



RANGER IN 1929

On Jan. 1, 1929, at a meeting of the county commissioners, in a ormy session, it was voted to have Eastland Hill paved. This was the last session at which Judge Ed. S. Pritchard presided, being relieved by Judge Clyde I., Garrett at the next session. The same day the Ranger schools reopened after the Christmas holidays, in spite of

the fact that there had been a serious flu epidemic, which was abating. Retire at \$100 per month for life. Jan. 6 the Ranger banks reported deposits of \$1,182,237.99. Jan. 9 the Morris tract gasser extended the gas pool at Frankell half a mile. The same day burglars robbed the Walker-Smith wholesale grocery warehouse, taking five cases of cigarets, valued at \$350. The next day Silliman Evans spoke before a joint meeting of the Lions and Rotary clubs, coming to Ranger by airplane and inspecting the Ranger air-

Jan. 14 joy-riding car thieves were active. Three automobiles, stolen from Ranger citizens, were found the next day at widely separated points, out of gas, but undamaged. The next day a Mexican laborer was killed by a Texas & Paific train at Tiffin. Jan. 16 the Texas Electric Service company announced a reduction in domestic and commercial rates.

A Bible-reading marathon was started at the First Methodist Church, with members of the congregation taking turns at reading the Bible. The start was made at 7:30 p. m. and readers relieved one another during the hours of the night.

Jan. 18 a parcel post cow-testing association was formed, whereby samples of milk mailed in would be tested. Jan. 20 it was announced the Strawn road from Blundell to the Hamon Kell tracks would be widened and improved, Jan. 29 Mrs. T. C. Weeks was severely burned when her clothing caught fire as she was standing in front of a gas heater at her home

The first day of February two trainmen were injured when a reight engine and 16 freight cars left the track at Colony curve, between Ranger and Olden. Feb. 6 H. H. Harsha, alias Earl Renois, who had been captured when he robbed the narcotic case of the Paramount Pharmacy, Dec. 2, 1927, went on trial in federal court at Fort Worth.

F. O. Dean, who was appointed to take his place, also resigned, his resignation being dated May 1. Feb. 26 it was believed that a gang of store robbers, including the gang that robbed Walker-Smith in January, was broken up when three men were arrested

March 3 Dr. A. N. Harkrider was elected grand exalted ruler of the local Elks club. March 4 the A. & P. grocery store was robbed of between \$600 and \$900 in cash when thieves entered the building through a window which they broke open. March 6 John Fickenworth lost his leg when he fell under a Texas & Pacific train near the depot. He was riding a freight and fell under it when he left the train here. The next day Dawson C. Crabb was instantly killed when he was caught between a 12-inch main line gate and a concrete box and was crushed to death.

March 12 the Commercial State Bank was designated as the county depository and March 14 a company of Ranger stockholders took over the Pitcock gin, renaming it the Ranger Gin company. March 17 county officers shot a man who was alleged to have stolen an automobile from P. O. Hatley, principal of the Hodges Oak Park school.

March 21 the district Rotary convention met in Ranger and March 25 the Ranger Choral club won first place in the interscholastic girls




































Garden and Yard Hints From Club Women of County

Get Rid of Cut Worms Mrs. Henry Collins, farm food supply demonstrator of the Olden home demonstration club, gives the following information on gar-den hints. Mrs. Collins finds these are good to use every sea-"Get rid of cut worms using the following: 2 pounds dry bran, 2 ounces white arsenic or Paris green and 1 pint molasses. Mix thoroughly and add anough water to make the bran particles hold together. Apply in the late evening along the rows, placing in piles about the size of a 25 cent piece. "Using this poison bran has helped make a higher yield in my tomato and cabbage crops. when using this poison be sure the chickens are fastened out of the garden

or they may get the worms. Another remedy I find worth while and is not expensive is to dis olve 1 pound of soap in two or three gallons of water and spray the plants every ten days. This will not kill the bugs, but will keep them off the plants.

Remedy for Tomato Bugs and

Lice Lice have bothered my garden plants for all these years and now I have a remedy for ridding such plants as mustards, turnlos, cucumbers, cantaloupes and watermelons of them. I spray the plants thoroughly with nicatrol, using one and one-half teaspoor ful of this solution to one gallon of water. Spray the plants every five to seven days to insure keep-ing down these pests. Lice are sucking insects and the poison (as arsenic) will not kill them, because they do not get that when only sucking the juices from the leaves and stems.

You can get rid of the tomato bugs by dusting the plants with one part of lead arsenate to four parts of lime or spray with one and a half teaspoons of lead arsenate to one gallon of water.

Mrs. B. F. Dempsey, farm food supply demonstrator of Bullock demonstration club, has found these remedies helpful in her garden.

A few cents spent for bug dope may save a hundred dollars worth of vegetables. Don't delay spraying, as insects which work day and night can cause serious dam-age in a very short time.

Cucumbers

Large cucumbers for sour pickles and small cucumbers for sweet pickles should be grown in all gardens. Mrs. J. W. Parrish, farm food supply cooperator of Ranger co-workers club finds that the Davis Perfect or the Stay Green cucumbers are good for the large ones. The Chicago Pickling variety for the small ones.

Pickles cured in brine make better pickles and this method will take the bitterness out of the cucumbers if there is any there. The best cantaloupes for home

These varieties have thick, tender sweet flesh with small seed cavities that make them very desir-

Adequate Storage Space

Mrs. D. M. Jacobs, clothing demonstrator of the North Star demonstration club says: "All families should have plenty of storage space for the clothing and this is possible with very little cost if one will look around and use the material on hand. I have a closet made of an old wardrobe This wardrobe was not wide enough and to remedy this the back was taken out. a one by twelve plank put in between the wall and the wardrobe which makes it very satisfactory. The wardrobe is on the floor and with scrap lumber the top is built to the ceiling, making storage space for quilts and boxes or anything of the kind. Shelves are built in the end for the flat garments or hats and a rod across for hanging garments. Shoes are to be taken care of on a shoe rack or nail nailed into the wall and the shoes hung over them. The inside of the closet is to be papered, the paper was donated by Mr. Wilcox, one of the cooperating Rising Star merchants. The cost of the adequate storage space in this case is practically nothing. A complete report will be given at the council meeting as to the cost of the clos-




