### Indian Collection Offered Ft. Worth By Cleburne Man

 FORT WORTH.—One of the greatest Indian collections in the southwest, assembled through perilous searches by its collector, has been offered the city of Fort Worth.

The collection is owned by W. J. Layland, of Cleburne, a plumber contractor, whose hobby has been the gathering of Indian relics. His only stipulation is that a suitable place be provided for the collection.

Layland's collection is valued at \$10,000, a value which it is calculated with increase proportionately as time goes on. The collection consists of many thousands of pieces from all over the United States, Canada and the West Indies.

For 45 years Layland has spent from two to four months each year roving over the western world, digging in ancient graves and houses, buying when necessary, and following a hobby that started, when as a schoolboy, he dug up an Indian mound in Illinois.

Twice he faced starvation in deserts in western United States. He penetrated the deserts before the days of automobile roads and on two separate expeditions was forced to eat grass to keep alive. Many times his life has been in danger.

Four times he has gone to Europe to trace down important bits of his collection.

His collection of Indian clothing contains a rare dress beaded with 1000 elk teeth and another with 80,000 colored Indian beads. There are relics also from the family of Quannah Parker, famous Comanche chief.

Myriads of arrowheads, ruby knives, green jade, pink jade, emeralds, glodstone and obsidian pieces are contained in the collection. New housed between bathtubs and water heaters in his shop in Cleburne.

Among the rare prehistoric items are two turquoise pendants which he obtained years ago in the new famous Canyon del Muerto in Arizona. He knows of only one other in existence, owned by the National Geographic Society.

Layland once intended to build a museum of his own in Cleburne. He made considerable preparations for the museum but gave it up after several years of depression.

He is strongly in favor of obstetrical training in our medical schools, he said. "This is no place where we are falling down the reason we are behind other countries in the world is schooling.

The maternal death rate in the United States is seven mothers out of every 100 live births," he continued. "These figures are supported by the census bureau. The rate includes only deaths within 30 months after the child's birth.

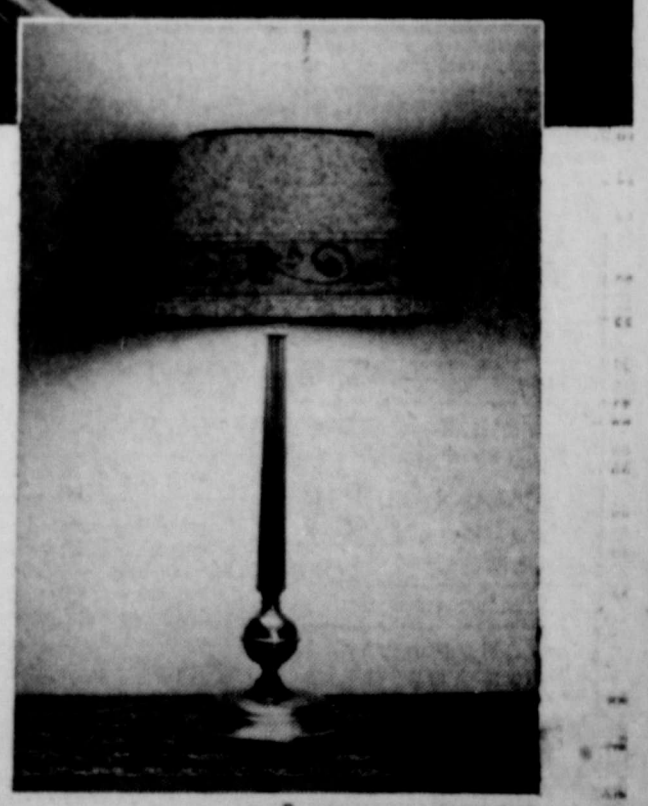
