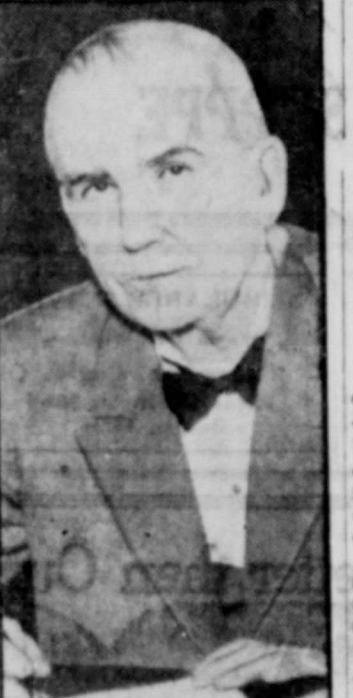

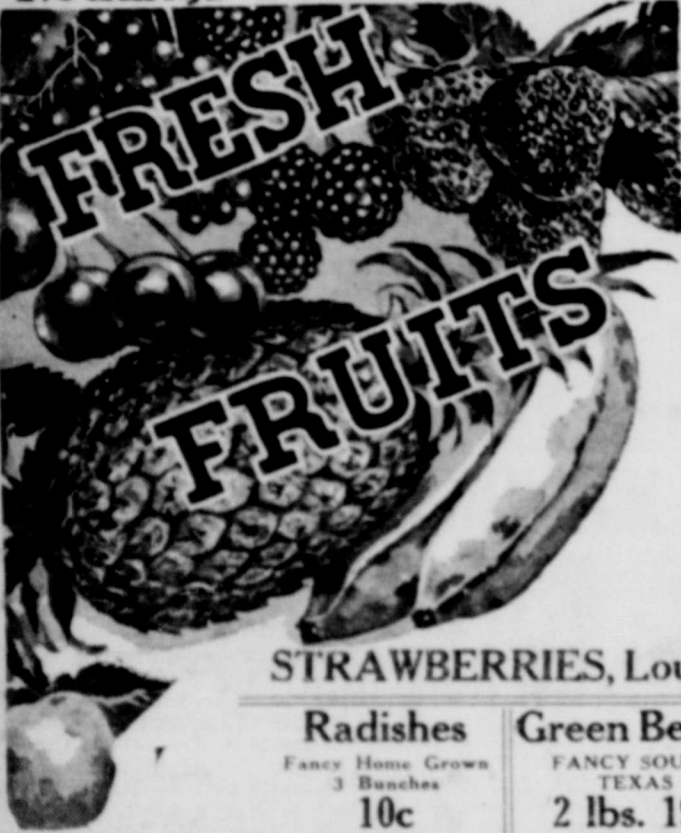

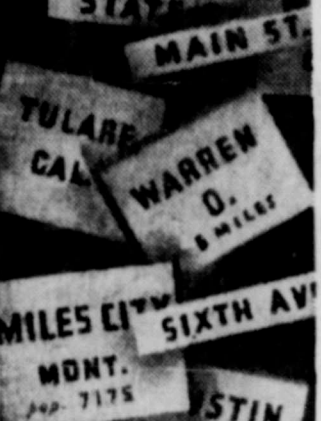

THE story of the rich young man who came to Jesus seeking the way of eternal life has made a profound impression upon human hearts through the centuries. It does not seem to have had an equal effect upon spiritual attitudes and decisions of the world.

Wealth, though it need not necessarily be a barrier between man and God, and though it may in fact be made a means of grace and blessing, still constitutes a barrier that keeps men from the Kingdom of Heaven and from appropriating the reality of eternal life.

It is as true today as it was in the days when Jesus was on earth that where man's treasure is there will his heart be also. The Kingdom of Heaven must be the first and supreme thing in a man's life if he is to be there at all, just as a modern world man cannot be a citizen of one country and at the same time give his chief allegiance to another country.

The failure to grasp this keeps men from entering the Kingdom. Just as it kept this young man who came to Jesus.

