#### Eclipse of Moon July 15-16 Total In Two Americas

By United Press WASHINGTON, July 13 .-Romance will have to do with July 15-16, when that body is scheduled to disappear in a total eclipse.

Both North and South America, except the extreme northern part of North America, will be in the best position for observation of the "celestial show," described as "one of the finest astronomical events of the year.'

The eclipse will start at 9:15 p. m. (E.S.T.) and will last about five hours. By 11:09 p. m. all of the moon's surface will have passed into the shadow of the earth and the total phase of the eclipse will start. It will last one hour and 40 minutes or within four minutes of the maximum possible duration of

a total eclipse of the moon. Near 12:50 a. m., July 16, the total phase will end and the moon gradually will emerge from the earth's shadow.

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#### **Dictators Still Await** Their Crucial Test

The lost liberties of the world have been ost only for a while, and not for keeps. So says Dr. Ellis Paxon Oberholtzer, Philadelphia historian, in an address before the University of Virginia Institute of Public Affairs.

It is Dr. Oberholtzer's notion that we are now progressing through a painful cycle in human affairs in which, distressed by the fix into which we have got ourselves, we are looking for miracles. Being unable to accomplish any miracles of our own volition, he continues, we tend to turn to dictators who promise that they can do what we cannot do.

We get, therefore, in one country after another, dictatorship.

Italy puts its fate in the hands of Mussoolini, Germany follows Hitler, Russia clings to Stalin, and other nations find themselves turning toward simiar men. And out of it. all has grown a feeling that the democratic idea has been worked out, that people are not and cannot be capable of solving their own problems n a complex modern world, and that a regime in which there is a relentless driving power applied to the attainment of some simply and clearly defined goal is the only regime that offers mankind any hope.

It is precisely in this connection that Dr. Oberholtzer is worth listening to; for he insists that this is only a passing phase, and not a new, long-time trend in human affairs.

Eventually, he predicts, the dictators will demonstrate that they no more possess the magic password to a better world than the people en masse possess it; and when that day comes, humanity will shake itself vgiorously and the dictators will go flying off like drops of water from the coat of an energetic spaniel.

"The new tyrant," he says, "wl go the way of the old and take the same place in the history of man's movements on this earth."

Perhaps the greatest danger we run nowadays is the danger of growing discouraged by the progressive failure, in one country after another, of parliamentary institutions and democratic processes. By growing discouraged we prepare the way for the destruction of such institutions and processes in our own country.

When we take the long view, and reflect that this reversion to dictatorship in the modern world is still approaching its crucial test, that in the long run it will stand or fall by the amount of plain human happiness it is able to bring to the ordinary citizen-when we do that, we are able to see that our own democracy is by no means discredited or outworn.

#### Behind All Defenses, Gold Must Be Safe!

Official announcement that most of Uncle Sam's huge gold supply will be transferred to an underground vault at an army post in Kentucky might lead one to suspect that the enemy, if not actually at the gates, is anyway at the house next door and coming fast.

Caution is probably a praiseworthy quality in any national government. But this business of hustling our gold off to the inland, on the ground that coastal cities are subject to attack by enemy raiders, seems to be carrying caution to a fault.

We have been spending somewhere between \$300,000,-000 and \$400,000,000 a year on our navy, of late and from all accounts it seems to be in pretty fair shape. If our gold reserve remained in Washington and we got into a war and the enemy decided to invade the continental United States -something which no enemy in his senses would dream of doing, probably-it would first be necessary for this enemy to sink our fleet, lock, stock and barrel.

The fleet sunk-and naval strategists agree that there is no fleet in existence that could successfully attack our fleet on our own side of the Atlantic-there would still remain our army air force.

You may recall that elaborate plans were drawn up by the army not long ago for concentrating our planes in such a way that a vast horde of them could swoop down out of the sky on any invader. Clearly, the enemy would have to bring something like a thousand fighting planes of his own before he could get within shouting distance of the treasury's gold vaults in Washington.

We have, also, certain coast defense forts, on which much money has been expended. 

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
