Somewhere between the ghost of Woodrow Wilson and the reincarnation of J. P. Morgan as a pal of the reporters, the Nye munitions committee investigation seems to have gotten itself left on an obscure and lonely sidetrack.

This committee, as you may recall, set out to find out just how and why America got into the World War.

2 It produced a number of headlines, shed some interesting light on the activities of high finance, and gave Mr. Morgan a chance to speak his mind about maids, leisure classes, and the chances of civilization.

But after that it seems to have vanished from sight, and the hopeful souls who expected to learn that Uncle Sam had been sold down the river by heartless bankers are getting remarkably little sustenance out of it.

Since the disclosures of the committee produced a good deal of confusion, and since Congress is ready to give up on the job of producing new neutrality legislation, it might be a good idea to review once more the obvious, undisputed facts about the way we got into that last war.

It is foolish to try to hunt for a scapegoat. People who expected the Nye committee to dig up some individual villain who would grin wickedly from the witness chair and say, "Yes, I did it," have been disappointed. The committee's work will be worth all it cost if it at last convinces us that we went to war through force of circumstances, not through the conniving of any man or group of men.

### France Honoring First Balloonist

PARIS .- To commemorate the 150th anniversary of the death of Pilatre de Rozier, first man in the world, with the Marquis d'Arlandes, to attempt a balloon flight, the French government has ordered the issue of a stamp bearing the portrait of this pioneer.

November, 1783, a few nonths after the first Mongolfier balloon had risen from the public place of Annonay, Rozier and the Marquis d'Arlandes left the park of the Chateau of the Muette in a balloon. Twenty minutes later, they landed in the outskirts of Paris, at the Butte-aux-Cailles.

In June, 1784, Pilatre de Rozier renewed his attempt with Proust, the chemist, and in three-quarters of an hour they traveled from Versailles to Chantilly, about 40

Channel Flight Fatal

Encouraged by the success his first attempts, Rozier decided 1785, he had built an apparatu omposed of two superimposed bal loons, one of which contained hy drogen and the other hot air.





### Clothing Students Planning Projects

The clothing students at Ranger High School are choosing their me projects now. All of the girls can sew in class but they find it a different problem when they have to think for themselves. The purpose of the home project is to teach the student to apply what is learned at school at home.

These projects take 30 hours or more time outside of class time. During the time these projects are underway the home economics teacher makes visits to the home to become acquainter with the mo ther or guardian of the pupil and assistance or suggestions of the home project if necessary

while visiting in the home.

Most of the first year projects are construction problems and consist of school dresses, lounging and sleeping pajamas, aprons and luncheon cloths. Some students have chosen manners, personality and personal grooming. Each pu-pil is allowed freedom in her selection of a project and is graded according to suitability and judgment in her selection.

The second and third year problems are more advanced problems dressmaking and personal
