The pool is now affording an ideal place for swimming, it was pointed out, as the water is kept very fresh and is changed often. Amusement equipment is to be added soon, which will add to the entertainment offered by the pool.

### Federal School's Electrical Class Showing Progress

F. L. Kelly, electrical instructor at the federal adult school, announced Thursday that a total of 300 students are taking the courses in electrical electricity at present. These days are being spent on the fundamental principles of electricity and the pupils are to be completed each can be recommissioned as a first class mechanic. Classes meet each night in the hall of the high school building, which will soon move to the Revolving, where practical electrical work will be given and demonstrated. The actual experience will be available for all members of the school. It was stated today by the instructor that R. F. Holloway had been issued certificates of competency for the electrical work.

### POLICE SEEK SOLUTION TO DEATH PUZZLE

CHICAGO, July 11.—Police today raked through a tangle of clues in an effort to pierce the mystery surrounding the murder of Ervin Lang, whose legless, garroted body was found in a marsh near Hammond, Ind., Tuesday night. The mutilated torso, wrapped in towels and newspapers was identified by Lang's sweetheart, Josephine McKinley. Police said they believed Lang had been strangled in Chicago and his legs hacked off to facilitate removal of it to "gangster" cemetery, the lonely swamp where three of Al Capone's gang were dumped. Four persons were held in connection with the slaying.

### States Departments Have Ball Teams

AUSTIN, Tex.—Pat Dooley, chief clerk of the State Comptroller's Department, is the Judge Kenesaw Mountain Landis of the State's softball league. Dooley is arbiter of all disputes that arise among the "A" and "B" teams of the league. The "A" teams are made up of employees of departments housed in the state capitol. "B" teams are for departments in other buildings. Arbitrator Dooley's only ruling so far has been to hold an employee of the branch post office in the state capitol ineligible to play on the Board of Control team. The league has some good timber. J. W. Townsend, former T. C. U. star, plays on the Secretary of State's team. Ney (Red) Sheridan, Sweetwater, University of Texas star, is on the railroad commission team, and Charles Winton, another University of Texas man, is on the Comptroller's team.

### Commissioners In Crab Eating Contest

HOUSTON, Tex.—County commissioners Tom Graham and Bill Tautenhahn vied with each other recently in a crab-eating contest, with County Judge H. H. Ward as unofficial referee. The two commissioners leisurely munched their crabs in anticipation of a long drawn out contest. The affair was ended when the cafe owner ran out of crabs. A checkup revealed that Judge Ward had eaten more crabs than either of the contestants. Besides Commissioner Tautenhahn was tendered a bill for \$10.95, cost of the food.

### U. S. INFORMS ITALY OF COUNTRY'S MISGIVINGS IN THE ETHIOPIAN SITUATION

WASHINGTON, July 11.—The United States has informed Italy that this country would view with misgivings any steps taken by Italy in Abyssinia which would lead to actual war, it was learned today. Secretary of State Cordell Hull orally expressed this government's views to the Italian ambassador, Augusto Rosso, when the latter called at the state department to inform the secretary of his plans to return to Rome for a brief visit. It was understood Hull also repeated to Rosso practically the same sentiments expressed in Hull's recent note to the Abyssinian emperor, Haile Selassie. These words to the effect that the two countries should refer the dispute again to the League of Nations and reiterated the hope that they would not resort to war.

LONDON, July 11.—In the most momentous speech since he assumed control of the British foreign office, Sir Samuel Hoare today disclosed a sudden change in policy toward the Ethiopian war crisis, admitted justification for certain Italian claims against Abyssinia but promised every effort to avert war. Sir Samuel also announced a secret move to end the war threat was underway. Hoare's veiled reference to the peace plan was regarded as confirmation that Britain, France and Italy are preparing for a conference to avert the outbreak of war as outlined by Joseph Avenol, secretary of the League of Nations.

The high points of the British foreign policy as outlined were: 1. Great Britain admits Italy's need for expansion and supports Mussolini in some of his criticisms against Ethiopia. 2. Britain will not maintain an isolated policy but will accept any mode or means offered under treaty or the League of Nations machinery to avert war. 3. Britain has no aspirations in Africa. 4. Britain has not asked and has no intention of asking France to join her in any blockade against Italy and all such rumors are without foundation.

### White Man's Customs Embarrass Indians

POLSON, Mont.—Seven years ago, Louie Hammer and Elizabeth Woodcock obtained a marriage license. A few days ago, Indian service agents visited the Hammer tepee and asked embarrassing questions. A few hours later, they appeared before Mayor J. H. Cline with the Louie and Elizabeth, and the formalities — by conducting the marriage ceremony.

