What Taxpayers Get, They Get in the Neck

Whenever the mills of the gods start grinding, down in Washington, the innocent little citizen who does the buying and pays the bills for the nation starts looking for a cyclone cellar, if he is wise. Judging from recent dispatches, now is the time for him to take up that quest.

For it seems to be a peculiarity of our government that mit can lend a ready ear to anyone who comes down demanding something, but gets singularly deaf when the man who has to give something lifts his voice.

The ordinary citizen-the ultimate consumer, the good old taxpayer, the man who buys what the farmer raises and the industrialist manufactures, and who kicks through with the taxes that keep the country going-has one function above all others. That is to get it in the neck.

He is the originator of the grin-and-bear-it phrase. He has to take it and he has to like it, for no one in Washington ever bothers to wield sword and buckler in his behalf.

Is there a soldiers' bonus bill in the offing? Then rush it through with a whoop! The bill can be handed to the ultimate consumer, and he lost his voice away back when the ark was a-building, so he won't say anything.

Is there a new farm plan to be devised? Then fix one that has no brake at all on the up-take, so that farmer, distributor, and processor can all get theirs. The housewife at the grocery store will foot the bill cheerfully—or at any rate, silently, which is all that counts.
