PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT NAMES A WOMAN FOR FEDERAL JUDGE

William Allan White is a distinguished Kansas editor and political prophet and a lifelong republican who cast his ballot for Hoover and Curtis. In a recent review of the first year of the Roosevelt administration he declared F. D. R. to be the cleverest as well as the wisest politician ever elected to the presidency.

Roosevelt certainly knows the game of politics. To date he has been a past grand master. Millions of women voters in former republican strongholds cast their ballot for Roosevelt and Garner. F. D. R. was elected President. He has been the skipper of the ship of state a little more than a year. He has appointed a greater number of women to public service posts than Harding and Coolidge and Hoover combined. Many fat jobs have fallen into the lap of the ladies. A number have been sent abroad as the diplomatic representatives of the republic. There is a woman in the cabinet. Indeed, they are holding down jobs in all the recovery acts setups.

Now the President has named Florence E. Allen of Cleveland, Ohio, to the federal circuit of appeals judgeship. Miss Allen, now on the Ohio supreme court, is the first woman in American history to be made a federal judge, while the circuit court of appeals is the highest court aside from the supreme court of the United States. She was the first woman to be placed on the state supreme court bench. She was the first to be elected a district court judge. She has a long and brilliant record. She was born in a Rocky Mountain state. First as a teacher she won laurels; she deserted teaching for the newspaper game; ahe deserted the newspaper game for the law. She was licensed to practice and in late years her advancement has been rapid as the most noted feminine jurist that the American world has known. Judge Allen is a lifelong democrat. She certainly ranks as one of the foremost leaders of the feminine movement in the wide, wide world. Now she has her reward.





The people of Eastland county have been good to me. They have returned me to office on eccasions, for all of which I shall ever be deeply grateful. They have reposed a confidence in me which I appreciate beyond expression and in return for it all, I have earnestly and faithfully endeavorto render the county honest and efficient service, determined not to betray the confidence and trust placed in me. Believing that my past experience and my knowledge of this county's needs during these perilous times well qualify me to efficienly discharge the duties of county judge and because of my desire to render the county a real service and the further fact that many of our outstanding and subtantial citizens have solicited me. am announcing for re-election.

Believing our citizens should know what their public officials have done, I shall briefly mention a few things which, I feel, they are eply interested in and in which have had a small part.

Two years ago, together with other West Texas county judges. worked faithfully to secure the passage of the law which sets aside ne cent per gallon of the gasoline tax to be applied on the payment of our county road bonds, the proceeds of which went to the buildng of designated state highways, the result being that the state is paying all the interest on said onds and 30 per cent of the principal, the one cent per gallon being insufficient to pay more than above amount, however, we are now working to the end that the state assume the entire amount and it is confidently hoped that this will be accomplished within the next year or two. The state has not assumed payment of any of the county's bonds, but merely agrees to participate for a period of two years, one and one-half of which have expired, in those bonds the proceeds of which went into construction of "designated" state highways. An agreement has been reached by the state and county that of our outstanding bonds, \$2,000,000 were used in onstructing state highways and the state agrees to participate in the payment of this amount as far as the gasoline tax will permit. The state's assumption of the above amount will mean the lifting of a terrible burden from our taxpayers and, if elected, I pledge my

entinued efforts along this line. With other members of the comsioners' court, I have worked faithfully in an attempt to fairly and impartially equalize values for taxable purposes. Many corrections and adjustments have been made with the taxpayer when it appeared the circumstances justified same. This, also, shall continue to be my policy, if elected.

Since becoming county judge, due to reduction in values and tax rate, taxes have been reduced between 40 and 50 per cent. This can be verified by comparing tax receipts. Although the times have







George Bernard Shaw, speaking of success, said in part: "My life belongs to the whole community in which I live, and it is my duty, as well as a privilege and pleasure to do for it whatever I can. I want to be thoroughly used up when I pass on, for the harder I work, the more I live. I rejoice in life for its own sake. Life is no 'brief torch' for me. 't is a sort of splendid torch which I hold for a mo-ment, and I want to make it burn as brightly as possible before handing it down to future genera-

RANGER IN 1924

The "big news" of 1924 in Ranger was the burning of the McCleskey Hotel with the death toll reaching four burned to death, three from Ranger and one from Fort Worth.

The fire began about 2 o'clock in the morning on July 24, 1924 and three persons were reported missing and several severely in the bodies of the missing were found the following day and

jured. The bodies of the missing were found the following day and the most seriously injured died, bringing to four the number of lives lost. The dead were S. E. Taylor, manager of the Home Laundry; M. D. McRimmon, city engineer; Billie Wallace, young grandson of Mrs. Elma Craig, and Miss Belle Bates of Fort Worth.

The financial loss in the fire included the McCleskey Hotel, \$60,000; Ranger Garage, total loss, \$10,000; Prompt Printery, total loss,
\$4,000; Popular Tailors, total loss, \$1,500; Joe's Place, total loss
\$1,500; Southland Hotel, damage \$1,000; U. S. Salvage company, total
loss, \$2,000, and Collum Bros. Tailor Shop, total loss \$1,000. The
most seriously nijured were T. C. Maxwell, Mrs. Stella Holbrook, Dallas; L. C. Hensley; Mrs. Ella Baugh, Fort Worth; Mrs. Elma Craig
and Miss Mary Craig: C. R. Lasch: F. L. Chevellier, of Fort Worth; and Miss Mary Craig; C. B. Lasch; E. L. Chevellier of Fort Worth; Mrs. Jones of Fort Worth and E. C. Robertson of Fort Worth. On January 9 the bond issue to purchase the water works system

was being urged and the following night a mass meeting was held to discuss the matter. An election was held on Feb. 5 which resulted in the bonds being approved by a vote of 452 to 278. The bonds were sold on Feb. 29 and the city took over the property on March 10 and has been operating it since that date.
On the first day of February the City-County Hospital, which had been built some time the year before, was opened after long delays. Feb. 24 John Henke was attacked by hijackers and robbed of \$100

and his car, and was beaten, bound and gagged and was later found. Feb. 25 Shannon Meroney of Ranger burned to death in a Brecken-ridge hotel fire and Feb. 27 the body of Lester Adams of Ranger was found after a week of searching near Wichita Falls.

March 2 work was begun on the country club house and about the middle of the month the town was enraged when Mrs. Allen Lee was struck by a hit-and-run driver and dragged four blocks down Main street. May 11 John Hassen was glad to be back from a trip to Syria. May 14 Karl E. Jones resigned as secretary of the Retail Merchants Association and his duties were taken over by Mrs. Alice D. True, who

had been assistant secretary. Following closely on the heels of the McCleskey Hotel fire, city put in operation a new fire truck. This was on July 30, less than a week after the fire. On August 11 three were burned to death

in a gasoline plant fire near Frankell and on Aug. 17 the Yonker home in Ranger was swept by fire. Cooking schools were popular in 1924, just as they are in 1934 and WE SERVE GOOD COFFEE mes sponsored such a school at the Gho on Hotel on Se 20, which drew big crowds and which was the forerunner of similar

events during the past 10 years.

November 2 the Hamon-Kell railway warehouse burned and Dec 23 Kathleen Speegle, an eight-year-old girl, burned to death when her clothing caught fire while she was playing at a neighbor's home.

The year 1924 could be called a year of fires and tragedy, with the heaviest death toll from fires of any year in the history of the town, and a number of people working in the adjacent oil and gas fields being victims of flames.

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




