Varied Program Is Presented at Lions Club Meet

The Ranger Lions club was host today to several interesting and distinguished visitors who brought messages of importance to the club and the city.

The first of the visitors introduced was C. W. Geue, a member of the Eastland Lions club and on the safety committee of that club. Geue is connected with the Texas Electric Service company at the Leon plant and is an ardent worker in the cause of safety every day in the week. He told the club of the plan originated by the state highway patrol whereby cities could have, under the auspices of some club or clubs, an automobile safety campaign with every car in town, if possible, driven through a safety lane composed of nine or 10 state patrolmen who are lined up in some block set aside for that purpose.

The first officer inspects the brakes, the next the lights, the next the steering gear, etc., until at the end of the line the automobile is given a sticker bearing the legend, "O. K.," or a sticker printed in red telling what is needed to make the car safe for city streets or for highways. The owner of a car that cannot pass inspection is given a summons to court with a three-day grace period in which time he may have the defect re-

paired and have the summons destroyed upon proof of such repair.

It is proposed that Ranger, Eastland and Cisco have the campaign on three successive days and let the campaign be sponsored in each town by its Lions club and Rotary club.

Colonel Brasher, Lion president, appointed a committee on the question which is to report to the club on the plan at its next meeting. The committee is composed of T. J. Anderson, Dr. W. L. Jackson and A. N. Larson. Jack Lewis Sr., of Eastland, was a visitor.

Another visitor and speaker was S. Freeland, a representative of the Home Loan association, who is in Ranger in the interest of our First Federal Savings & Loan association, recently organized.

After the introduction of the visitors the final count was taken in the membership attendance contest and the side captained by W. R. Crossley was declared winner over Floyd Killingsworth's side.
