Air conditioning your home means comfort inside, no matter the condition of the weather outside.

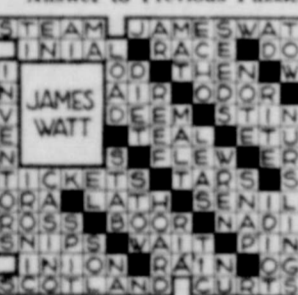

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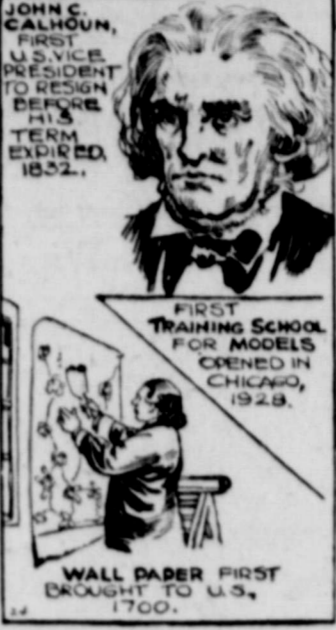

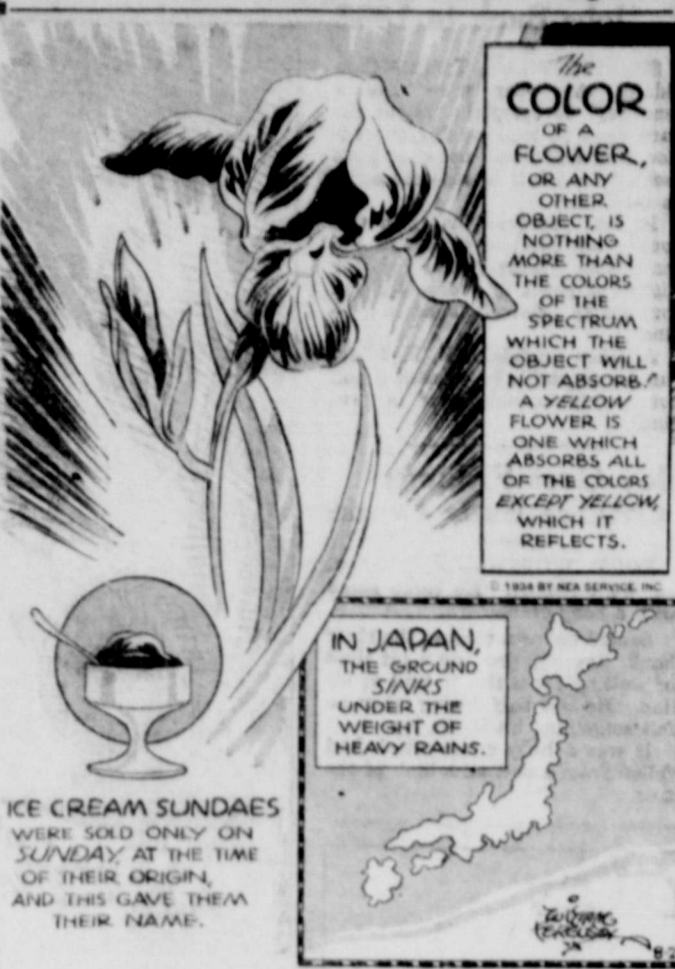

Employment In July Increases
 AUSTIN.—Employment conditions in Texas, as of the week ending July 14, made a very favorable showing in comparison with the corresponding period last year, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. Reports from 2,298 establishments show a total of 100,239 employees, a gain of 13.1 per cent over July, 1933, and a seasonal decline of only a fraction of 1 per cent from June of this year.
 Payrolls for these firms totaled \$2,160,000, a gain of 16.5 per cent over July, 1933, and a seasonal gain of 16.5 per cent over June of the current year.

What College Should We Choose?
 WHY PEOPLE OF THIS SECTION SHOULD PATRONIZE RANGER JUNIOR COLLEGE

 Each year the question comes up for high school graduates and their parents as to choice of a college.

Texas itself has thirteen senior colleges and two junior colleges controlled by the State, eighteen independent senior colleges and seventeen independent junior colleges, besides five colleges of special subjects, such as musical conservatories, schools of fine arts, and theological seminaries, thus making a total of thirty-one senior and thirty-six junior colleges and five special schools that are rated as accredited colleges by the State Department of Education.
 Naturally, with such a splendid array of good colleges in Texas and a vastly greater number of approved colleges in other portions of the United States each offering their various inducements and advantages to the high school graduates, the choice of a college to mold their futures, so to speak, becomes somewhat perplexing. By far the majority of high school graduates have not decided upon their life careers and perhaps can't decide before their second or third year in college.

Happily, however, there is enough standardization among the colleges as to curricula that the students all get a more broadening general training in the first two years of college work, so that they will lose little if any credits or time regardless of the college they attend. In other words, the basic requirements for various degrees and pre-professional courses in different colleges are pretty much the same and the credits are transferable at full value to other colleges.

Hence, the choice of a college for high school graduates develops upon other points.
Facilities For Learning
 One of the chief items of consideration, of course, should be the facilities for learning and standards of instruction offered by the college. Many false notions prevail in this connection. Of course, there are good and bad instructors in every institution, perhaps, but again the standards as to qualifications of instructors are regulated by the State Department of Education and by the Association of Texas Colleges and Universities.

The standard set up is that the heads of departments must have M. A. degrees or have attained eminence in their particular line of teaching. Since the heads of departments in Ranger Junior College do practically all the teaching in the College, the students in this college get the benefit of better trained teachers than they do in many of the larger and particularly the senior colleges where they are often in classes under tutors and instructors who do not possess these qualifications.

The head of the Science department for Ranger Junior College the coming year has his Ph. D. degree and several of the others have done considerable work beyond their M. A. degrees. Furthermore, the opportunities for study and learning are far superior in smaller institutions with smaller classes under home conditions.

Much more individual attention is possible and is given and the instructor can and do show a more personal interest in the welfare of the students than in the larger institutions. These buses would charge only a small amount monthly, depending somewhat on distance; so that the maximum cost for transportation, tuition, and fees would come to less than \$160.00 for the year.

One Important Cotton Problem Is Cleared Up

Has High Rating
 Ranger Junior College has attained the highest credit rating that any college may secure in Texas, being classed as a college of the first class by the State Department of Education and by the Association of Texas Colleges and Universities. The qualifications of its teachers is somewhat above those of most colleges for the first two years. It offers ideal conditions for the development of the social, moral, and spiritual ideals and qualities of its students. Again the conditions for study and learning here are almost ideal, and the student is given the maximum attention to individual needs.

Finally, the most of the two years in Ranger Junior College is less than that of one year in most other colleges and a wide range of electives are offered leading toward the various degrees and the pre-professional courses in senior colleges, so that a student after completing the two years offered here may enter the junior year of any senior college in Texas or of any other state.
