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UNCLE SAM WILL NOT PERMIT DUMPING OF COTTON

Secy. Henry A. Wallace has notified the farmers and the cotton trade that cotton consigned to the producers pool and eligible for sale upon approval of the department of agriculture "would not be dumped or permitted unduly to disturb the market." Some 1,950,000 bales were consigned with the understanding it could not be sold prior to Aug. 1 at less than 15 cents. None ever has been sold since the price never reached that figure. As the deadline was passed July 31 this consigned cotton may be marketed without the 15 cent limitation at the discretion of Oscar Johnson, the pool manager. There is to be no dumping. There is to be no forcing of the cotton on a weak or unwilling market, and the head of the department of agriculture has made this emphatic statement, or rather pledge, to the trade and those engaged in the industry: "When and if any of this cotton is offered for sale the public will be advised and the trade given an opportunity to purchase."

Texas producers have been hard hit by the drouth. Texas has produced many bumper crops. Now many of the wise ones of the industry, growers as well as exporters, predict that the yield of 1934, speaking of bales, will not go beyond 2,500,000. It is all guesswork but the drouth has taken a large toll and the losses by the storm and tidal waves in the coast country have been terrific according to those familiar with the conditions in the lower country. Thousands of cotton pickers, it is said, will go hungry this summer and fal and winter as a result of the ravages of the elements in the big producing cotton countries of




