Big Promising Market Lies Ahead of Us

While congressmen, lobbyists and innocent bystanders continue to wrangle over the way in which Congress was or was not persuaded to knock out the "death sentence" in the utility holding companies bill, the rest of us are apt to overlook the fact that whether we use private or public capital we are going to have to build some new power generating plants in the near future.

Harold Ward outlines the potential power shortage in an article in a recent issue of the New Republic. He reports that a federal power survey showed the following

"Any resumption of normal economic activity would find our existing generating plant 4,010,000 kilowatts short of adequatt capacity . . . we would lack the power equivalent to 50 large generating stations, each of which would require from two to seven years to put into operation. . . . Furthermore, 68 per cent of existing plants are from 10 to 30 years old; an appalling degree of obsolescence. . . . The report estimates that 1937 power consumption will increase by about 20 per cent compared to 1929."

It makes an odd picture, somehow-industry and government wrangling over the financial set-up of the power combine, while all the while an enormous untouched power market is awaiting exploitation. And it is more or less typical of the attitude we have adopted in regard to many other phases of our economic life.

To hear the talk that has been going the rounds during the last two or three years one would suppose that the entire productive machinery of the United States would have to be put on a leash for the next generation. Cut farm production, slow down the mills, restrain the markets, don't let anyone produce any more than tomorrow's orders will take care of-that seems to be the sentiment.

And yet all the while the greatest market in the world's history lies all about us, fairly begging to be supplied!

It is, of course, a great deal easier to talk about the existence of this market than it is to equip it with the necessary purchasing power. And yet there is nothing more certain than that full buying power will eventually return -and when it does all of these restrictive devices we have been talking about will look like the left-overs of some pad dream

Our mental attitude right now is important. If we stop looking back at the restricted markets of the last few years and look ahead to the opportunities which await us, that "loss of confidence" about which people talk so much will disappear overnight.

British Hurl Gauntlet At League of Nations

An unexpected note of common sense seems to have been injected into the international situation by the report that Great Britain will quite the League of Nations if the other members of the league allow Italy to go to war with

It is a note of common sense for this reason: For just about the first time since the eague was organized, it is a suggestion from one of the principal members that the league either do the things it was drawn up to do or quit.

The British position is reported to be about as follows: If the league, organized to prevent aggressive action by any member state, fails to make at least an honest effort to prevent the Italian drive on Ethiopia, it leaves the way wide open for aggressive action by any other state.

In that case, the principal reason for the league's existence would seem to be canceled. Great Britain, threatening to withdraw if this state of affairs is allowed to develop, merely points out that in such a case the league would lose what small usefulness it has ever possessed.

From the very beginning the league has failed to live up to the expectations of its founders. This has been due to a variety of reasons, including the fact that the French have consistently tried to make of the league a super-alliance to enforce the provisions of the Versailles creaty upon Germany. But the chief reason is the simple fact that no stream can rise higher than its source.

Concerted international effort to keep one nation from taking aggressive action toward another nation may be a beautiful ideal, but it is a hard thing to obtain in a world whose principal nations have all been guilty of aggressive Cases Filed in 9.st District Court action in the past and plan to be guilty of it again in the uture.




