## Warns Against Typhus Fever

Austin, Texas—Inasmuch as typhus fever is, even this early in the year, showing an increased incidence over the state, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, today issued an urgent appeal to every Texan to cooperate in rodent control measures.

"The conquest of typhus fever in Texas is far from complete," Dr. Cox declared. "There is still entirely too much of this disabling disease."

"Concentrated effort and close cooperation from every citizen of Texas is urgently needed if typhus fever is to be brought definitely under control," Dr. Cox continued. "and this certainly must be done if our public health in Texas is to be protected."

Inasmuch as typhus spread by flea which feeds on typhus infected rats, control measures, according to Dr. depend on rat extermination through means of starving out and building out rats as well as trapping and poisoning them. He stated that regardless of what a fine garbage collection and disposal system a community maintains it is practically worthless in rodent control unless garbage is put into (and not beside) a garbage pail and the pail kept covered at all times.

Rat-proofing of all homes and business houses should be undertaken as quickly as possible and the local health departments are usually able to assist in overcoming the obstacle of obtaining materials and labor. They can also assist in trapping and poisoning campaigns and will gladly do so upon request.

## Farmers Talk Johnson Grass Eradication

At a County-wide meeting of Farmers at Dimmitt Tuesday Feb. 26, 98 farmers and businessmen heard a very interesting program on Irrigation, potato growing and Johnson grass eradication.

Don Jones of the Lubbock Experiment Station discussed irrigation practices as affecting crops in Castro County pointing out the importance of watering at the right time.

W. L. Jones formerly with the Lubbock Experiment Station and now with the Roland Company of Lubbock discussed potato growing and use of commercial fertilizers.

Jason Gordon, Lubbock County Agent discussed the eradication of Johnson Grass giving methods that have been used in Lubbock county.

R. L. King County Agent pointed out the importance of a Johnson grass control program for Castro County stressing the necessity of all farmers working together to eradicate this and other noxious weed.

A Johnson grass committee composed of T. R. Davis, John L. Spencer, Willis Hawkins, J. O. Ayres, J. G. Davis, Press Dyer and Henry Behrends was appointed by those present to work on the Johnson Grass program.

County Agent King requests all farmers who are interested in carrying on a demonstration on Johnson grass eradication to report to his office so this committee may have this information.

## Way Opened For Farm Telephones

There are more than 3,000 farm homes in Texas which are not reached by telephone service. And that says, M.C. Jaynes, cooperative organization specialist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, is why the promise shown by the carrier telephone system is of so much interest to Texans.

The carrier telephone system, as Mr. Jaynes explains it depends on special equipment which works a lot like a radio transmitter. But instead of broadcasting through the air, the equipment sends your voice hitchhiking along power lines right along with regular electric current. And that means that anyone who has electricity in his home sooner or later can have a telephone, too and that without having to put up any more lines.

The system is being tried out under field conditions near Jonesboro, up in Arkansas. Although the carrier telephone is not yet ready for general use, Rural Electrification Administrator Claude R. Wickard has expressed the hope that the tests may open the way for rural telephone service wherever electricity is available. Says Mr. Wickard, "The worth of REA financed rural electric power systems will be increased immeasurably if the same lines which bring electric light and power to rural homes can also be used to link these homes together in the nation's great telephone network."

Mr. Jaynes estimated that already there are more than 40,000 miles of REA-rural power lines in Texas, with many applications for new lines on hand. So that's how matters stand with the carrier telephone. Today it's still in the proving ground stage but it's something to watch for in the future.

## Washington News Letter

(By Congressman Eugene Worley)

Almost daily I receive many inquiries from veterans who are being released from the service and returning home to Texas. Most of these questions concern their benefits under the G.I. Bill or Rights pertaining to educational privileges procedure in securing loans for the purchase of houses, farms, or to enter private business. In addition, there are questions and problems concerning family allowances, government insurance, and a large number of other matters with which the average ex-serviceman is not familiar.

In an effort to be of help in answering these inquiries, Congress has authorized the publication of House Document 134 which is designed to give a complete picture of veterans' rights, benefits, privileges, etc.


For example, I quote several questions and answers from this pamphlet:

Question: After a veteran has been discharged from the service, how may he secure information about his insurance?

Answer: By writing to the Veterans Administration, Washington 25, D. C. He should give his first name, middle name, and last name in full and should also state his insurance certificate or policy number and his service serial number or numbers. If his certificate or policy number is not known, to insure proper identification there should also be furnished the insured rank, rating, or grade, and organization at the time of original application for insurance, his date of separation from service and his date of birth.

Question: How does a veteran know how to apply for a course of instruction under the GI Bill of 1944?

Answer: He should write to W. E. (Bill) DeHereford, Texas

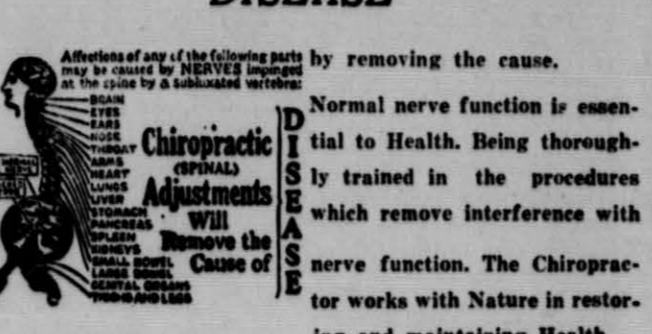
