our brute side. It is to that side whereon we are allied to God. The man who leaves God out and does not make it a holy day has not observed God's Sabbath, whatever he has done or left undone. Six days of the cry of the world in our ears! One day of the cry of heaven and the eternal life! And yet how strangely it is used!"

"Worship is that attitude of the life which takes the low place of absolute reverence in the presence of that which is higher," says G. Campbell Morgan. "On the part of man, it is the recognition of divine sufficiency, the recognition of his absolute dependence upon the divine sufficiency, the confession that all he needs in his own life he finds in the life of God. The attitude of worship is the attitude of a subject bent before the king of a child yielding all its love to its father, of the sheep that follows the leading of the shepherd, and is content in all the pasturage which He appoints."

"We are not poorer, but richer, because we have, through many ages, rested from our labors one day in seven," says Lord Macaulay. "That day is not lost. While industry is suspended, while the plow lies in the furrow, while the Exchange is silent, while no smoke ascends from the factory, a process is going on quite as important to the wealth of nations as any process which is performed on more busy days. Man, the machine of machines, is repairing and winding up, so that he returns to his labors on the Monday with clear intellect, with livelier spirits with renewed corporeal vigor."

Samuel Johnson, according to his Biographer Boswell, wrote out this plan for the Sabbath: "Having lived not without an habitual reverence for the Sabbath, yet without that attention to its religious duties which Christianity requires; I resolve henceforth—(1) To rise early, and in order to do that, to go to sleep early on Saturday. (2) To examine the tenor of my life, and particularly the last week; and to mark my advances in religion, or recessions from it. (3) To read the Scriptures methodically with such helps as are at hand. (4) To go to Church twice. (5) To read books of divinity, either speculative or practical. (6) To instruct my family. (7) To wear off by meditation any worldly soil contracted in the week."

President Roosevelt pushes extension of the NRA.

H. J. R. No. 48 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Section 1, of Article XVII, of the Constitution of Texas, providing that Constitutional Amendments may be submitted by the Legislature at Special Sessions under certain conditions; providing for an election for the proclamation and the publication thereof; describing the form of ballot, and making an appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 1, of Article XVII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 1. How the Constitution is to be Amended. The Legislature, at any biennial session, by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be entered by yea and nays on the Journals, may propose Amendments to the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed Amendments shall be duly published once a week for four (4) weeks, commencing at least three (3) months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election, to open a poll, for and make returns to the Secretary of State of the number of legal votes cast at said election for and against said Amendments; and if more than one be proposed, then the number of votes cast for and against each of them; and if it shall appear from said return, that a majority of the votes cast, have been cast in favor of any Amendment, the said Amendment so receiving a majority of the votes cast, shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof; provided however, that in cases of extraordinary emergency affecting the State as a whole, Amendments to the Constitution may be proposed in the manner hereinabove set out upon the submission of the proposed Amendment by the Governor at any Special Session."

Section 2. The foregoing Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State who are qualified to vote on proposed Constitutional Amendments at an election to be held on the 24th day of August A. And those against the Amendment shall have printed the words: "AGAINST the Amendment to Section 1, Article XVII, of the Constitution of Texas, providing that Amendments to the Constitution may be proposed at Special Sessions of the Legislature under certain conditions." Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which does not indicate his desire regarding the above proposed Amendment.

Section 3. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and to have the above proposed Amendment published in the manner and for the time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or as much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to pay for the expenses of said publication and election. The above is a true and correct copy.

H. J. R. No. 46 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto, between Sections 11 and 12 a new Section to be known as Section 11A, to read as follows: "Section 11A. The Courts of the State of Texas having original jurisdiction of criminal actions shall have the power, after conviction, to suspend the imposition or execution of sentence and to place the defendant upon probation and to reimpose such sentence, under such conditions as the Legislature may prescribe."

Section 2. Such proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas, on the fourth Saturday in August, 1935, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment, shall write, or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution authorizing the Courts to place defendants on probation,"

and those voters opposed to said proposed Amendment shall write, or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution authorizing the courts to place defendants on probation."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for such election, and shall have the same published and such election held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing to amend Sections 3 and 5 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to permit the furnishing of State official text books free to every child of scholastic age, attending any school within the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that hereafter it shall read as follows:

"Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and poll tax of One (\$1.00) Dollar on every inhabitant of the State, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed Thirty-five Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.) Dollars valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of the State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside, under such regulations and in such manner as may be provided by law, a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children within the scholastic age attending any school in this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient the deficit may be met by appropriation from the General Funds of the State and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by General Laws; and all such school districts may embrace parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and for the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided that a majority of the qualified property taxing voters of the district voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year One (\$1.00) Dollar on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts, nor to independent or common school districts created by General or Special Law."

