Dimmitt Reaches 2,931 to Double 1950 Count

Castro County Population Almost 9,000

The official population count of Dimmitt has been set at 2,931, according to a census report released this week.

The population of Castro County was listed as 8,894, a significant increase over the last census report in 1950 of 5,417. The county's rural population has increased about 1,400, and city population

has just about doubled since the 1950 census.

Dimmitt's population had been estimated at about 3,500 for the past several years. "That could easily be right during the fall of the year," Mrs. Flynt said, "because that's when all the migratory workers are here and it's also the time when general em-

ployment in the county is highest. We saw scores of empty houses—Latin, white, and Negro dwellings—that we knew were filled during the late summer and fall. These people were counted some-

where, but not here."

Hart was credited with a population of 1,125. This was its first count as a town since it was incorporated only a few years ago. Nazareth population was listed as

part of the rural total only since it is not incorporated.

Despite the somewhat smaller actual indicated population than earlier estimates, Dimmitt has more than doubled in population

during the past ten years. In 1950 the census count was 1,440 persons, almost exactly half this year's figure.

Mrs. Flynt pointed out that Dimmitt's center of population lay be-

tween Fourth Street West and Lee Street north.

"The people of Castro County were very cooperative," Mrs. Flynt said, "and they made our chore much easier."

The youngsters had been to Dimmitt to attend the Rodeo and were returning home to Olton by Hart when the accident occurred. The Green youth was released from Castro County Hospital Thursday. The others were released the next two days. The automobile was totally demolished.

Dimmitt Garden Club Plans Annual Spring Flower Show

"Our Town" will be the title of the spring flower show sponsored by the Dimmitt Garden Club May 21 and 22 in the First State Bank Building. No admission will be charged. On Saturday the hours will be from 3:30 to 6:30 and Sunday from 2:00 to 5:00 p.m.

Flower show rules specify that: (1) All exhibits will be received no later than 10:30 a.m. May 21, 1960 unless otherwise specified in the schedule. (2) Late entries may be displayed but will be marked "Not For Competition." (3) Each exhibitor is limited to one entry in each class or section. (4) All property must be marked with owner's name before it is brought to the show. (5) All entries must be checked with Classification Committee and must receive an entry card before being placed. (6) Entries must conform to the Schedule. The decision of the Classification Committee is final. (7) All entries in Horticultural classes must be grown by exhibitor and should be labeled as to variety wherever possible. (8) All pot plants must be in the exhibitors' possession at least three months.

(9) Containers will be supplied for Horticultural classes by committee. (10) The decision of the Judges shall be considered final. (11) Entries must be ready for judging by 12:00 o'clock, May 21, and may not be removed until 4:30 May 22, but must be removed by 5:00 p.m. (12) Garden Club members are required to have at least two entries for each division. (13) The use of foliage is permitted in all arrangements, regardless of section or class. (14) All persons except club president, show chairman, clerks, and judges, shall be excluded from the building while judging is taking place. (15) All arrangements must be named by exhibitor.

Included in a "Schedule of Classes" is Division I—Horticulture. In this category there are five sections. Section A includes all classifications of roses, one bloom, stem not to exceed 18 inches, Hybrid Tea, Floribunda, Grandiflora, Polyantha and climbing roses. Section E includes Peonies, stems 15 inches (or slightly under). They may be single, semi-double, Japanese, anemone and double, Iris

belong in section C, one bloom, stalk not to exceed 28 inches, and they may be bearded, Siberian (1 bloom stalk), Spuria, bulbous (English, Spanish, Dutch or any other). Section D will be potted plants. These include flowering plants with at least one bloom, plants grown for foliage, succulents and cacti. Section E is a miscellaneous grouping, one bloom or specimen, variety to be judged against variety.

All arrangements belong in Division II. They must be made by the exhibitor. Although it is desirable the exhibitor uses material from her own yard, it is not a requirement. Outsiders are welcomed to participate in the show. All flower arrangements must represent some phase of "Our Town".

There are eight sections of this division. Section 1—"Our Churches" and for this arrangement the exhibitor must use all white fresh material and may follow a mass arrangement pattern with no accessories or a line arrangement pattern and use an accessory.

1,661 Cast Votes in First County Democratic Primary

McLain, Ray, Rice and Wright In Commissioners' Runoff Race

Castro County voters Saturday failed to grant any single candidate a clear-cut majority so there will be a run-off for the offices of Commissioner of both Precincts 1 and 3 on June 4.

