**Col. Lawrence Westbrook Given Important Post**

Col. Lawrence Westbrook is a citizen of Waco, McLennan county. He is a native Texan who has administered the federal government's rural rehabilitation program. Now a Washington correspondent of the Waco Times-Herald announces that Westbrook will be contact man between the states and the works progress administration under the new relief works set-up. According to the Washington correspondent in his new position the colonel will act as right hand man to Harry L. Hopkins, "work progress administrator who is admittedly the dominant federal figure in the first stage of the new \$4,000,000,000 works program."

The Texan's official title will be assistant to the administrator of works progress and as his first official duty he has been assigned to the job of preparing information which is to be given to state works progress administrators when they meet at Washington June 17 for the first round table conference on the new program.

Col. Westbrook has been in public life for years. He was a valued member of the Texas legislature for several terms. He has held important jobs since the coming of the Roosevelt administration. Now he has been promoted to a very important post. Texas has not been overlooked by FDR or those who are close to the chief magistrate.

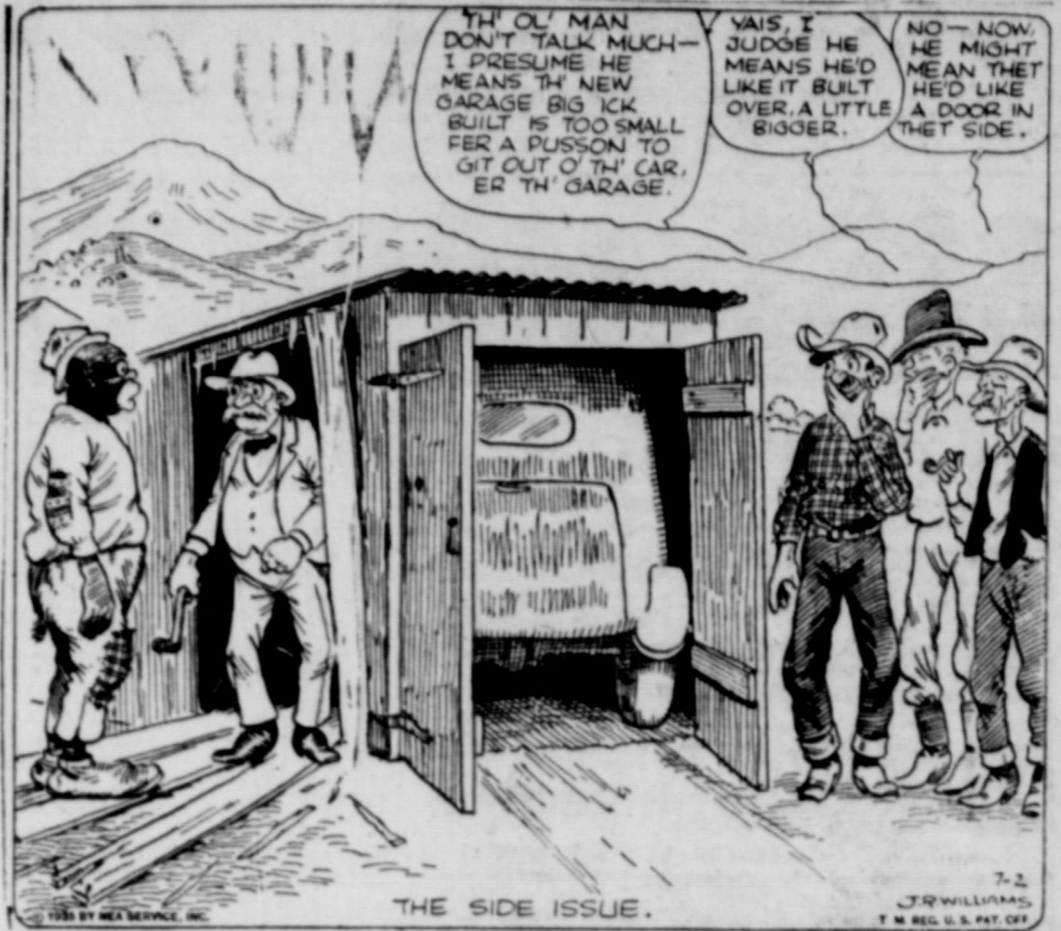
