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Experts Still Believe in the Battleship

Decision on America's ship-building policy at the coming disarmament conference is complicated by the fact hat there is still a good deal of uncertainty about the type of ships the American navy ought to have.

Naval authorities in the main stand firm for a fleet built about a strong nucleus of capital ships, or battleships, easoned by a considerable number of heavy cruisers. Yet here is a wide belief that the battleship has outlived its sefulness, and that the terrific expense of maintaining hese costly vessels is one the navy might very well avoid.

Add to this the growing feeling that airplanes and subnairnes are revolutionizing naval warfare, and you have situation in which decision on a naval program would be difficult enough, even if it were not necessary to adjust our program to the programs of foreign powers.

A good exposition of the theory that the battleship is still the backbone of the fleet came recently in a public address by Rear Admiral Joseph K. Taussig, acting chief of naval operations.

America, says Admiral Taussig, needs the battleship because of its lack of naval bases—the battleship, with its wealth of heavy guns, serving as a kind of floating base which can protect lighter ships against superior forces.

Furthermore, says Admiral Taussig, the improvement of the submarine and aerial branches of naval warfare has made the battleship even more indispensable than before. It is the only warship which can be armored and protected sufficiently to withstand the shock of bombs and tor-

Here we have a brief and understandable outline of the majority viewpoint in the navy; and it is worth reading, as an antidote to the free and easy talk one constantly hears about the obsolescence of the battleship.

We are often assured that submarines and airplanes are the all-important units of a fleet in modern times; but the experts charged with maintenance of our navy still believe-and seem to have reason for their belief-that a fighting fleet, in the last analysis, is only as strong as its capital ships.

Most doughnut lovers acout the idea that there could ever be any question about a doughnut being a doughnut! Yet the Issue does arise now and then, like the old Bacon-Shakespeare controversy. If a doughnut is a doughnut and not

a fried cake or a cruller, then what are they? Sounds a little Gertrude-Steinish, but underneath there's sense to it all. For doughnuts are bits of yeast bread-dough sweetened and fried in deep fat. Fried cakes are of the nature of quick-bread dough sweetened or of a cake dough made thick enough to roll and cut in rings. They're tender fluffy cakes. fried in deep fat. Cruller means twist. The dough is the same as that of fried cakes, so the shape is the cruller's distinguishing fea-

It's the temperature of the fat that determines the digestibility of the fried cake. If you haven't a thermometer, then use the bread crumb test. An inch cube of bread from the soft part of the loaf should brown in 60 seconds when dropped in at of the perfect temperature. The themometer should register 375 degrees Fahrenheit when the dough is dropped in and should be kept at 360 degrees during frying. Rings and twists should fry in three to four minutes. Balls may need a minute or two longer.

The proper blending of ingredients is another important factor. Each ingredient should be thoroughly incorporated in the mixture as it is added, but prolonged stirring results in hard, tough fried cakes.




