



One of the stronge ways in which human nature has expressed itself since the war is the great wave of pacifism that has spread through the younger generation.

Perhaps "strange" is not quite the word, at that. No young man who looks back thoughtfully on the monstrous horror of the World War and the almost insane things that were done during and after it can be blamed veyr greatly if he concludes that non-resistance is a sound doctrine.

But this spread of pacifism is relatively a new thing under the sun, even so. It has ben especialy noticeable in colleges. Over and over again we read stories of students banding together to swear that they will never answer a call to arms.

One of the results has been that the professional patriots have run quite a temperature about it all.

"On the other hand, our towns, cities and States have done much to lessen the hazards of driving, through the construction of new and wider roads, elimination of had curves and grade crossings. They have installed improved aro' and 'ston' signals, placed thousands of ston and warning signals, painted lines down the center of roads, and created traffic lanes on busy streets and thoroughfares.

"Bot in spite of all this, our death and personal injury rate still mounts and the only answer we have for it is that the automobile manufacturer and the road and highway engineers cannot guarantee the 'nut that holds' the

"While I do not suppose we will ever reach that stage of perfection, many things can and should he done to lesson that evil through the passage of strict drivers' cense laws, uniform traffic laws, and laws governing the installa-tion of standard warning and 'stop' and 'go' signals, and the periodical examination of the driver, as well as his automobile. Judge Blaine told of the success be had in St. Louis with the traffic school he conducted while he served on the berch as Judge of City Court. Traffic violators were to'd to attend the school or go to jail in order to serve their sentence. A series of lectures was held, one on city ordinances on automobile driving, one on State laws on auto driving, another on rafe highway driving, and another or miner violations resulting in processing the services.

Judge Blaine advocated accident prevention campaigns in citican a means to educate the publicand bring about decreases win traffic fatalities.

The speaker's address was illustrated by means of a board on which were placed miniature automobiles, street cars, street crossings and traffic signals. He used this to give graphic descriptions of the traffic laws violated unconciously and the tragic wrecks that resulted.

"Most accidents are caused as a result of carelessuess and thoughtlessness on the part of drivers," Judge Blaine said. "When you are on the street in your car, don't argue with the other fellow shout the right-of-way; give it to him. Don't take a chance, for there may be suether fool thinking of the same thing. Don't drive your car into pedestrians' safety zones.

"Use your influence in preventing accidents by continually talking the subject and then practicing what you preach. If you do this you will live a lot longer and be able to enjoy the pleasures and privileges of living on this earth."
