### MEAT CANNING AS NATIONAL RELIEF MEASURE

To date 137 Texas counties of the 254 have been placed in the drouth area by the federal government relief setup. There is a Texan, Col. Lawrence Westbrook, assistant federal relief administrator. He has drafted a program in a booklet. Its distribution to state emergency relief administrators has begun. News of th propose relief plan follow-Ed a report that a corporation empowered to establish factories for the relief of the unemployed was to be formed for the District of Columbia by the government. Indeed, is said the relief administration has had under consideration for months the leasing of idle factories to produce or process both goods and food for distribution to the needy. Federal Relief Director Harry L. Hopkins is absent on a European trip, but federal officials in the City of Washington said it was unlikely the Westbrook canning plant plans had been distributed without the administrator's approval.

Texas has a federally-aided meat canning chain where 19 such plants have been operated in state relief work Texas blazed the way in working arrangements between relief and extension agents in Texas in relief canning "Therefore, the Texas plan for co-operation and the plan for meat canning were accepted in Washington to be recommended to other states in the drouth relief meat can ning program," according to Miss Mildred Horton, Texas state home demonstration agent, who has just returned from Washington where she was called by the Hopkins felief commission set-up to draft the national plan. It is said that officials finally passing on the plans represented the FERA, AAA, the bureau of home economics and the extension service, after which Col. Lawrence Westbrook, director of rural rehabilitation and assistant director of rain the FERA, formally accepted them for the relief administration and had them issued to relief agencies throughout the nation.

" Commenting, Miss Horton emphasized the fact that the plans which worked so well in the Texas relief meat canning last winter and which she had adapted to use in the nation are the product of experience. Texas conducts extension work on a demonstration basis, the idea brought into agricultural teaching by Dr. Seaman A. Knapp, the founder of the extension service. Rural homes in Texas carrying on the pantry demonstration, have been growing centers of meat canning since 1918, when Miss Horton herself, then home demonstration agent in Jasner county canned the first whole cow ever to go into cans.

Based on Texas relief commission figures, Col. West brook has estimated that the cost of equipment in a small plant would be \$1000 to \$1500; in a medium sized plant, Ford truck \$2000 to \$2500; and in a large plant, \$2500 to \$4500. ### COTTON TEXTILE INDUSTRY MAKES **NEW HIGH RECORD**

Now it is announced that the cotton textile industry looks back with pride upon its accomplishments since June 27, 1933, when it submitted its code of competition and embarked upon the administration's drive to spread employment and boost purchasing power by cutting hours and raising wages. George A. Sloan, chairman of the textile code authority, placed the achievements of the first year of operation under NRA before the American public. For instance; First to abolish child labor; first to submit a code and thus set the example for nearly 500 factories and mills; a 40 per cent increase in employment, and a 78 per cent jump in payrol as outstanding contributions to

Chairman Sloan sounded a warning. He cited tremendous increases in the price of raw materials, and growing apprehension on the part of the business managers over the trend in recent legislation as factors disturbing the industry. In addition, he said labor had become increasingly militant in demand for higher wages and shorter hours than the code at present provides.