### Chickens Hold Secret Of Gold Mine Site

ST. HYACINTHE, Que. J. A. E. Morin, St. Joseph de Yamaska poultryman, is keeping a close watch on the movement of his chickens in the hope that they will lead him to a rich gold strike. While preparing a fowl for the market, Morin found a gold nugget about the size of a bean in its gullet. He believes that if he follows his flocks long enough he will find out where the chicken picked up the gold.

### Corcoran Denial Is Upheld Today

WASHINGTON, July 11.—Dr. Ernest Gruening, director of insular possessions, today supported Thomas Corcoran's denial that he threatened to halt the Passamaquoddy power project in Maine if Representative Ralph Brewster, Rep., Me., voted against the utilities "death sentence."

### Wheat Prices Drop In Chicago Pits

CHICAGO, July 11.—Wheat dropped more than three cents a bushel at the opening of the Board of Trade, but recovered two cents of the loss. The government crop report was the chief factor in precipitating the early break but this was somewhat offset by bullish weather reports.

### Desperate Ethiopia Musters Forces For War



Barefooted men carry deadly automatic rifles "into action" during maneuvers.

"War! War! War!" Five thousand Black Shirts who volunteered for duty against Ethiopia roared their fighting enthusiasm at Premier denito Mussolini. He had just assured them that "we have decided on the struggle and we will carry it to the end... The decision is irrevocable." Arrayed against them will be the fury of Ethiopia's army of paroxysms, mustered from the equatorial jungles and equipped with a motley array of modern and ancient weapons. Trained and partly officered by European experts during the long months of diplomatic negotiations, the black tribesmen far outnumber the Italian forces, just as they did at Adowa, in 1896, when the Italians were repulsed. Here cameras highlight Ethiopia's fighting forces contrasting their sprucely uniformed and equipped divisions with units that rely on fighting frenzy, native courage and outmoded weapons to overwhelm foes.

### FOUR SINCLAIR MEN MOVED TO NEW LOCATIONS

Four employees of the Sinclair-Prairie company at Eastland were absent from their desks Thursday, following transfer to new locations. W. E. Storey, chief clerk for the company in this district, was transferred to Breckenridge, as well as Bert Jones, clerk in the production department. Jewel Sumrell, also a clerk in the same department at Eastland, was shifted to Cross Plains. E. L. McMillen of Ranger, who worked out of Eastland, has assumed the post of district superintendent with headquarters at Breckenridge. The former district superintendent, E. M. Bass, has assumed a similar post at Troup. Transfer of the employees was said to be the result of a trade of properties with the Texas Pacific Coal & Oil company. Those remaining in the force either working at or out of Eastland include: C. V. Kiesinger, Jack Rankin, engineering department; John Mouser, Bill Phelps, scouts; Steve Gilbert, telegrapher, and Walter Clark, land department.

### Virgin Island Probe Recessed

WASHINGTON, July 11.—Senate democratic leaders today recessed investigation of Governor Paul Pearson's administration of the Virgin Islands without revealing whose side President Roosevelt had taken in the dispute. Parties to the controversy conferred separately today with President Roosevelt. Millard Tydings of the senate committee recessed the hearing when he returned to the capital. He said it would be resumed on call of the chair.

### OVERFLOW GAS TEST IS BEING MADE IN AREA

Completion of a fourteen county district test of daily overflow gas production was being made Thursday by Texas Railroad Commission engineers in the office at Eastland. Engineers in charge of the work in Eastland and other counties were H. C. Stipp, division engineer with headquarters in Big Spring, Harry W. Elliott of Austin, and D. D. Vernell. Eastland county was the last county checked in the district. Counties in the Texas Railroad Commission district 7 include Hamilton, Stephens, Shackelford, Coleman, Callahan, Fisher, Haskell, McCulloch, Young, Jack and Palo Pinto.

### Miss Laura Ingalls Seeking New Record

KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 11.—Miss Laura Ingalls, seeking the women's east-west airplane record, was thought to be southeast of Kansas City at 10 a. m. today, well on her way to Los Angeles. No one has sighted her plane since it left Newark.

### Wider Uses Found For Insulin Treatment

TORONTO, Ont.—Insulin has many more uses than that of treatment for diabetes, Dr. C. H. Best, professor of physiology at the University of Toronto, and co-discoverer of insulin, told the Canadian Health association. "The stinging sensation which results from the application of insulin in non-diabetic cases provides definite therapeutic value," he said. "Cases of insanity where the patient refuses to eat also have been aided by small doses of insulin, for it stimulates hunger. Persons afflicted with anaesthesia have also been assisted to recover."

### ELEVEN DEAD OVER TEXAS IN RECORD HEAT

Five Texas convicts among victims of heat wave over state. Texans looked with faint hope of thundershowers for relief today from an oppressive heat wave which has taken a toll of 11 lives in the state. Five convicts on prison farms have died in the last few days. Another is in critical condition. Two men have been heat fatalities in Dallas, one near Sherman and three at Texarkana. Lexie Jones, 42, of San Antonio died today at the South Texas Coastal area, was the fifth convict to succumb to the heat in a week. One negro man died Tuesday and three white prisoners the same day. A sixth convict, Clarence Simmons of Oklahoma, was in critical condition in the prison hospital at Eastham prison farm.

