**STALIN GIVES US CLEAR VIEW OF NEW DEAL**

Josef Stalin's remarks about the predestined failure of the New Deal make interesting reading—not because Mr. Stalin's opinion of Mr. Roosevelt matters particularly, but because his statement forms a sort of looking-glass in which we can get a new slant on the American recovery effort.

For, by stating the Communist position so clearly and flatly, the Russian leader simply throws our own position into greater relief. By making a blunt declaration of things we do not believe, he helps us see what we really do believe.

The essence of his theory is that the New Deal—or any other effort to improve conditions upon the capitalist foundation—must fail, in the very nature of things.

Unemployment is inherent in modern capitalist society. The ill against which workers protest cannot be cured without putting society on a new foundation.

The division of human beings into exploiters and exploited is fundamental, and the only possible solution is to give the exploited complete control.

It would be hard to find one paragraph which expressed more precisely the exact opposite of the sentiment which animates the New Deal.

We are dedicated, that is, to the theory that the ills that have afflicted us in the last four years can be cured within the framework of capitalism.

We believe that unemployment is not a necessary accompaniment of modern, mass-production capitalism. We believe that the workers and the consumer can be given a decent break without destroying the rights of employer and investor.

We believe that co-operation can be substituted for exploitation in such way as to help all hands and not just one class.

We believe all these things so firmly that we have room for a great diversity of opinions as to the way in which our goal can be reached. Most of the time we overlook the fact that we are actually at a crossroads in our national life.

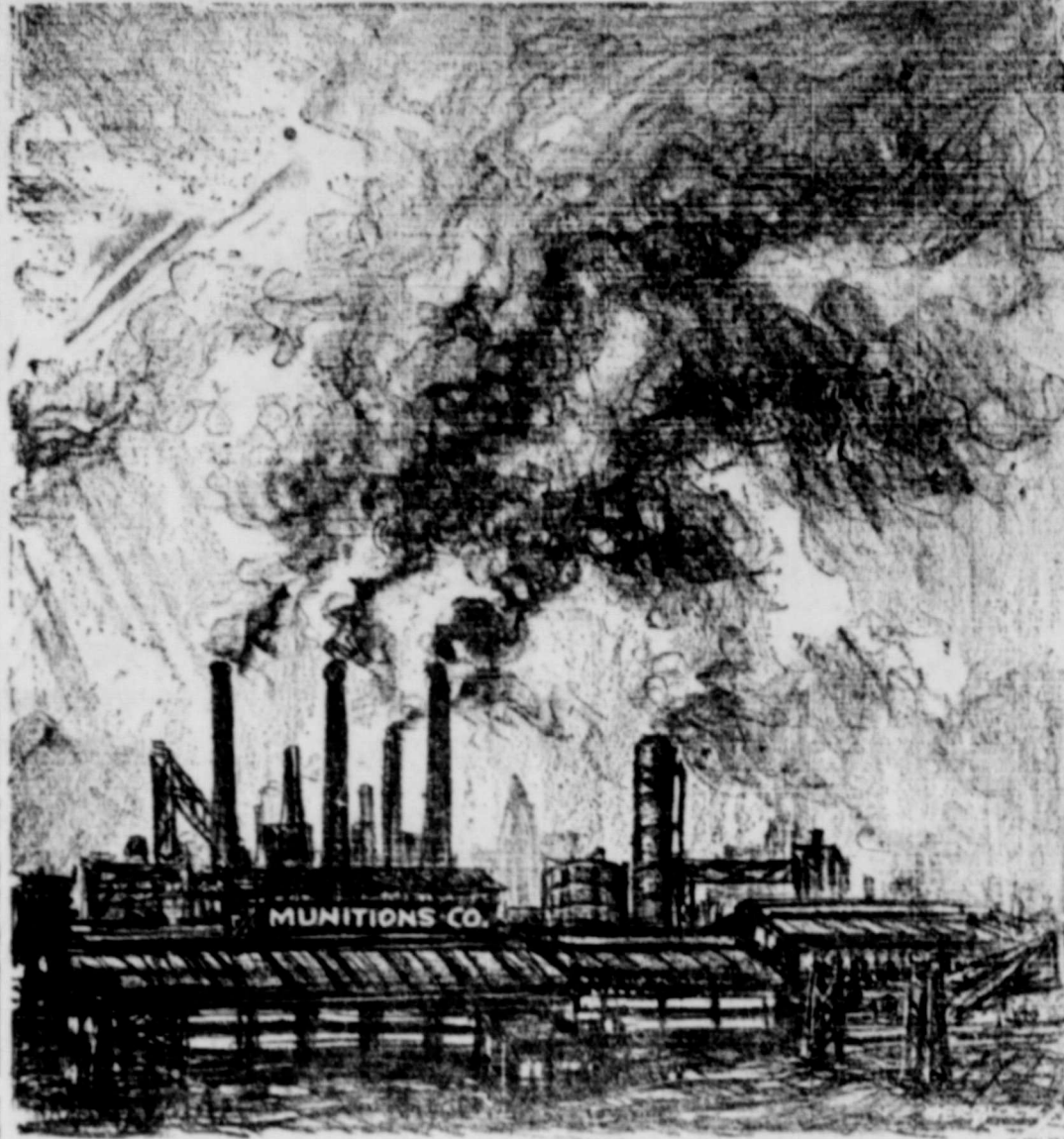
The Russian leader's remarks remind us that we are making a great fight to prove that the traditional American way of life can be preserved. That is the real stake at issue in the recovery program.

The way the battle is fought—whether via the New Deal or some other kind of strategy—is relatively unimportant. The big thing is to prove that we have the intelligence and the determination to win it.

Division of Texas Again Discussed

AUSTIN.—Division of Texas, biggest state in the union, again is under lively discussion.

As Vice President Garner explains the situation, this can be done merely by an act of the legislature. The difficulty will be to get a majority of the legislature favorable to the division.

Any dividing line separating the state into east and west portions would naturally have the 100th meridian that separates the Texas Panhandle from Oklahoma.

The western territory would have only 15 members of the Texas house of representatives and three senators or a tenth, instead of half, of the votes.

Another practical obstacle in the way of dividing Texas is the difficulty of agreeing upon a capital for the new state.

Small Bore Section Individual Short Range Match—Course of fire, 20 shot at 50 yards; arm, small bore rifle; sights, metallic; entry fee, 50 cents; prizes per schedule.

Big Bore Section Individual 200-Yard Match—Course of fire, 10 shots at 200 yards; arm, rifle cal. 30.06 or larger; sights, metallic; ammunition, any; position, prone; entry fee, \$1.00; prizes, per schedule.

Pistol Matches Twenty-five Yard Slow Fire Pistol Match—Course of fire, two series of five shots each, slow fire, one minute per shot; arm, any pistol or revolver; entry fee, 50 cents; prizes, per schedule.

Cash prizes awarded as follows: Class A—First 20 per cent of total entry fee.
