Cotton Quotas Fixed By Bankhead Setup

Cotton growers of the Southwest are reminded that the state allotments of the 1935 quota of 10,983,264 bales have been announced by the Wallace farm administration. Texas farmers have been given a quota of 3,406,000 bales for the crop this year. Provisions of the new one-year adjustment contract should interest all Texans who are engaged in cotton production. Eccretary Wallace issued a proclamation declaring that two-thirds of the cotton producers favored continuance of the Bankhead act as shown by the referendum conducted during the mont hof December. This new contract will enable non-signers under the 1934 program to participate in the 1935 adjustment and in the The Newfangles (Mom 'n' Pop) \$130,000,000 in rentals and benefits payments to be distributed.

Texas is the banner producer of petroleum as well as the banner producer of cotton. With its new frills the Bankhead act will continue to function until the coming of the year 1936. Foundation Pattern 'A correctly fitted foundation attern is the basis for a perfectly fitted garment," states Mrs. Earl Holmes, Class II wardrobe demon strator for the Ranger Co-Workers home demonstration club. Every woman who does her own sewing or has it done, should have an individually fitted pattern. These patterns save time, material and money for the individual. Home femonstration club women are working to have one hundred per cent foundation patterns for this year and with these patterns be better dressed club women.

"Shrubs should not be set in straight rows but should be planted so that a pleasing irregular line can be kept around the shrub masses. All shrub beds should be from 4 to 6 feet wide," states Mrs. H. A. Bowers, yard demonstrator for the North Star home demonstration club.

Many native shrubs of this sec tion are as lovely as can be found anywhere and may be transplanted from the woods at small cost. 