### STATE GETTING REVENUE FROM SEIZED OIL

AUSTIN, July 11.—Attorney General William McCraw today set a year as the time it will take to clean up "hot oil" and end "other abuses." He challenged those who complained of confiscation to suggest a better plan. To those who say the state is not getting full value of confiscated oil he replied that if Texas is not getting all it is getting more than Texas has obtained before. He exhibited a check for \$253,200 delivered yesterday as confiscation suit receipts.

### Power Project Advocates Win Comeback Today

WASHINGTON, July 11.—President Roosevelt's power program advocates today scored a comeback when the house approved the TVA amendments extending the scope of the administration's "electric rate yardstick." Speaker Joseph W. Byrnes announced the vote as 277 to 100. The final vote came after the house rejected a republican motion to recommend the bill to the military affairs committee to assert a provision which would have prevented TVA to sell surplus power below cost after July 1, 1938.

### Eastland Baby's Funeral Is Held

Funeral services for James Loyd Parsons, 2, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Parsons, Jr., of Eastland, who died Wednesday afternoon, were scheduled to be held from the Church of God at Eastland Thursday afternoon at 5:30 with Rev. W. E. Moore, ex-pastor of the Church of Christ officiating. Interment was to be held in Eastland cemetery. The child died from an unascertained illness, it was reported. Hamner Undertaking Company of Eastland was in charge of funeral arrangements.

**Latest Texas Highway News From Washington**

Now that the Colorado River Authority is a fact and not a fiction the building of highways is a topic that is uppermost in Texas. The Associated Press carried the announcement from the capital of the nation that the Texas Highway commission was "thoroughly assured Thursday night that it could inaugurate a \$35,000,000 highway program in a few days." Thomas McDonald, chief of the federal bureau of roads, declared he hoped to make available about \$22,000,000 as Texas' share of the highway and grade crossing program from the works relief fund. This he said would be supplemented by the states regular \$7,500,000 for federal aid highways and a like contribution by Texas. Furthermore, he told the delegation from Texas—Texas senators and representatives and hundreds of road enthusiasts—he hoped to place in the hands of the commission before they leave a definite plan of procedure where 15,000 persons on relief in Texas could be put to work on highway improvements on per-man of \$1400 as established by Work Relief Administrator Harry Hopkins.

man would eat it, just remember that Chinese children also are taught that some of your food is equally dreadful and that nobody but a barbarian would touch it. Hong Kong, in the opinion of many, is rapidly becoming the gastronomic center of the world. For generations the art of Chinese cooking has been in a class by itself. It is well known to anyone who has eaten a full 32-course Chinese dinner, that at the end of it he does not feel stuffed or uncomfortable. There is such an incredible variety and each ingredient so carefully thought out, that the menu is a mystery of perfect balance. The constant drinking throughout the meal of chrysanthemum tea and other herb concoctions, is also conducive to the best digestion. The preparation and blending of foods is to the Chinese chief what mixing prescriptions is to the chemist. Ching explained briefly the making of bird nest soup from swallows' nests imported from North China. "The birds use their own saliva to cement the nest, and this is the part selected for the soup," he says. Shark fins are very expensive. They vary in price from a few dollars a catty (about a pound and a third) to \$60 for a whole fin. The finest shark fin soup requires at least three days preparation to bring out the full delicacy of flavor. Rice birds are so small that if they over-exercise in trying to escape, they shrink too much to be any good for eating when caught. It is essential, Ching explained, to snatch them as they fly low over the rice fields. In that way they are snared in nets by the hundred. Roast duck-skin, another delicacy, is as brown and crisp as a fresh potato chip—and there is never a pin-feather left in the epidermis. 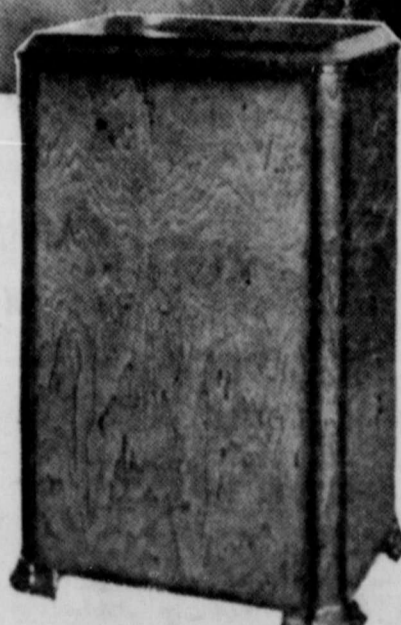
