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New Material for Speakership

Coke Stevenson having decided two terms is enough for him as speaker of the Texas house, three, four or five able young members have emerged as prospective leaders of the race for speaker to succeed him in the next regular legislature.

Rep. Sidney Latham of Longview, Rep. Homer Leonard of McAllen, Rep. R. Emmett Morse of Houston are regarded as likely entrants. Rep. Bullock Hyder of Denton is considered a potential candidate. Rep. R. W. Calvert of Hillsboro, who ran Stevenson a close race in January, is a logical candidate next time, if he should conclude to make the race.

Leonard perhaps got a shade of the start for the race. He is chairman of the appropriations committee, chief committee post of the present session.

Morse remained a prospective candidate for speaker of this legislature until Stevenson's second-term race was formed.

Latham's service, in his first term and in this second term, has been marked by a high order of ability. He is among those who, including others in this future list of campaign prospects, are known as working members—those who take the drudgery of the session seriously, sit up until midnight in windy committee hearings, and study bills and listen to speeches. Latham, coming from the oil country, has given special attention to petroleum legislation.

It is suggested as a possibility that if Lieut. Gov. Woodul of Houston seeks re-election, Rep. Morse might stay out of the race on the theory that Houston would otherwise claim to furnish presiding officers for both houses.

Hyder is serving a second term and is a consistent and faithful worker. Calvert's popularity and leadership were recognized in the big vote he got in January; and he has won other friends in that the rivalry of the campaign did not survive the vote.

All this group are young men: Latham is 27; Leonard, 35; Morse, 39; Hyder, 27, and Calvert 29.

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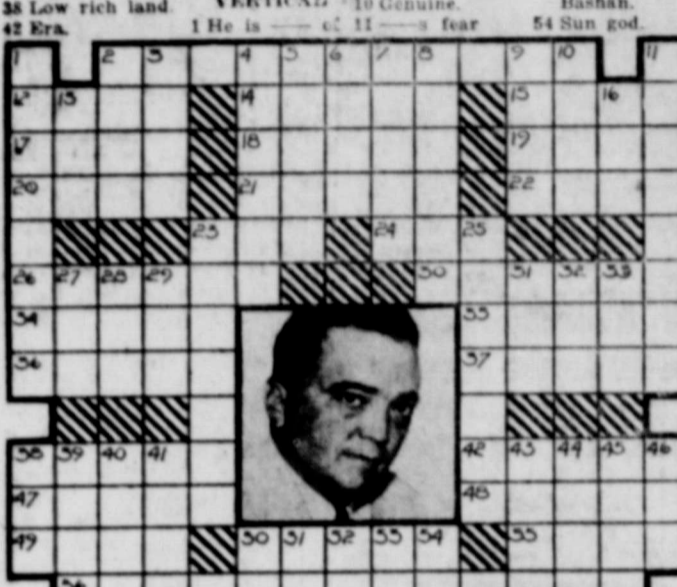

There was an increase from 616 suicides in 1930 to 772 in 1931 and a further increase to 828 in 1932, which was the greatest number of suicides that occurred in Texas during the past five years. Following 1932, suicides have decreased from 828 that year to 722 in 1933, with a further decrease to 105 in 1934. While suicides have decreased, there has been a gradual increase in fatal accidents, which totaled 3,112 in 1930 as compared with 4,013 fatal accidents in 1934. The increase in accidental deaths has been closely associated with the use of motor-driven vehicles. In 1931, there were 23 deaths due to collisions between automobiles and railroads, as compared with 69 similar deaths in 1934. Fatal accidents in air transportation increased from 27 in 1932 to 46 in 1934.'

# Littlefield New Broom Corn Area

 LITTLEFIELD, Tex. — Local farmers plan to make this section the leading broom corn area of Texas as preparations to plant between 10,000 and 12,000 acres in the crop about the middle of this month get under way.  
 The broom corn crop was practically a failure on the South Plains last year, only 15 car loads being shipped out. This year if there is a fair yield, about 250 cars should be shipped, it was said.  
 The increased acreage is due largely to the increased price for broom corn as a result of last year's near crop failure. Last season the price rose to \$160 per ton compared with \$35 per ton in 1932.
