



#### Joseph E. Farnsworth and His Building Career in Texas

Joseph E. Farnsworth, 73, is dead in his home at Long Beach, Calif. He was widely known in Texas and his career as a builder, civic and otherwise, began more than 50 years ago. He was a New Englander by birth. He came to Texas before he had attained his majority. He selected Austin for his home. He was a youthful reporter and bookkeeper for The Austin Statesman when Ben Thompson was chief of police and Austin was one of the wide open towns of the southwest. This at the beginning of the utility and electric age in Texas. After serving as a newspaper reporter for The Statesman and other outside papers, he joined one of the first telephone companies organized in the southwest. He began at the bottom of the ladder and worked his way to the top. He had filled every post from that of lineman to that of the general manager of the Bell system in Texas. He was a very intelligent man. He was a tireless worker. He had a faculty of making friends and as a builder and civic worker his record was never broken until he was placed on the retired list of the great organization he had served for 50 years.

Dallas had been his headquarters and home after he became an executive of the telephone company and Dallas at that time was little more than a frontier town. His activities were marvelous. He was a member of all trade activities and chambers of commerce and all fraternal and welfare organizations that flourished, prominent in the masonic world and in the civic life of Dallas, a leader in all forward movements and all building enterprises. His was a familiar face in the haunts of men in the capital of the state. 
