



EMERGENCY CROP LOANS TO FARMERS

Farmers are interested in regulations for making emergency crop loans from a \$40,000,000 federal fund. Charles W. Sherrill is the manager of the southwestern setup serving the States of Texas, New Mexico and Arizona through the loan office at Dallas. A farmer may obtain such a loan if he cannot qualify fo credit elsewhere "if he has a justified need for credit and if he is cooperating with the production control program."

The maximum amount to any one farmer this year is \$250 and the minimum \$25. Interest rate will be 51/2 per cent per annum. Local emergency crop loan committee will be named within the near future. Applications for loans may be made directly to the crop loan offices. A farmer applying for \$150 or more must first make application to the production credit association serving his county. Emergency crop loans are entirely separate from and are not to be confused with production credit association loans, as the former is an emergency relief measure for this year only, to make available funds to those who cannot qualify for credit through the regular channels, Farmers who have a source of income other than farming are not eligible for emergency crop loans. A reminder that "loans are to be made only to farmers who need relief to help carry on the basic farming operations necessary in making a living."

The emergency act imposes a very severe penalty for using loans from the emergency fund for other purposes not specified in the act and its regulations. Speaking of penalties, the regulations restrict the amount that may be! loaned to the tenants of any one landlord in any one county to \$500 and also restrict the amount that may be loaned per acre depending on the kind of crop being grown. All funds will be advanced to the borrower at the time the; loan is made and not on a budget basis. A first lien may be taken on a crop growing br to be grown as security for the loan. Inded, all loans are to be secured by a first lien on all crops during the year 1934. These loans are to be secured by a first lien on lal crops during the year 1934.

These loans will mature when the crops are harvested and are available for sale.

No loan will be made to any individual "who has shown lack of good faith" in repaying food and seed loans made to him in previous years. In the case of loans to repters or share croppers the landlord will have to waive

On the other hand all tenants or croppes benefiting from any loan to a BEAU and Pablito nurried back her and also pitted her. landlord must waive their claims to the crop if the landlord is to receive a loan from the emergency fund. In each case the farmer is the applicant. If he is not eligible loans may not be made to his wife, unmarried children, members of his family or employes. All the regulations were made by S. M. Garwood, federal production credit commissioner of the farm credit administration, and have been passed on to the southwestern setup handled by Charles W. Sherrill through the crop loan office at Dallas.
