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Treatment Arouses Interest in 'Dead Wells'

VOCATIONAL TRAINING IS **PLANNED HERE**

R. F. Holloway, superintendent of the Ranger public schools, has received advance information about vocational training for those who are physically disabled and who can, under the plan, secure training along lines in which they are particularly suited.

Residents of the State of Texas over 16 years of age whose ca-pacity to earn a living has been destroyed or impaired by accident, deformity or disease and who are physically and mentally able to follow some line of work when trained are eligible for receiving the benefits of vocational rehabili-

Rehabilitation is based on case procedure, keeording to a leaflet n the subject sent out by the state board of vocational education. Any disabled person may apply direct to the rehabilitation department, or may be reported by a friend of the crippled. When such application is received arrangement is made as soon as possible for a personal interview between the applicant and a representative of the rehabilitation department. The purpose of this interview is to determine:

1. The applicant's eligibility and need for rehabilitation and his usceptibility to the service.

2. The applicant's choice of a suitable objective, arrived at through expert counsel and guid-





MILLIONS PAID FOR TEXAS CATTLE

Texas cattlemen are in the picture. Uncle Sam has been buying livestock in the drouth affected regions. Tex-'as received \$6,576,725 to date through the operation .he cattle purchase program. Of the Texas total \$3,-938,128 was expended in purchase payments and \$2,638,-597 in benefit payments.

Chicago is the great hog market of the country. A peak price of \$7.75 is the latest. This is nearly double the top of two weeks ago. In the retail markets the operators have hiked their prices. Pork chops and pork roast are going to be luxuries this fall and winter.

Sheep and goat raisers are taking down their pay ments. And the experts the country over are thoroughly convinced that the drouth hit millions of people with a great deal more severity than the depression which came in the closing year of the Hoover administration.

Speaking of high prices of food staples and threatened strikes the country over, Harry L. Hopkins, relief administrator, has placed it in the record that "the government was underwriting no strikes. These are his words: "We are making no plans to take care of the textile strikers. Certainly we are underwriting none of the strikes." This is the attitude of the Hopkins administration: "Relief officials have standing orders to take care of strikers on a Lasis of their needs until the department of labor or a national labor relations board should decide whether the strike were justified."

This is his ultimatum: "If either the labor board or Secretary Perkins decides the strike is unjustified, we won't give relief."

Lady Perkins appears to be clothed with the power of a feminine dictator.

Strikes are costly to the strikers as well as to their employers. Strikes are throwing money wrenches into the machinery of the recovery act. There should be a middle ground somewhere for the settlement of these age old labor problems which are ever bobbing up in this and all other civilised nations-or alleged civilized nations.