ONE should not in any way misunderstand the dramatic aspects of the narrative. This young man was not a mean or selfish person. There is no indication that he was in any sense a money grubber or that he was unduly attached to his wealth.

He had great possessions, and he no doubt had grown up in the psychology that these great possessions induced.

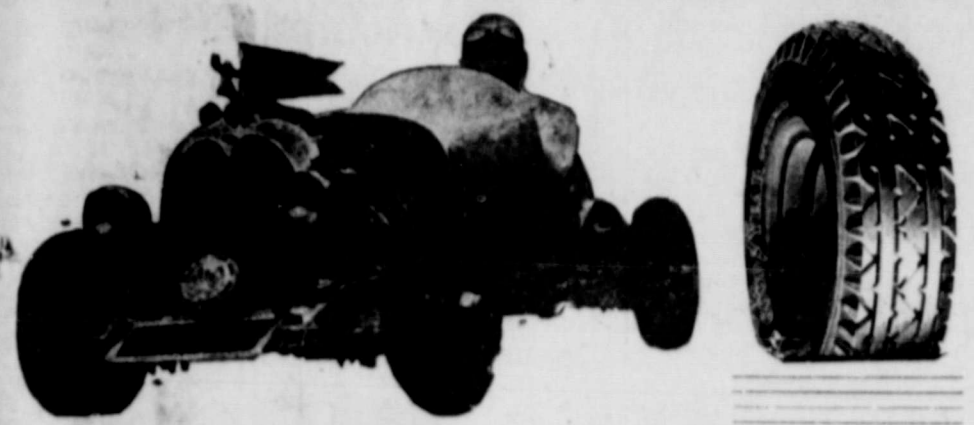

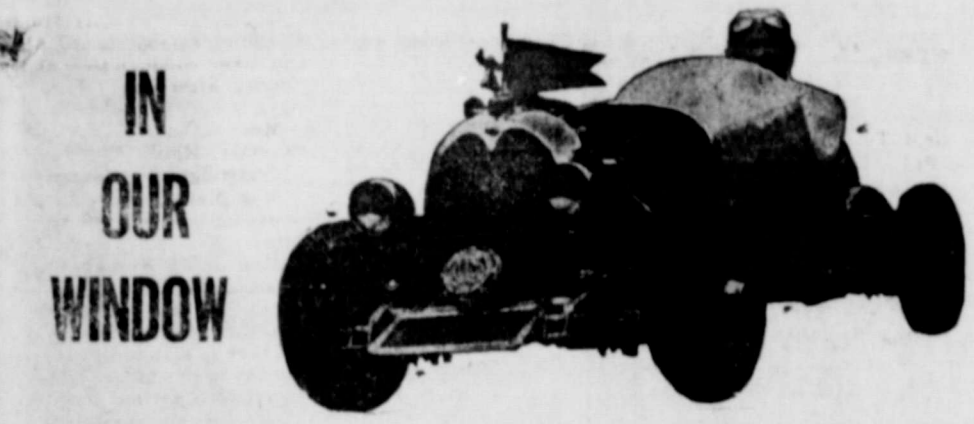

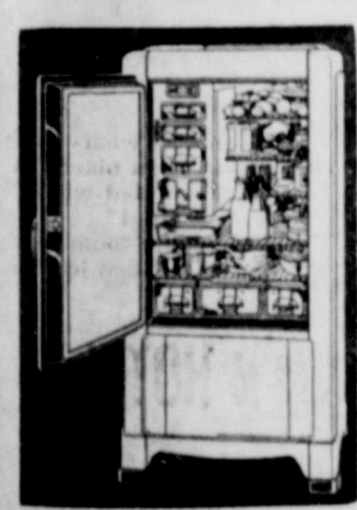

Anti-Roosevelt Move Is Predicted Within 90 Days

FORT WORTH, Tex.—A political fight against President Roosevelt and his New Deal philosophy far in excess of that against former President Wilson will begin within the next 90 days, predicts Dr. Robert Montgomery, one of the south's leading economists. "The fight against President Roosevelt will be even more bitter than the one staged against the late President Wilson, and it will kill Wilson," the head of the University of Texas economics department said.

