Education Board Moves to Stop Juggling of Bonds

AUSTIN, Tex. - The State Board of Education has moved to stop Texas school districts from juggling" their bonded debts.

Atterney General James V. Allred was asked to prepare blank forms on which the true status of interest sinking fund accounts, tax income and levy, and a record of taxable values, may be recorded for each school district. The data, sworn to by district

officials, will be required of every school district asking the state board to buy its bonds It has been reported that many

school districts have levied necessary taxes for bond retirement, but have collected only about 30 per cent of the revenue. Others have reduced taxable values by half to so reduce their income as to be unable to pay interest and sinking fund allotments due on district bonds. Backed by legislative


