RAIL CHIEFS ASK FOR INCREASE IN FREIGHT RATE

Rail chiefs have petitioned the interstate commerce commission for an increase in freight rates. They base their demands for increased revenue to offset "forces growing out of the economic policies of the New Deal legislation. These forces are cited as wage increases to rail workers and rising costs of material and equipment and supplies. Proposed increases embrace almost the entire freight rate structure and range from one to 10 per cent by zones and by short and long hauls. Should the prayer of the petitioners be granted, the American public will be forced to pay \$170,000,000 in increased freight rates during the next year.

Terrell he received a total of 169,665 votes to place him second in a field of four. He changed his name to Terrell by court order. Another court order granted by the same judge expunged the name from the official records of the courts of Dallas county. But the official ballot had been printed and thus it was that Jefferson Taswell Baker, alias George B. Terrell, ran second in the race for the office of state treasurer of the sixth most important commonwealth of the sisterhood—that is, in point of wealth and population.



The success of jobbers and manufacturers depends wholly upon the success of the retailers. There must be close cooperation between them for either to succeed.





77 Records Fall as Ab Jenkins Speeds More Than 3000 Miles in 24 Hours



Ab Jenkins, veteran speed king, shattered 77 world, international and A.A.A. speed records in his recent 24-hour run on the hot salt desert at Lake Bonneville, Utah. Jenkins is shown above hurtling through space at an average speed of 127.2 miles per hour including all stops for a distance of more than 3,000 miles, — through the scorching heat of the day, and the black of the night, with temperatures as high as 120 degrees. The inset at the left shows workers on the desert. Previous to the run, holes on the course had been filled with crushed rock as hard as granite with knife-like edges. At the right Jenkins is shown receiving congratulations of his proud mother.

Transportation Is Arranged For College Students

The board of education of Ranger Junior College has voted to put on the bus from Breckenridge and Parks camp charging \$5 per month transportation from those two communities. Ten students have signed up to attend Ranger Junior College from Breckenridge and Parks and several others are expected to sign up from there.

Several students have agreed to come on the Gorman-Carbon-Eastland-Olden route also and several others have indicated that they will come if they can make arrangements, but as it would have been necessary to purchase another bus to operate on this route, the board voted not to undertake that bus route this year but rather to offer two students each his tuition for furnishing his car for bringing a carload of students from these communities and let him charge the individual students a little to cover gasoline and oil expenses. Any student who is interested in running a car from Gorman or Eastland and all who are interested in going to Ranger Junior College and go back and forth every day are urged to notify H. S. Von Roeder, dean, or R. F. Holloway, president, at once.

Prospects are bright for a good enrollment in Ranger Junior College this coming session. Indications are that the enrollment will exceed that of last year. Four states will be represented in the enrollment for this year besides Texas, namely New Mexico, Kansas, Oklahoma, and Missouri, and a good many students from distant points in Texas are expected to enroll. Ranger Junior College has enjoyed a splendid growth since its organization especially in the last few years. During 1932-33, Ranger Junior College had the largest increase in enrollment for any college in Texas on a percentage basis, and last year it had the largest enrollment from out of town that it has ever had. This year promises to be another splendid year for R. J. C.
