REP. DIES READY FOR OIL INVESTIGATION

Rep. Martin Dies of the Beaumont district has been named as special counsel for the house committee named to make an investigation into the needs of additional legislation to stop illegal oil production. Rep. Dies has prepared a questionnaire to be sent to every refiner, producer and pipeline operator in Texas, "asking a wide range of questions on the existing situation and a definite expression of what each thought about the necessity of new legislation." Speaking of the survey to be made of the Texas field, Dies said to a Washington correspondent of the A. P.: "This survey ought to show the real feeling of the individual operator without respect to many conflicting claims that have been made by associations. We want to know each oil man in Texas thinks. Thus we can pull aside whatever curtains of propaganda that have been erected and get our information directly from the men who ought to know." He added that a personal inquiry would be confined to Texas since Texas is at the heart of the problem, but would be broadened later to other states if necessary. He will open an office at Longview about July 8 and will meet the special house committee at Houston about July 18. The youthful congressman from the Beaumont district has a program that will keep him busy until late in the fall. Think of it: "We want to know what each oil man in Texas thinks."

FINANCIAL AID FOR SMALL INDUSTRIES OF THE NATION

President Roosevelt very promptly signed the industrial loan bill. Now it is said loans on adequate securities totaling at least a half billion dollars can be made in the next six months "to stimulate business enterprises." At least, this is the viewpoint of the officials of the R. F. C. and the Federal Reserve board. They stress, "because of a limitation restricting loans to \$500,000 each," loans are expected to be confined largely to the smaller industries.

It is made unlawful for anyone to give or receive a fee or bonus for obtaining a loan. In other words, the political pull of "the middleman" has been damned or doomed by the national lawmakers with the approval of the President.

Quite a number of small cities in England make it a practice to levy charges for parking automobiles in public streets. This is one method of raising money that our law-makers evidently have overlooked. They might try it out, as about everything but the air we breathe is now taxed.

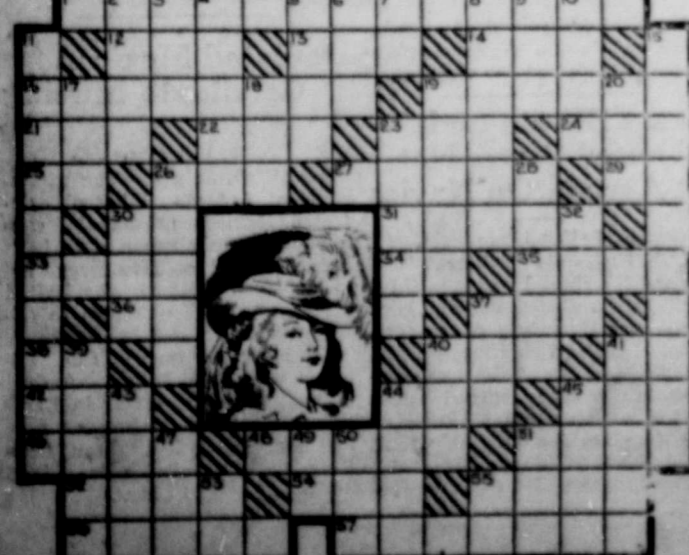

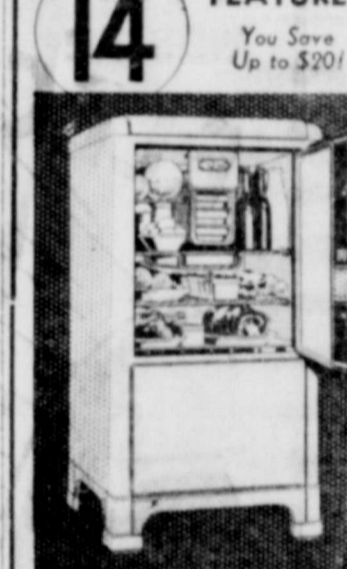

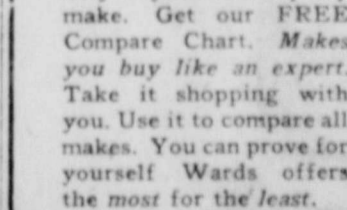
