





### **Election Shows Need** of Party Alignment

The New Year will have come, probably, before people get through talking about what the election signified. Just now we have the rather amazing spectacle of an administration winning the support both of those who feel that it is heading in the direction of change and of those who believe it to be the one secure bulwark against

That is to say that Mr. Roosevelt, in some manner, has is contrived to draw strength from liberals and conservatives alike. The liberals believe that he is going to amplify and continue those changes inherent in the New Deal; the conservatives believe that he will make as few changes as possible, and that anyone who might be put in his place a would almost certainly go farther to the left.

These exceedingly contradictory developments make it very hard to figure just what the election may have meant.

The administration continues to enjoy public support, min a quite unprecedented way; and yet this solidarity is more apparent than real, since it includes the support of two diametrically opposite schools of thought. Mr. Roosevelt cannot forever continue to be the darilng of the liberals and the white hope of the conservatives.

All of which is just another way of saying that the much talked-of realignment of parties cannot be postponed much longer.

Liberalism and conservatism are not words of very exact meaning. Nevertheless, they will have to do for want of better ones; and sooner or later they will have to be the unofficial labels of our two chief political parties, with one party standing for the one attitude and the other for its opposite.

For what the New Deal neds more than anything else Bi is a critical and intelligent reappraisal that goes to the fundamentals beneath it. It did not get that in this recent campaign. It cannot get it until the two parties stand for something more than just two groups of assorted officeholders and officeseekers.

The election advanced us very little toward that goal. It succeeded only in emphasizing the necessity for reaching it.



# Tentatively Made

WASHINGTON. - Minimum price provisions and pack specificaons requiring that all pecans sold through trade channels be graded according to United States grade standards are contained in a tentatively approved marketing agreement for the pecan industry of North Carolina, South Carolina. Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma and Texas, the agricultural adjustment administration an-

The tentatively approved agreement is being sent to the industry for signature. It would be effective for a period of one year, and contains provisions for minimum prices would raise the average weighted price to growers approxinately 2 cents per pound higher than the prevailing price of the past two years. The pecans graded in accordance with United States grade standards when bought direct from growers would sell for about 11/2 cents per pound higher pecans. Under the provisions of the agreement the selling grades would be used as a basis for purchases from growers.


