

#### **New War Threatens** White Man's World

Once in a while, reading casually in the day's news, a man get's a dim premonitory sense that he is watching one of the great events of history taking shape under his eyes -watching it, and lacking the knowledge to say just what it may mean, or how it may be going to develop.

You get that errie feeling now and then while reading about the preparations for war between Italy and Ethiopia.

On the surface, this is just one more in the long series of imperialistic wars by which white nations have imposed their will, their "civilization" and their manufactured goods on the colored races. Every great white nation has had such wars in tis history-England, France, Germany, Russia and, for that matter, the United States.

And yet this w war will take place under different circumstances than its predecessors. The world has changed. A cycle has come to an end, somehow.

There was a time when no one-including the colored races themselves-questioned the dominance of the white nations. The world took it for granted that the great European powers would continue to extend their sway all across Asia and Africa. The only question was which nation would dominate what territory.

would dominate what territory.

Then things began to happen. Japan fought Russia and BASEBALL won and the colored races began to discover that European civilization was not invincible, after all. The European powers then got into a great war between themselves, and proved to their subject races that they were not united after all, and that their boasted peace and order

So a ferment began, all across the globe. India's teem-China. Even the blacks of Africa began to find submission | Houston . to the white man's yoke oppressive. And Japan continued Dallas to defy the white man's world-adn got away with it.

Look at the approaching war against that background . . and then imagine what might happen if Italy, through some mischance, should lose this war that she is hurrying

There is just the outside chance that this might be the beginning of the end of the long period of white dominance; a spark to set off a blaze that would become one of the great beacon lights of history.

This is all guess-work, to be sure. But the possibility is there. It lends to dispatches about the approaching war a deep and ominous significance.

#### Sen. Poage Visions Great Steal in School Funds

Senator Bob Poage of the McLennan district is chairman of the senate committee which is investigating padding of the school census rolls. He appeared before the Kiwanis club of Waco and told members of some of the findings of the committee. He had a message it seems and ne put it over:

"In my opinion there are 200,000 names on the scholastic rolls of Texas that ought not to be there. Some of the children named were over age; some do not even exist; some are listed in two different school districts, and some university students under the scholastic age limit of 17 years are listed both in their home county and in the county where they are attending school."

He placed these charges in the record:

"This means that you are paying for something that does not exist. You are being obbed under the cloak of education, which is just as bad as being cobbed under the guise of anything else. Do not assume that the school fund, because it is for high and noole purpose, is mmune from all forms of graft, for it is not. It is your money that is being wasted. If the people take an interest in the matter locally, they will stop a lot of this padding."

Sepator Poage has a remedy for the padding. His committee has found. He suggested that the state take the scholastic census instead of local school authorities. He idvises that the census should be taken every five years and should include all children from birth to the age limit.

In this way, he said, only one census would have to be aken by the state each 10 years, for the federal census aken each 10 years could be made available to the state. He declared it is hard to get accurate census records "but nvestigation shows that all errors are not honest mis-




