

BOLTER MOVEMENT NOT SEEN

While the bolter movement has not shown itself so far, democrats were quick to find out of the little-noticed republican state convention the other day, the republican state platform adopted in exact words two important campaign planks of the late Candidate Tom F. Hunter.

One of these planks was to abolish the poll tax, and throw the bars down. The other was to abolish all state ad valorem taxes-a measure in the interests of big property owners, since the little fellows already have been taken care of.

By contrast, the democratic platform declared against abolishing the ad valorem taxes. Its policy is that those owning property should pay some of the government's = cost of preserving and protecting that property for their

This republican platform, if there is to be a bolter movement, is the keynote and signal for it. It at least is a friendly overture, a gesture of aid and comfort to the defeated and disgruntled; a gesture toward that excessive liberalism that Texas democrats repudiated at the polls and in convention.

There were many losers and one winner in the democraffe party. Democrats will be alert to see if the usual defeatist-bolter movement develops, and if so, from what quarter it is instigated.

REPUBLICANS MAY CAMPAIGN

Whether the customary election-year coalition of independents and republicans will try the usual fight against the democratic nominee for governor of Texas will be disclosed within the next few weeks.

Absence of such a move would be more surprising than its customary recurrence.

So far, the demoralized and almost inert republican forces in Texas have shown no public disposition other than to follow their Nominee Waggoner to a nominal 50,-000 votes in November.

So far, the losers in democratic primaries have made no overtures, discernible to the public eye, towards leading a holter movement in November. There have been soreheads many times before; bolters rebelling from the nomi nation of the Fergusons; and bolters leaving the party under the inspiration of Ferguson's magic words.

The soreheads have lost unanimously and regularly in state contests, even when the republicans had such a fine, outstanding leader as Dr. George C. Butte.