"The fight is inevitable. It will be eternal war between the Jeffersons and the Hamiltons, democracy and aristocracy, the new and the old." Dr. Montgomery differs widely with those who accuse President Roosevelt with tearing down traditional American rules and laws.

"Mr. Roosevelt is doing nothing of the sort," he declared. "Those foundations already were torn down. No institution created by man is sacred. None can stand forever. Even labor unions will be hopelessly obsolete in 25 or 50 years."

"We're just on the verge of seeing democracy pass from the world. England and America are the last possible standard, and unless we're willing to make some drastic changes, our democracy will be gone."

Continuation of Federal School Is Urged On Hopkins

AUSTIN, Tex.—Federal Relief Director Harry L. Hopkins has been asked to continue "school" for 65,000 pupils, some of them gray-haired, in Texas.

Relief schools were conducted under the civil works program in this state. Unemployed teachers were placed on the faculty. Night schools and kindergartens were conducted in public buildings and other places.

Lessons stopped abruptly with CWA. At the last meeting of the Texas Relief Commission here, Senator Julian Greer, former school teacher, Elkhart, urged that the program be continued for the sake of 2,000 jobless teachers and 65,000 students.

The Commission unanimously agreed to request an allotment of \$162,000 to continue the program until the middle of May, end of the regular school year.

