\* Three California kidnapers are behind the bars of San Quentin penitentiary-for life. They were the kidnapers of Millionaire William F. Gettle. District Attorney Buron K. Fitts of Los Angeles county made a quick job of it. He's a former Texan. The kidnapers were taken to the private office of the prosecutor. This is what he said to the ruffians who were trapped and missed the ransom loot: "Agree to enter pleas of guilty today or risk the electric chair." They agreed. They were given life imprisonment. They were taken to San Quentin. They did not harm or injure their victim. The California law recently enacted calls for death for the perpetrator "if the victim is harmed."