In Precinct 1 T. C. Ray and write-in candidate E. I. (Tump) McLain will be opponents in the second primary. Ray, the incumbent, was elected in 1956 through a write-in campaign. Following are the results of the voting Saturday:

In the race for Commissioner of Precinct 3, J. M. Wright lead the three-man field with 234 votes, followed by incumbent Olen Rice who polled 179. The third candidate, L. R. Woolbright, gained 101 votes. Wright and Rice will be in the runoff.

No contests existed in voting for county offices. An average of about 1650 votes were cast for each unopposed candidate.

In the race for state representative for the 96th Legislative District, Billy Shelby of Hart led the field in Castro County but lost out elsewhere. He collected 1,060 votes to 331 for Jesse Osborn of Littlefield and 211 for C. L. Hamilton of Earth. Asborn and Hamilton will be in the runoff based on voting in other counties of the district.

Castro County gave a firm endorsement to Congressman Walter Rogers when they gave him 1,181 votes to 412 for Arthur Glover.

In the governor's race, Castro County endorsed Price Daniel over Jack Cox by a margin of 894 to 741.

For Lieutenant Governor, Castro County did not follow the example set by the rest of the state by favoring Don Yarborough over Ben Ramsey 884 to 734.

Robert W. Calvert received 1,060 votes to 485 over Robert Hughes.

For Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, W. T. McDonald led with 546 votes, followed by Loyd W. Davidson with 533 and J. D. Bowmer with 357.

Comptroller of Public Accounts, incumbent Robert S. Calvert received 1,064 votes to 487 for V. L. Ramsey.

Jerry Sadler led Castro County in the race for Commissioner of the General Land office over Bill Allcorn, 900 to 640.

Although he did not win the race, Jesse Owens led James G. Denton in Castro County 778 to 764.

Elaine Brewer, 4 Injured Saturday In Car Accident

Little Elaine Brewer, 4-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Brewer, had a downhill run on the driveway of the Melton Richardson home Saturday afternoon so she looked forward to an exhilarating ride to the street on her tricycle.

She took her ride and it almost ended in tragedy. The little girl rolled out into the street and into an automobile driven by Mrs. E. B. Noble.

Mrs. Noble said later she saw only a blur and at first thought she had run over a dog. Her own daughter fell to the floorboard when Mrs. Noble hit her brakes and by the time she had grabbed for the child and stopped the car she had gone almost half a block.

The accident occurred in the 800 block on West Bedford. The Brewer child was dragged under the Noble car until it came to a stop. She suffered a broken thigh and had pavement burns on her back and arms and a piece of gravel was embedded in her forehead, which later required removal and three stitches for the wound. She also received several bruises and is in good condition now as Castro County Hospital and improving although she is in traction for the broken thigh.

Mr. and Mrs. Brewer live directly across the street from the Richardsons and the child had ridden her tricycle across the street to the Richardson home and was returning, Mrs. Noble was traveling east on the street which is also State Highway 86. The little girl will apparently have only one scar which came from the piece of gravel. She suffered no other broken skin. The little girl regained consciousness moments after the accident. She is in Castro County Hospital.

Both the tractor wheels and the trailer wheels ran squarely over the boy. He is reported in good spirits and excellent condition at Castro County Hospital.

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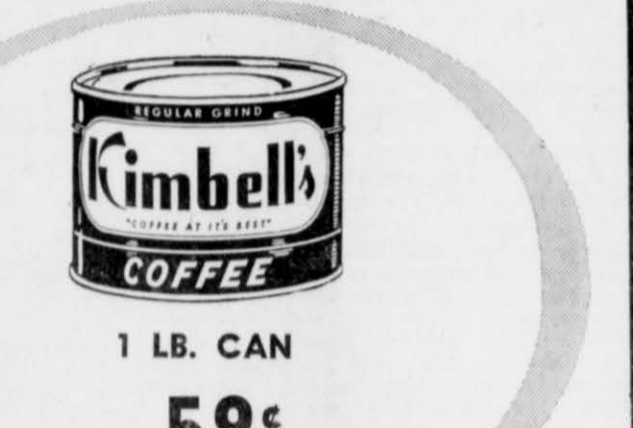

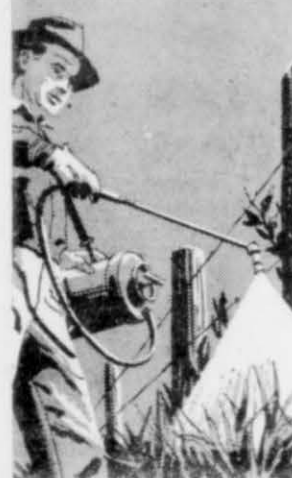