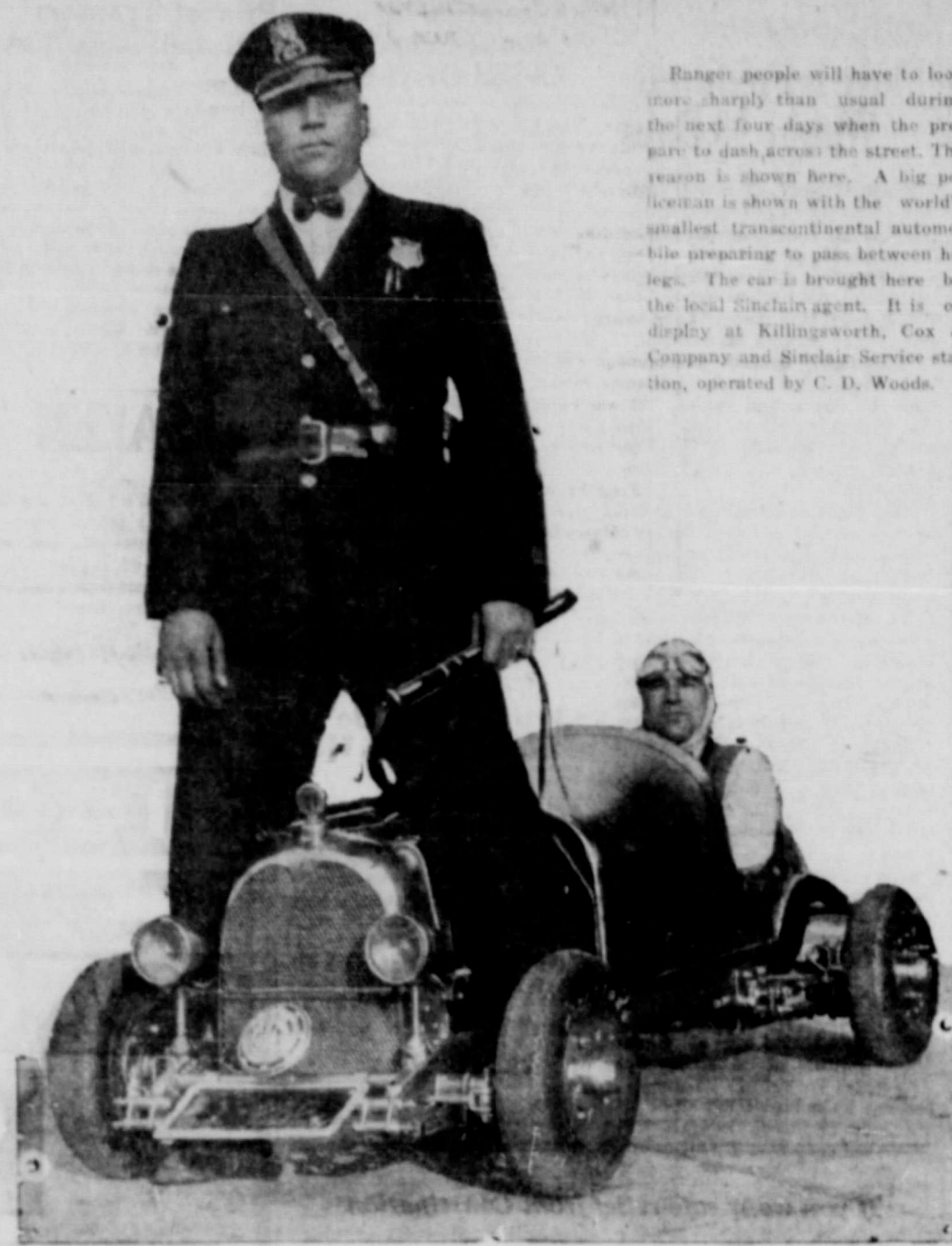

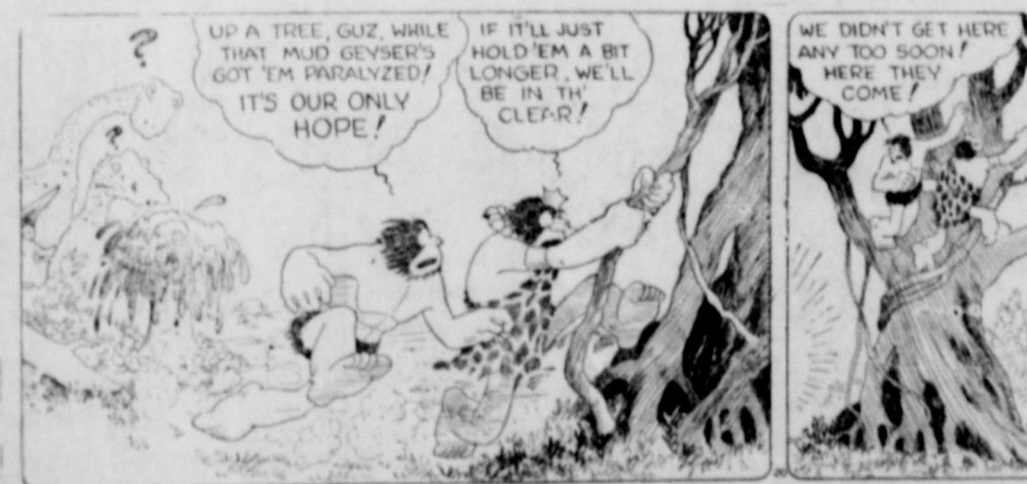
New Technique Is Saving Lives

MOSCOW.—A new technique for major abdominal operations, which its originator believes will save many lives, recently has been perfected by a Soviet surgeon, Prof. S. I. Spaso-Kukotsky. The surgeon, after years of practice, became convinced that many patients died from stomach operations because they were deprived of food for some hours be-

fore going under the knife. Consequently, he reasoned, vitality was exhausted and the formation of dangerous acids in the intestines was facilitated.

In his earlier attempts to counteract this condition, Spaso-Kukotsky introduced into the intestines, following the operation, a "breakfast" of spirits, butter, eggs and milk. He estimated that half a liter of this concoction contained 4,000 calories. As a result of restoring the patient's vigor by this nutritious food, the surgeon estimated that he reduced fatalities from abdominal operations from 16 to 4.1 per cent.
