

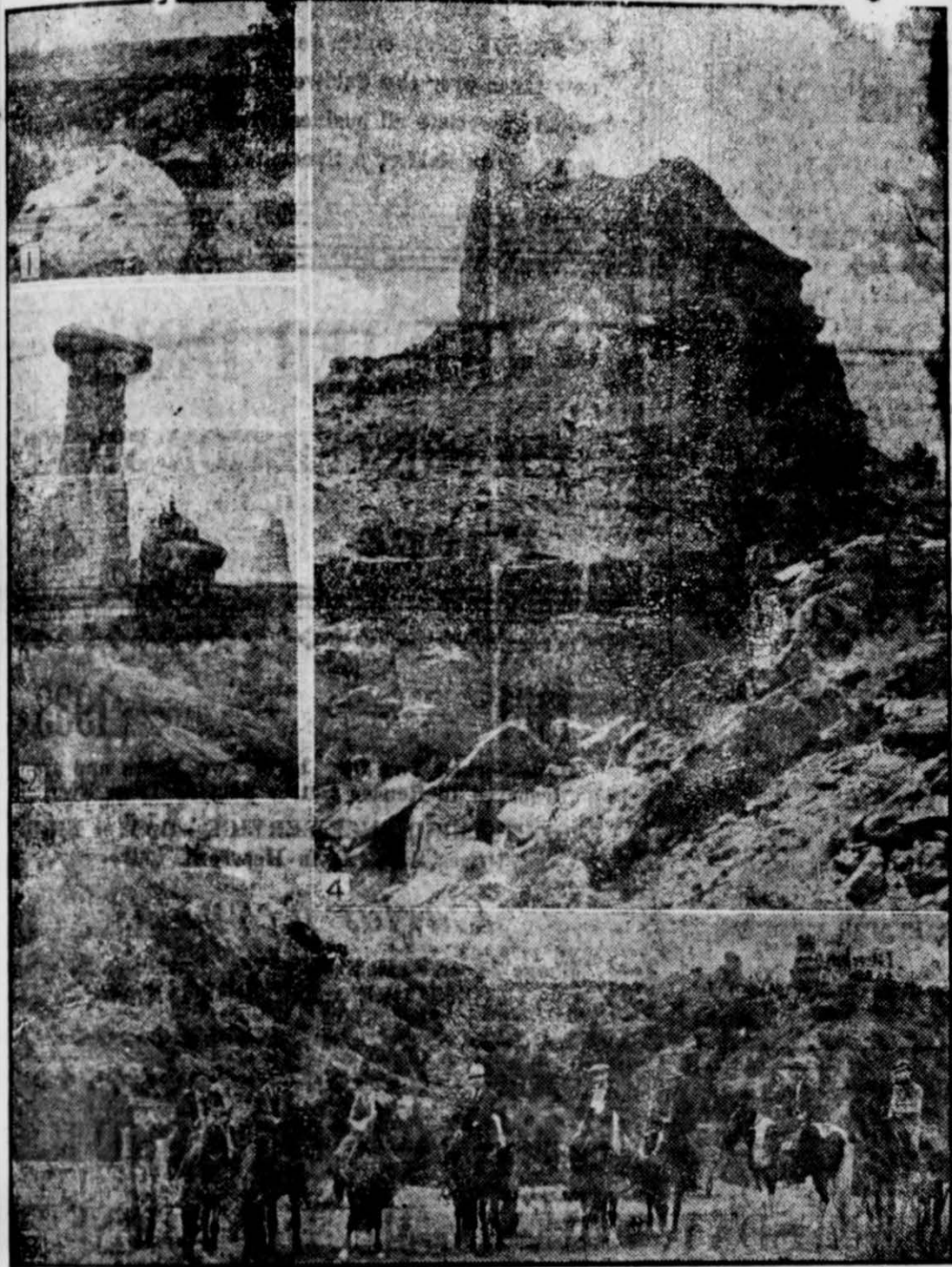

Loan Period Extended For Wheat Farmers

The period for receiving applications for summer fallow and winter wheat loans in the Emergency Crop Loan Act at Dallas has been extended to the close of business July 15, according to announcement today by Charles W. Merrill, Regional Manager of region comprising Texas, Mexico and Arizona.

Emergency Crop loans for the purpose of summer fallow and winter wheat seed are available in certain counties of Texas, Mexico and Arizona where wheat is grown commercially. Regulations provide a maximum allowance for fallowing of 50 per acre, and for the purchase of seed wheat not to exceed \$1.00 per acre.

The loans are made under the regulations relative to Emergency Crop Loans issued March 1, the present year and are renewed and handled in the same manner through County Loan Committees and Field Supervisors. Security for the loan is first lien on all crops to be planted and harvested on the land described in the mortgage.

The Dallas office is also making Emergency Feed Loans to enable farmers to purchase feed for farm livestock in certain counties of the region. Applications for loans in Castro County are being taken by S. M. Headley in the County agent's office.

ALL-RED PAST 50 MARK IN CAMPAIGN SPEECHES

Crockett, Tex., June 20.—Eastern Texas beckoned Attorney General James V. Allred, campaigning for Governor, as he sped past the fifty-speech mark in exactly three weeks of a vibrant, challenging crusade for a progressive government.

