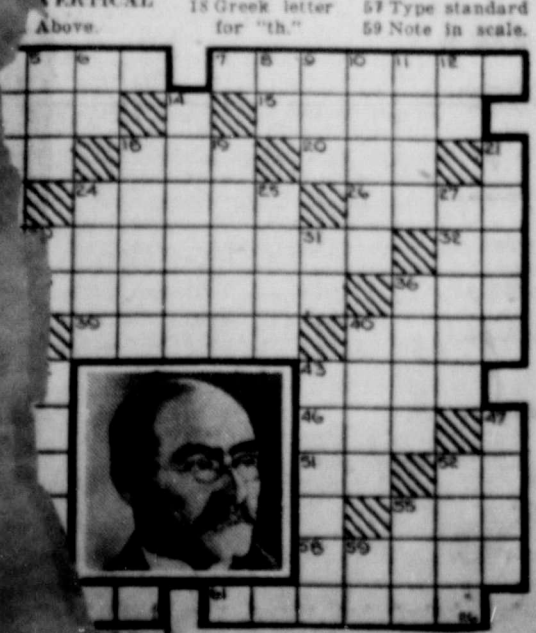

Texas Pays Fifth Largest Gasoline Taxes of Nation

HOUSTON.—Texas, producer of 42 per cent of the nation's petroleum, pays the fifth largest gasoline tax bill of the 48 states, a check of tax figures showed today. State and federal taxes combined to add four cents to the price of every gallon of gasoline sold in Texas. This figure is only the "gas tax," and it does not include other taxes that are levied on crude oil as it moves from well to refinery. Tax statistics revealed that Texans pay an annual tax bill for domestically refined gasoline of \$28,479,350. New York with \$43,344,695 in annual gasoline taxes leads the nation. Between New York and Texas are California, Ohio and Pennsylvania. Illinois with less crude oil production than one East Texas well

could give and with 2,000,000 more people than Texas pays \$27,835,011. Three states and the District of Columbia pay only half as much as Texans. The rate is two cents a gallon. Ten states pay three cents. In that group are New York, Pennsylvania and California. Fifteen states including Texas pay four cents a gallon. Other states include city and county taxes. The highest rate is paid by Florida and Tennessee. Motorists of those states pay seven cents in taxes for every gallon of gasoline their automobiles use. The nation's gasoline tax bill in 1933 was more than \$500,000,000. This figure is approximately the wholesale value of all automobiles manufactured in 1933. Since the first gasoline tax was levied in Oregon in 1919, United States motorists have paid \$3,500,000,000 in motor fuel taxes. In 1933, individual Texans paid more gasoline taxes per capita than the resident of any other state, despite the presence in their own backyards of the greatest pools of petroleum ever discovered.

Good Hecklers Are Declared To Be Greatest Need of Campaign Season By Political Writer

AUSTIN.—What the Texas political campaign needs is some good hecklers. Candidates are talking generalities and platitudes. A few good hecklers would make them be specific.

Nearly all candidates for governor in some speech or other have used an old age pension, as a talking point. Audiences are left to believe that they can go blithely down life's pathway, regardless of the future, if only they elect that particular candidate for governor.

Many of the planks being voiced by candidates are subject to pertinent inquiries. Lack of questioning indicates that public interest has not been stimulated by them.

All candidates are for easing the tax burden. How they are going to do it varies with the candidate. A heckler might ask each one how adequate appropriations are to be made if the state income is reduced in face of an overdraft of nearly \$5,000,000.

"How about insane sleeping on floors for lack of buildings?" is a question that might give a candidate considerable pause. Most of the candidates have foreseen that some such question, if unasked, at least may have arisen in the minds of voters.

Other candidates would tax the chain stores. Chain stores made such a showing when it was attempted that legislators shied off. Other industries, singled out to

take the burden off the land and the little fellow might get hecklers to ask the candidates the questions they will ask when bills for the taxes reach the legislature. But they save their ammunition. They know campaign promises are brittle.

A candidate who is sincere and "knows his stuff" will welcome a heckler. He quickly can gain sympathy of an audience in an impromptu exchange with a heckler. At the worst, he has amplifiers and can drown the heckler out.

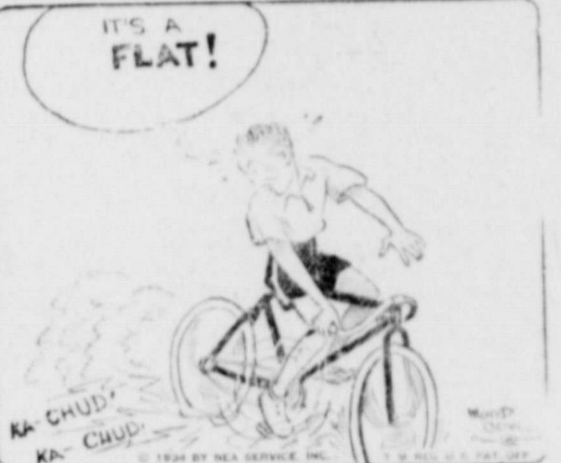
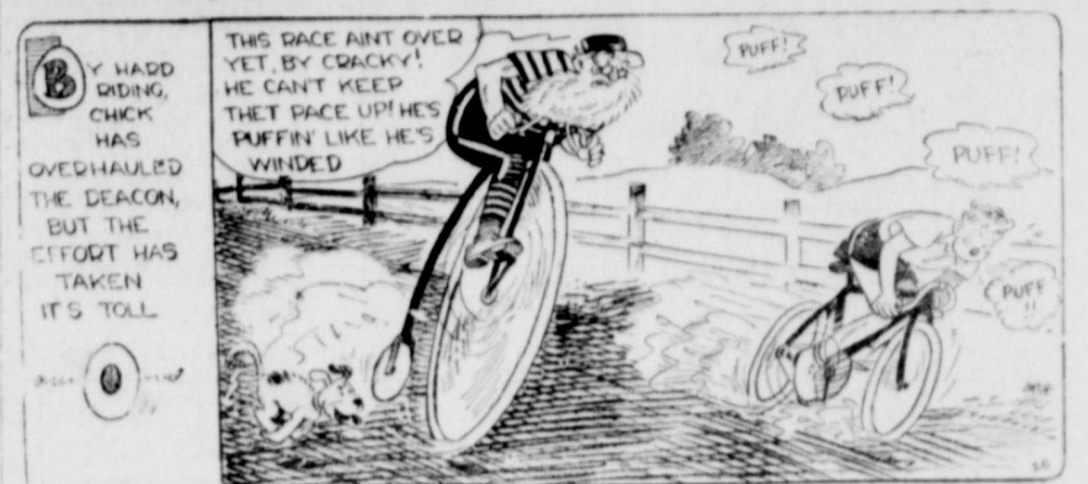
Hecklers in the past have been used to help a candidate. The late Senator Joseph W. Bailey, phlegmatic and somewhat ponderous in his arguments until roused, was spurred into a return to his old-time fire by planned use of hecklers.

Supporters noted that Bailey was not setting the pace he could set. Without Bailey's knowledge a heckler was placed at the rear of an audience the senator addressed at Uvalde. A few bars from the heckler and Bailey was going at his best.

Dan Moody used to quell hecklers when it was inconvenient to answer their questions by shouting. "When did you get your pardon?" If the heckler was made angry the crowd laughed all the more.
