

Sen. Bankhead of Alabama is up in the air. His amendments to the house cotton control bill are up in the air. this happened when the house rejected senate amendments and sent the measure to conference. Rep. Marvin Jons hails from the Panhandle district of Texas. He is the head of the house agriculture committee. He was named head of the house conferees "who will attempt to take out of the measure a number of senate amendments, among them one allowing a farmer to produce six bales of cotton without paying processing taxes." Rep. Bankhead is a brother of the senate Bankhead. He is said to be committed to the house bill first, last and all the time.

He predicts "extensive changes in the economic structure of most of the nation will follow continued drastic curtailment of cotton acreage." #### PUBLIC SCHOOL AID AND CHANGES THAT SHOULD BE MADE

Four years ago State Supt. Marrs in a report to the legislative committees on education showed that for the current scholastic year the apportionment would have exceeded \$20 had the distribution of per capita school funds been made "on the basis of attendance instead of the per capita system." In the 27th biennial report of the state department of education L. W. Rogers declared for "a real equalization program." His recommendation is a matter of record. Read it:

The present crisis in our educational program has served at least one wholesome purpose. It has accentuated the need for a complete revision of our obsolete and inequitable method of distributing state available school funds-a system that affords no absolute guarantee that the funds apportioned to the various counties and school units of the state will serve the purpose for which they were appropriated. It is a well known fact that under our present system of state schools support approximately 400,000 children out of a scholastic enumeration of over 1,500,000 receive none of the beneficent returns from the annual investment of about \$30,000,000 of state school funds. The weakness of the present system of distribution is the fact that it largely disregards the basic element of service. The state apportions to the local school unit \$15 (1932-1933) for each enumerated scholastic irrespective of the quality of the school service to the child-too often in the absence of any service to them. Manifestly such distribution of state school funds is unsound and inequitable.

. The state should no longer subsidize absence from school. Its resources should not be used to the extent of millions of dollars annually, to reward non-performance of duty." Chmn. 

To what depths will the oil well be drilled in the capable of drilling to depths of 15,000 depths will the oil well be drilled in the future? No one knows. What we do know is that 75 years ago this year oil was found at the depth of 60½ feet by Colonel Edwin L. Drake near Titusville, Pennsylvania, in the first well drilled for oil. Today, wells have been drilled to depths of more than two miles, or one thousand seventeen hundred times deeper than Drake drilled. Some of the deepest holes are: a well in Kettleman Hills field in California, 10,900 feet; one in Old Mexico at 10,385 feet; and, one at Cement, Oklahoma, at 10,076½ feet. However, these wells are not producers. The deepest producer at present is around 9,000 feet. In Caddo county, Oklahoma, the Binger well, at a depth of 9,982 feet, looms as the deepest producing well;
