Irion Lovelace was born March 15, 1889, the first male child born in Irion county, Texas. His father, Dr. L. B. Lovelace, was a pioneer ectitioner, minister and teacher. frion, with the family, moved to Dimmitt where he grew to manood. He enlisted in the armed forces of World War I and served with the 36th Division.

In February, 1919 he was married to Miss Dollye Whittaker, and moved to San Bonita, Texas. A year later his wife died and he returned to Dimmitt. He was later married to Mrs. Geneva Osborne of Farwell, and to this union two children were born. They resided in Dimmitt for several years during which time he was employed as mechanic at the Ford Garage. When he was stricken with heart ailment he was employed at the Air Base at Clovis.



This year the Christmas mailing period for both Army and Navy overseas forces is the same-September 15 to October 15. After October 15 no gift parcel may be mailed to a soldier without the presentation of a written request

from him The great demands upon shipp ing and the need for giving preference to arms, munitions, medicine and food is the prime reason for Cowsert Haberer, Billy Lavance the early mailing date. Moreover, gift parcels must travel great distances to reach Army and Navy personnel who are located at re mote points, and frequently the transfer of large numbers to new stations necessitates forwarding of the packages and additional time is required.

"The response that our people made last year during the overseas nailing period demonstrated that they will cooperate in any measure designed for the welfare of our armed forces personnel," Mr. Walker said. "It is not easy to concentrate on Christmas gifts in the midst of our warm weather here son, Lt. If both tape and twine are used, so much the better. If the outer wrapper is crushedand this is likely to happen-the oss of contents may be prevented if fiberboard boxes are wrapped in

We would have been able to make delivery if the address had been shown on the inside wrapper. We advise that everyone write the ad-dress of the sender and addressee inside the package as well as out-

Prevention Better WANT ADS Than Cure

Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, in outlining the duties of the Texas State Department of Health said in a statement today that public health measures are preventive and not curative.

"In an effort to prevent disease," Dr. Cox said, "the State Health Department carries on an educa tional program informing the public as to how they may secure protection by vaccination against flocks sterilize your poultry houses and equipment with Carbolineum. Sold By smallpox, typhoid fever, and immunization against diphtheria; by investigating sources of disease outbreaks; by quarantining and isolating those ill with communicable disease; by prevention of the spread of the disease; inspection of water supplies and advocating the production and use of safe milk to prevent the occurance of milk-born diseases."

Dr. Cox said that in spite of all preventative measures, people will become ill and accidents will happen. The cure of sickness and the repair of accidents fall within the scope of the duties of the private practitioner of medicine and surgery.. "Of course," he said, 2tp "the general practitioner of medicine is also engaged in prevention of disease when he advises mothers to have their children protected against diphtheria and smallpox or to have the family as a whole immunized against typhoid fever."

The general practitioner and State Health Department alike advocate that it is better to remain healthy than it is to recover from an illness, but the State Health Department is engaged in the control and prevention of disease as it affects the general population a community or State.

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