Section 2. That Section 5, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so that hereafter it shall read as follows: "Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands heretofore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and levied shall be the available school fund, to which the Legislature may add, not exceeding one per cent annually, of the total value of the permanent school fund, such value to be ascertained by the Board of Education until otherwise provided by law, and the available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school, provided that the State Board of Education may furnish State Adopted text books free to every child of scholastic age attending any school within the State; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties as may be provided by law and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments at the election to be

held on the fourth Saturday in August, 1935, at which election there shall be printed on each ballot the following:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PERMITTING THE FURNISHING OF FREE TEXT BOOKS TO EVERY CHILD OF SCHOLASTIC AGE ATTENDING ANY SCHOOL WITHIN THIS STATE."

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PERMITTING THE FURNISHING OF FREE TEXT BOOKS TO EVERY CHILD OF SCHOLASTIC AGE ATTENDING ANY SCHOOL WITHIN THIS STATE," and every voter shall mark out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against, or the word "FOR" or the word "AGAINST", at the beginning of such clause, so as to indicate his vote for or against each of said proposed amendments.

Section 4. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State, and said election shall be held under the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 5. The sum of Ten Thousand and (\$10,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as shall be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay the expenses of the publications and elections provided for in this Resolution.

"Against the Amendment giving the Legislature the power to provide a System of Old-Age Assistance not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per person per month and to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for old-age assistance."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same printed as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand and Dollars (\$5000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas, Article 16 be amended by adding thereto another section to be known as "Section 61," which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 61. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."

Section 2. The Legislature of the State of Texas is hereby directed, at the first Regular or Special Session after the adoption of this Resolution, to enact such legislation as will be necessary to adequately compensate, on a salary basis, the officers herein referred to in all counties having a population of 20,000 or more according to the then last preceding Federal Census.

The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at a special election to be held on the 24th day of August, 1935, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment, shall write, or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas repealing State-wide prohibition, prohibiting the open saloon and providing for local option."

And those voters opposed to said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Section 5. The sum of Eight thousand (\$8,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State, qualified to vote on the Constitutional Amendments, at an election to be held throughout the State on the 4th Saturday of August, A. D. 1935, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words:

"For the Amendment of Article 1, Section 15, of the State Constitution by adding to said Section a provision to the effect that the Legislature may provide for the temporary commitment of mentally ill persons not charged with a criminal offense by the County Court without the necessity of a jury trial."

"Against the Amendment of Article 1, Section 15, of the Constitution by adding to said Section a provision to the effect that the Legislature may provide for the temporary commitment of mentally ill persons not charged with a criminal offense by the County Court without the necessity of a jury trial."

Each voter shall scratch out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting for or against the proposed Amendment.

Section 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.

RURAL ELECTRIFICATION

From The Castro County News Washington Bureau

Time and again we have said in this column that we do not know whether the present farm program is the best thing for agriculture, or not, but we do not hesitate in advising all farmers to hold on to what they have until something better comes along.

Attacks upon the processing taxes will continue. They seem to be reasonably safe just now but you never can tell when the fight will start over. If you are not in favor of the present set-up, or if you want certain changes made, it is a good idea to let your Congressman know what you want and what you think.

The writer has been writing articles about the necessity for farm relief for many years. He has witnessed and undoubtedly decline of farm living standards for some years and has heard politicians from all parties, including those in between, tell about what the world owes the farmer. It is high time that this talk produces results. If the AAA has done well, stand up and shout your head off for it; if it has failed you, be equally as vociferous in telling about it and demanding some relief.

The drought seems to have been lifted, anyway from most of the counties of the United States, because the last report of the Department of Agriculture listed only 131 "drought counties" among the more than 3,000 in this country.

The recognized drought areas in the nation, pending a new report due June 30th, includes 60 counties in Western Texas, 10 in Eastern New Mexico, 7 in Western Oklahoma, 36 in Western Kansas, 14 in Eastern Colorado, and 4 in South Central Nebraska.

Certainly the sufferers in the drought area of last year and those still in that classification have the sympathy of every intelligent citizen. Efforts on the part of officials to ameliorate conditions have the approval of almost everyone, and the hope is that the near future will bring about a situation that will be better for all farmers.