He was a guest here Wednesday night, the climax of a day's schedule featuring public rallies at Ceterville and Madisonville. His address here was the ninth speech of the week. He will speak at Dallas Friday night.

Allred's straight-forward manner of discussing "the fundamental truths about the people's government" enabled him to score consistently in his campaign tour of West Texas. Political observers in the Panhandle-Plains section of the State declared his program to be "full of common-sense, rational and practical."

Allred's fast-moving, hard-hitting campaign in West Texas is being repeated this week in the eastern half of the State.

Candidate For Justice Supreme Court Was Here Last Monday

Judge John H. Sharp of Ellis County, was in Dimmitt Monday in behalf of his candidacy for Associate Justice of the Supreme Court to succeed Thomas B. Greenwood, who will not run for reelection.

Judge Sharp is now on the Supreme Court Commission of Appeals having been appointed to that place both by the Governor and the Supreme Court. He has been actively engaged in the practice of law in Ellis county for 25 years.

There is no branch of work coming before the Supreme Court with which he is not familiar from actual daily experience.

Judge Sharp is being supported by bar associations over the State and particularly by those in the Panhandle.

He is the only candidate for the Supreme Court that has visited Dimmitt this year.

Presbyterians To Have Pastor For Summer Months

F. Louis Grafton was in Dimmitt Tuesday arranging to re-establish regular Sunday services for the local Presbyterian church which has been inactive for some time.

Rev. Grafton is a student in the Chicago Presbyterian Theological Seminary and will be in charge of the local work until fall.

He is a graduate of Trinity University at Wabasha, Minn.

Rev. J. Hoytt Boles, pastor of the Presbyterian church at Tullia accompanied Rev. Grafton to Dimmitt and visited with local members of the Presbyterian denomination.

Services will be held Sunday morning at the local church at 11 a. m. and Sunday evening at 8:30 p. m.

"It is our purpose to determine if there is a need here for the Presbyterian church," Rev. Boles said, "and as we have a building here, now will be an excellent time to find out. We have a nucleus of about thirty members around which to build. If at the close of the summer months we find that we fill a definite, needed place, then plans can be made accordingly. We will enter the field in a true Christian spirit of co-operation. We earnestly request all members of the denomination to be present for both Sunday services and cordially invite visitors."

Low Price Is Disappointing to Plains Farmers

Truck loads of wheat began to wend their way to Castro county elevators this week as the 1934 harvest was begun.

The most disappointing factor this year is the price, grain bringing 65c a bushel.

A great deal of Castro county wheat was destroyed by hail in the last three weeks.

Many farmers are expressing disappointment at their yields saying that fields which were expected to produce 12 to 15 bushels are making from 5 to 8. Other expected yields are running in proportion.

The price has continued steadily downward for the past two weeks in spite of the fact that the nation will produce its shortest crop in years and that the surplus will be wiped out in all probability.

No reason has been offered for this paradox.

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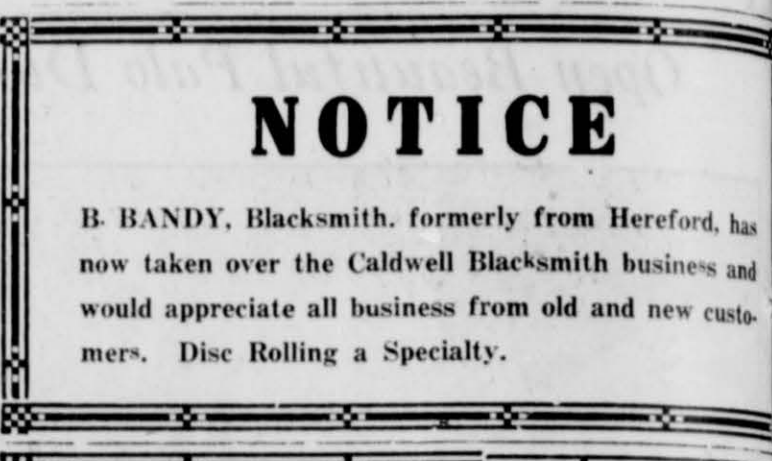

Farm Notes

Anyone having old cotton on hand should get in touch with the County Agent as applications for tags for old cotton have been received and all cotton must be tagged before being sold tax free. So far no details concerning the Bankhead Bill have been received.

According to advice received this week from the State Board of Review, the work of reviewing the Corn-Hog contracts in this district has been started and word is expected at an early date to go ahead and complete the signing up of contacts in this county.

Measurement of land under wheat contracts have been finished in all except one of the ten districts of the county and work of computing acreages from the measurements will be completed in a few days. Following the completion of the checking of the measurements the necessary compliance papers will be filled out for the signatures of the growers and this will be carried out early in July.

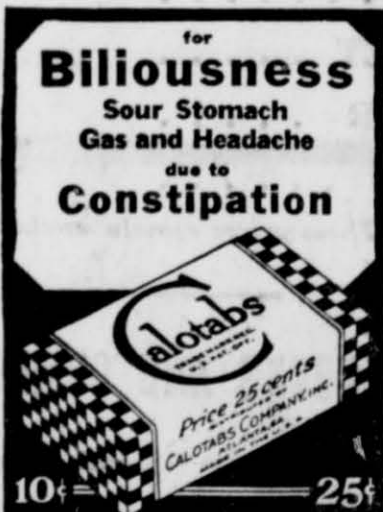
