GOVERNMENT FIGHTING ILLEGAL LIQUOR The federal government's blow against illegal liquor selling in Texas and other dry states, previously hinted, has fallen.

Every person who has sold, or is selling, liquor in violation of the state law, has been held liable for a \$1000 federal excise tax, even though he has secured other required federal permits and paid other taxes; and may become liable also for an additional 25 per cent penalty for failing to make proper returns to the government.

Penalty for failing to pay this \$1000 tax is a \$100 fine or a year's imprisonment, or both.

The order was announced by the liquor tax unit of the internal revenue bureau of the U.S. treasury department. It was made under the provision of the repeal of the

18th amendment which pledged federal government cooperation to maintaining the laws of dry states.

It was obvious that but few of the numerous small hardliquor dealers would be able to pay the \$1000 excise tax levy. Since sales have been going on more or less openly for several months, it was not known how much evidence federal agents had gathered in preparation for its collection of these taxes.

The order even goes to the extent of levying the \$1000 tax on the manufacturer fo stills. 
