# Sunnyside Places 1st In State Dr. Culwell Resigns After Serving Nearly Two Years With Hospital Here Contest; Award Date Set

Entering the Texas Rural Neighborhood Contest four months late did not discourage the civic minded and progressive residents of the Sunnyside community as the community met the challenge of the contest and not only won first place in their own district but also captured the coveted first place award in the state among a field of some 160 entries.

In recognition of this outstand-ing feat and of their untiring efforts in making their community a better place in which o live, residents will receive a \$500 award in the form of a check, and a certificate acknowledging their fine work, in formal ceremonies at the community center Saturday night. The \$500 award, which is made possible by the Farmer-Stockman Magazine and the Texas Extension Service, sponsors of the contest, is the first place prize and is awarded each year to the rural community considered by state judges as making the most progress in rural

McLeroy conveyed the information to Sunnyside residents who were rejoicely surprised over the anuncement and expressed humble gratification for being accorded
