Thomas Midgley, Jr., chairman of the board of the American Chemical society, took a little flier into the fuure at a recent convention of chemists in New York. He resaw some startling things.

A century from now, he predicted, the discovery of w sources of energy will have made inter-planetary ravel possible. It will also have revolutionized industry to uch extent that two hours will be the maximum length of he working day. Such maladies as cancer, influenza, and pidemic diseases generally will be abolished.

This, he added, was only a starter. We shall be raisng chickens the size of pigs and they will be laying eggs he size of footballs. People won't go to war any more, ecause defensive weapons will be strong enough to make ny offensive impossible.

Television will be perfected to such an extent that deleates to national conventions will attend by staying right 1 their own homes-which ought to be a break, in several

All this adds up to something remarkably like a pipe ream. But the odd thing about it is that none of these redictions is impossible. A century from now Mr. Midgley 1ay look like an exceedingly conservative and cautious rophet. In the material world, the race is able to do just bout anything that it can imagine.

And that emphasizes the strange new condition under which the race is laboring these days. Its greatest probems are no longer connected with the struggle to master he physical environment; they have to do with the intanibles thinks like economics, social organizations, and aternational relations.

We know, nowadays, that eventually we shall abolish isease and hunger and all manner of scarcity, nd that we an equip ourselves with almost any kind of mechanical adget that seems desirable. The big question is what we re going to do with ourselves after we make those ad-