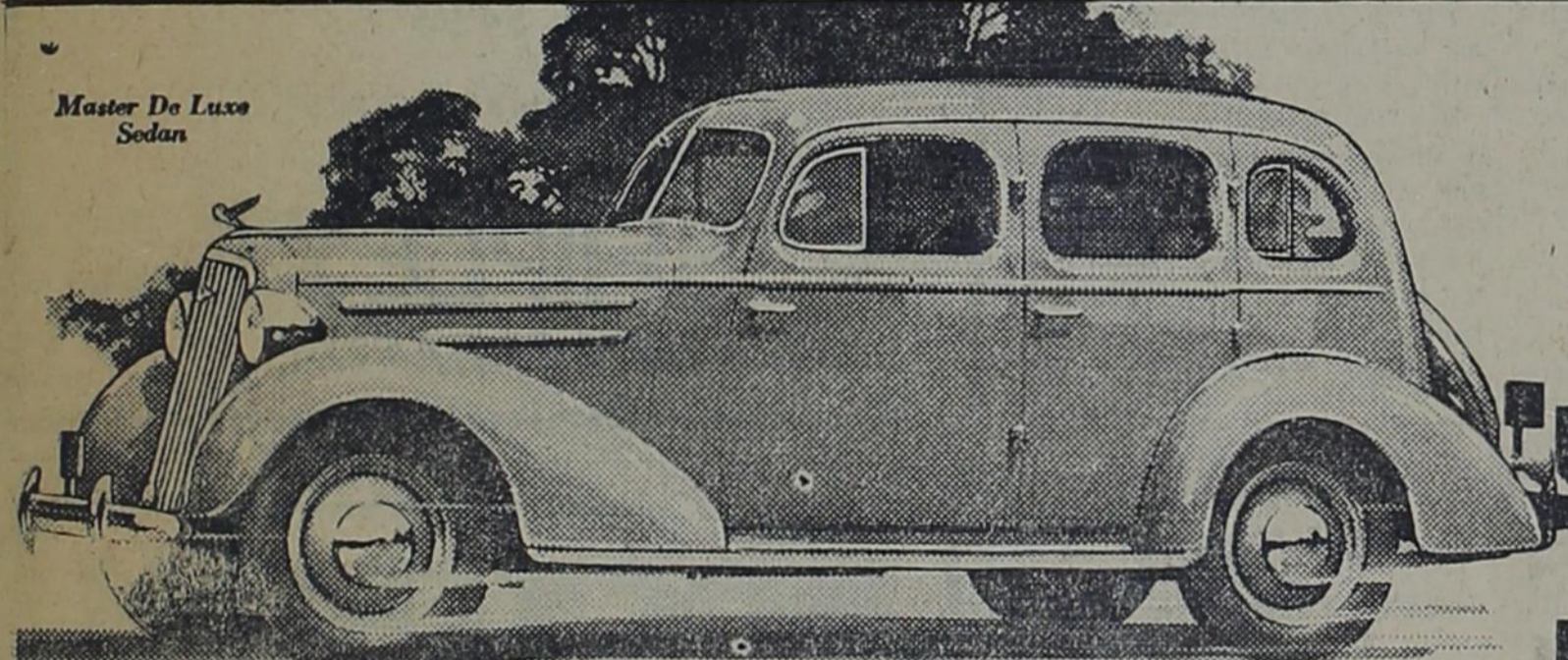

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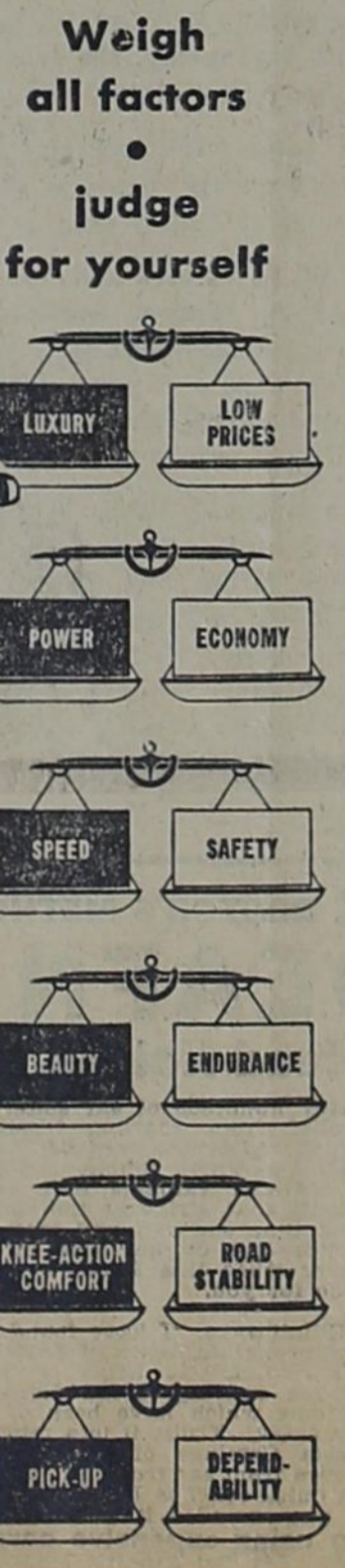
