Open Season on Utilities

(Editor's Note: The following editorial from the Lometa Reporter concerning the Rayburn Bill, now before Congress, is reprinted in full because it seems to express the general sentiment of a vast majority of the newspapers over the country).

We are neither for nor against, but it does seem like the pub lie utilities should at least be extended the same consideration of our wild animal life and there be a closed season once a year.

Just now the Rayburn bill is creating much comment. It has to do with the destroying of public utility holdings, and if it should perchance be passed, would mean the ruination of holdings of many individuals.

No one man or group of men hold the stock of the public utili ties. You will find small blocks of it among most all classes of small investors, and often it represents their life savings.

Perhaps the utilities are making money. That is after all what the most of us are working six days a week for. To be able to meet our bills and possibly lay by a little for a rainy day. But take our own situation in Lometa. We are serviced by the

Texas Power and Light Company. That is the easiest bill we have to pay, and in the face of the fact that during the past year other commodities which we are forced to buy have doubled and in many instances more than doubled, the current rate is the same.

There is another little item. The utilities and the railroads pay the big lump of our taxes. For every customer in the State, the Texas Power and Light Company pays 60 cents, or more, per month taxes, federal and state, county and school. In other words, for every customer they service for a year they pay taxes to the

Unfortunately we are not at present blessed with a gas utility, but if we were we would find that our yearly fuel bill would be cut in half, and at the same time be more convenient.

Perhaps the small newspapers may be a shade biased in favor of public utilities. But take our own case. The Texas Power and Light Company spend more for advertising than any other two firms. You may counter with argument that this is hush money. Well it certainly does buy lots of beans and hush the clamor of many bill holders.

Getting back to the Rayburn bill. It simply means government control of the utilities, and you all know what happened when the government undertook to operate the railroads during the war We believe that everyone should protest to their congressman and insist that they vote against this bill.

We are 100 per cent for the administration, but not for their mistakes. Right now we are forced to charge code prices for printing, and at the same time the government is an unfair competitor, in that they will print and deliver envelopes to business firms cheaper than we can buy the blank stock.

Perhaps if the government was run by men who looked to howing a profit instead of telling other folks how to run their business we would not be facing the deficit we are. In the words of a man we heard the other day; "Doctor, heal

Farmers Having Better Business, Grocer Head Says

HOUSTON-Higher prices paid to farmers for their products is responsible for better business among independent growers of the nation, according to J. Frank Grimes, Chicago, president of the Independent Grocers' Alliance of America.

Grimes, on a tour of the counry, came to Houston from the West Coast.



Way to Combat Crime Is By Central Power

A democracy based on a system of local governments as nearly independent as possible is apt to run into a whole chain of headaches when it sets out to combat modern

To fight crime in this day and age you have to have a centralized authority which can strike anywhere in the country without regard to state and city boundaries.

To retain democracy in its traditional form, you want just as little centralization as possible.

In other words, the set-up which preserves freedom the best is the very set-up which is the least efficient at fighting crooks.

We have tried to get around that of late by giving the Bureau of Investigation of the Department of Justice more powers. To an extent, this has worked very well. But it, can only be carried so far. The foundation of our police work must be the local systems-the city police force and the county sheriff's organization.

The immediate problem, then, is to find some way of federalizing our anti-crime forces without infringing upon the rights of city and state to govern themselves in the old-

If we drift too long, leaving all but strictly local affairs up to the Department of Justice, we are apt to wake up some day and find that cities and states have surrendered to the federal government more powers than it is good for them to surrender. It might be wise to look into this Ontario proposal pretty thoroughly.

New Youth Problem Faced By Parents

The falling birth rate is apt to do a good many things to America before it gets through. One of its unexpected by-products may be the emergence of a vast race of spoiled children-

This quaint development is suggested by Prof. William F. Ogburn of the University of Chicago, in an article in the current issue of the magazine Better Times.

Professor Ogburn figures it on a straight supply and demand basis. The supply of children will decrease-or, at any rate, will not increase at the old-time rate. The demand, i nthe sense of the love of parents for their children, will remain just as high as it ever was, and will perhaps even increase.

The result will be that the child will be appreciated

As Professor Ogburn remarks:

"It seems probable that the child will receive more attention. With some groups that will be good for the child, no doubt. In many cases this out-of-the-ordinary attention may make the child too self-centered.'


You can carry it still farther. Every parent knows that one of the most powerful tools in the molding of a child's character is the bestowal of praise and glame for the child's acts. Where children are prized more highly, comparatively, it is logical to expect that the scales will be unbalanced, the doses of blame will be diminished, and the amounts of praise increased.

Tomorrow's child, then, seems destined to approach manhood and womanhood under something of a handicap. And this rather gloomy forecast is just one more reminder that modern times seem constantly conspiring to place new responsibilities on the shoulders of parents.

This wil increase hlis precocity, but he wil not get those subtle, toughening influences which come from constant

association with youngsters of his own age. There was a time when the parent's hardest problem was to find some way to feed, clothe, and educate a constantly growing brood. Shrinkage in the family's size is apparently going to replace that problem with a new one.

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


