THREE POWERS FORM FRONT ON ARMAMENTS

PARIS, March 23.—Great Britain, France and Italy today formed a united front against German rearmament.

An official statement issued after the three-power conference said the representatives of the three governments "note with satisfaction the entire solidarity of views of their governments."

The conference was attended by French Foreign Minister Pierre Laval, British Lord Anthony Eden and Italian Foreign Undersecretary Fulvio Sivich. It was coincident with Italy's announcement she was putting 650,000 men under arms in addition to 400,000 fascist militia which are not in active service.

The representatives agreed there should be further exchange of views to the extraordinary League of Nations meeting summoned to consider Germany's violation of the Versailles treaty.

In the negotiations they will emphasize that European peace talks must proceed on the basis of the London communiqué of Feb. 3 in which France, Britain and Italy agreed on future action toward European security.

Roosevelt Policy In Arms Crisis Is Based On Counsel

WASHINGTON, March 23.—President Roosevelt's "say nothing—do nothing" policy in the present European armament crisis is based almost entirely upon the counsel of his highest military and naval advisors that "there isn't going to be any war," the United Press was informed today.

This policy may be changed at any time, it was indicated, if developments in Europe warrant, but so far all confidential reports received by the administration from its observers in the European field indicate there is considerable "air" in the unofficial reports and rumors of warlike preparations in the various areas.

The hauling committee of the cleanup campaign sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, met in the office of the secretary Friday afternoon with Wade Swift, chairman, presiding.

The committee outlined plans for taking care of the hauling work and will set the dates for the work at later date.

JURY REACHES VERDICT AFTER GUILTY PLEAS

Faces Four Other Charges of Theft and Robbery in Two Counties.

L. C. Keel, formerly of Ranger, was given 20 years in the state penitentiary by a Palo Pinto county district court jury late Friday night on a robbery charge in connection with the robbing of a filling station at Metcalf Gap on the night of Saturday, Jan. 12, 1935.

Keel, who had been missing from Ranger since the night of the robbery, was arrested last week in Oklahoma City, and was returned to Eastland county Thursday night by Steele Hill, deputy sheriff. He was transferred to Palo Pinto county for trial on the robbery charges there Friday and entered a plea of guilty. He is now being held in the city jail at Mineral Wells, Sheriff Virge Foster said Saturday afternoon, pending passage of sentence and his trial on four other charges of robbery and theft that have been filed against him in Eastland and Stephens counties.

A project of Eastland forces call for the obtaining of 6,300 acres in the Flatwood vicinity. Land approximating 2,000 acres had been secured by Rising Star.

Sentiment of the Flatwood land owners was favorable the engineer said Saturday.

"Several said they would give an option of their property," he stated.

Where fertile wheat land once lay was killed after miles of naked barrens, denuded by dust storms. Not enough grass remained in several counties to feed a single horse.

Six humans succumbed to the malady, a lung congestion resulted from air saturated with volcanic ash and which contained sand and top soil blown from the farms of Colorado, Kansas and Oklahoma and Texas Panhandles.

Keel was first arrested in connection with the robbery of the National Guard armory in Ranger on Feb. 19, 1934, though he was never indicted on that count and was later freed from jail. Ray Hamilton, Texas' most notorious outlaw since the death of Clyde Barrow and Bonnie Parker, confessed that he had a part in the Ranger National Guard armory robbery after his arrest following the robbery of the Lewisville bank.

On the night of Jan. 13, 1935, a Buick coupe was stolen at Olden and a Chevrolet coupe was stolen in Ranger. Later in the night four men robbed a filling station at Breckenridge. The same quartet was later reported to have robbed a filling station at Palo Pinto and still later reports were received in Ranger that four men had robbed a filling station at Metcalf Gap.


Ranger Patrolmen Jack Roach and Guy Pledger, believing the men were heading toward Ranger waited for them in the eastern outskirts of the city. When the car came along they took up the pursuit, chasing the four bandits into the city, where they doubled back east out Young street to Blundell and then turned southwest toward the Lone Cedar community.

Seven shots were fired from an automatic rifle—the same rifle that had been taken from Raymond Hamilton after the Lewisville bank robbery—but the coupe with its four occupants was lost in a cloud of dust on the country road.

The following morning the coupe, riddled with bullets, was found north of Olden, where it had been burned by the four robbers. A systematic search on the part of Eastland county officers resulted in the arrest of three of the men and a widespread search for Keel was started after it was confessed that he was a member of the robbery party.

Keel is still faced with four other charges, according to Sheriff Virge Foster, some in Eastland county and some in Stephens county, where one of the robbers escaped.




Famed Test Pilot Makes Last Dive
