#### Celaya Demands Showdown on Hot Oil Rumors

Rep. Augustine Celaya of Cameron county is responsible for a resolution for appointment of a special committee of five to investigate charges that thousands of barrels of ellegal hot oil were run daily from the Texas fields. And why not? Many charges have been made from time to time that thousands of barrels of hot oil were being produced daily in violation of orders of the Texas railroad commission and that the allegations "have been made, reiterated and circulated by officials of the government of the United States, by magazines read throughout the nation and by world leaders in the oil industry." Moreover, the Celaya resolution pointed out the state railroad commission lacks the official personnel necessary to make the inquiry.

Attorney General William McGraw has able assistants in the fields. Merton L. Harris, assistant attorney general, is on the greasy firing line in East Texas field. Those who know him best say that Harris is going all the road. And he admits that it is a tough road to walk. Prosecutions have been successful in many cases. Jail sentences have been meted out. Injunctions have been issued-and violated. Violators of the federal and state set-ups have been hauled over the coals. Oil Administrator Harold L. Ickes has his men in the field. Law violators should be punished. They should not be slipped on the wrsit. They should be given iail or prison terms. They should be taught to respect the pipe theft. majesty of law. They should be taught to bow to its de-

#### Panhandle Greatest Natural Gas Reservoir in the World

Amarillo natural gas field has a sufficient reserve to last from 50 to 75 years at the 1934 rate of gas withdrawal. Raymond G. Moore is the Kansas state geologist. He submitted his evidence to the Kansas state corporation commission. He made his estimate on studies requested by the commission. Moreover, the estimate was given in an investigation of gas rates charged by the Cities Service Gas company. He estimated the reserve of the Amarillo-Panhandle field at 38 % trillion M. C. F. (millions cubic feet) ... Geologist Moore declared most emphatically that the life of the Amarillo-Panhandle field "would be extended if measures to conserve the supply now before the Texas legislature, or rather their geologists have estimated the life of the Texas field at about 10 years.
