Taxes-Then More Taxes

The purchaser of a loaf of bread, according to the National Investment Transcript, pays 17 kind of taxes when he lays his dime on the counter.

If he walks home on leaving the store, he is wearing out shoes which are taxed 23 times.

If he rides in an automobile, he is paying 42 different

If he takes a subway or an electric car, the total number of visible taxes which are part of the cost of his fare runs to about 58.

All of these taxes, obviously, are indirect-and very few of us know that we pay them. As the Transscript says, "Tax ignorance is the crowning element in mass ignorance today." Most of us pay few or no taxes directly-and we think because of that we are contributing nothing to the cost of government.

Tax reduction would be the greatest boon the average American could have—a boon that would at once be reflected in more jobs, more purchasing power, more spending for the necessities and luxuries which keep the industrial machine turning.


