## Industry class set Tuesday

today at 5:30 p.m. in the first round of the American Division Region I Tournament at Friona High School gym. Tonight's loser will play Friday at 10 a.m. and the winner will play Friday at 7:45. Saturday's schedule calls for the third place game at 3 p.m. and the championship bout at 7 p.m. Other teams in the double-elimination tourney are Friona, Bovina, Farwell and Springlake.

## First hearing on constitution to be Wednesday

If you want to be present at the creation of a new chapter in Texas' history, be at the Quality Inn in Amarillo Wednesday at 9 a.m.

**THAT'S WHEN** the new Texas Constitutional Revision Commission will hold its first public hearing to get the grassroots views of Texans before starting the drafting process on a proposed new state constitution.

It will be the first of 16 such hearings throughout the state, and the only one in the Panhandle.

"We need participation from as many people as possible in the Panhandle to give us their views on what the proposed new constitution should contain," said Wales Madden Jr., Amarillo attorney who is the Panhandle's only member of the 37-person commission.

"THE PEOPLE have both the initial responsibility of affording suggestions to the commission through the public hearings and the final say-so when they accept or reject the proposals next year," Madden said. "For the Panhandle area to get the first crack is a rare and wonderful opportunity."

Madden suggested that individual presentations to the commission be made in written form, "but this is not a requirement," he said.

The 37-member commission is charged with studying the need for constitutional change and reporting its recommendations to the Texas Legislature by Nov. 1. Next January the legislature will convene as a Constitutional Convention to prepare the final document to submit to voters later in 1974.

## Three are hurt in city wrecks

Two Hereford people were injured in a collision with a parked city maintenance vehicle Friday evening shortly before 9 on West Bedford Street.

**LAWRENCE AND Exie Hart** were seriously injured in the accident. No city workmen were badly injured, however.

Officers said the city maintenance crew had been called to check a sewer manhole in the 400 block of West Bedford. The crew reportedly parked two pickups in the street to make sewer repairs.

Hart apparently didn't see the vehicles in time to avoid the collision. Both pickups and the car were heavily damaged.

The Harts were taken to Plains Memorial Hospital for emergency treatment before being transferred to Lubbock's Methodist Hospital. Mrs. Hart suffered multiple facial lacerations and was listed in serious condition in Methodist Hospital early this week.

**TWO OTHER accidents** kept city officers busy over the April 13th weekend.

Bobby Dean Bossett of Dimmitt received serious foot injuries and lost a toe in a motorcycle accident Friday afternoon at the US 385 and Stinson Street intersection.

Bossett was a passenger on a 1972 Honda driven by Van Carroll Hopson. The cycle was struck by a 1972 Monte Carlo driven by Sherry Ann Barton, Police Chief W. W. Jones reported.

**JONES SAID** Miss Barton was attempting to turn left on US 385, but her view was obstruct-

ed by two other cars waiting to turn.

Miss Barton was cited for improper start from a parked position, Jones said.

**BRAD SANDERS**, Dimmitt teenager, was cited for striking a parked vehicle following a two-vehicle accident Sunday night on West Halsell Street.

Jones said Sanders was east-bound on Halsell in a 1962 Comet when he swerved to the right, striking a legally parked 1967 International pickup. The pickup was owned by J. W. Stone of Dimmitt.

## Kids to hunt eggs Saturday

Dimmitt's Jaycees will stage their annual Easter Egg Hunt Saturday afternoon in the city park.

**THE HUNT will start promptly** at 2 p.m., and is open to all county boys and girls under 12 years of age.

## NHS announces top honor grads

Five-tenths of a grade point marks the difference between the four-year averages of the valedictorian and the salutatorian of the Nazareth High School graduating class.

**LEADING THE class** scholastically is Vickie Wilhelm, daughter of the James Wilhelm of Route 2, with an overall grade-point average of 8.8. Rebecca "Becky" Huseman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Huseman of Route D, is salutatorian, with a grade-point average of 8.3.

In the Nazareth system, a grade-point of 8.0 is the equivalent of an A-minus.

**BOTH OF THE top honor** students have been active in FHA, band, and other extra-curricular programs throughout high school. Both have attended Nazareth schools since the first grade.

Miss Wilhelm has followed a college preparatory curriculum and will enroll in West Texas State University in June. She is president of the Student Council this year and formerly served as secretary. An eight-year Swift Band member, she plays tympani and holds first chair in the saxophone section. She has been drum major for three years. As a hobby, she plays the guitar.

She has been a member of FHA for four years and has

served the organization as president one year and as vice-president two years. She received the state degree in FHA in 1972. Also in 1972, she represented the school at Girls' State.

**ACTIVE IN SPORTS**, Miss Wilhelm has participated in both basketball, playing forward, and tennis. As a freshman, she won district in freshman girls' doubles.

She is active in community youth events and has been a CYO member for four years.

**MISS HUSEMAN** has followed a college preparatory course of study with emphasis in science and business. She plans to enroll at West Texas State University for the fall semester.

Her senior year has been a busy one. In addition to a full schedule of classes, she assists in the school library, is on the committee that prepares menus for the school lunchroom, and is an assistant to the first grade teacher for one period a day.

A first-chair clarinetist, she has been a member of the Swift Band for four years. She has been a member of FHA for four years and has served two years as treasurer and one year as parliamentarian. When a junior she received the State Degree of Achievement in Homemaking.

**SHE HAS served** on the yearbook staff for one year and has been a regular contestant in the University Interscholastic League and a consistent winner in the spelling division. She is active in community youth events and recently received the CYO God, Home and Country Award.

For two years she was manager and official statistician for basketball teams. Her hobbies are reading, sewing, listening to music, making posters and swimming.

## HHS runners Austin-bound

Bobby Finch won the 440-yard dash and Jimmy Brown earned first place in the 220-yard dash to pace Hart High School to a fourth-place finish in the Region I-A track meet Saturday at Lubbock.

**BOTH RUNNERS** will advance to the state track meet in Austin.

Finch sprinted the quarter mile in 49.5 seconds to leave all other district champions in the region behind him in the event.

Brown raced home in 22.0 seconds in the 220-yard dash for the second regional blue ribbon of his track career. He barely missed a state berth in the 100-yard dash, placing third with a 10.8-second clocking. Brown was the defending regional champion in the 100.

**FINCH AND Brown** teamed with Juan Valadez and James McLain to take fourth place in the 440-yard relay. The sprint relay quartet raced the quarter mile in a fine time of 44.7 seconds, but was topped by Rankin, Springlake-Earth and Paducah. Less than a second separated the top five teams in the exciting event, with Rankin winning in 13.4 seconds.

Rankin won the regional track championship with 53 points, followed by Sunray with 44, Paducah with 36, Hart with 34, and Springlake-Earth. Baird and Knox City with 26 each.

Over 30,000 people are expected to view the band competition and carnival during the weekend.

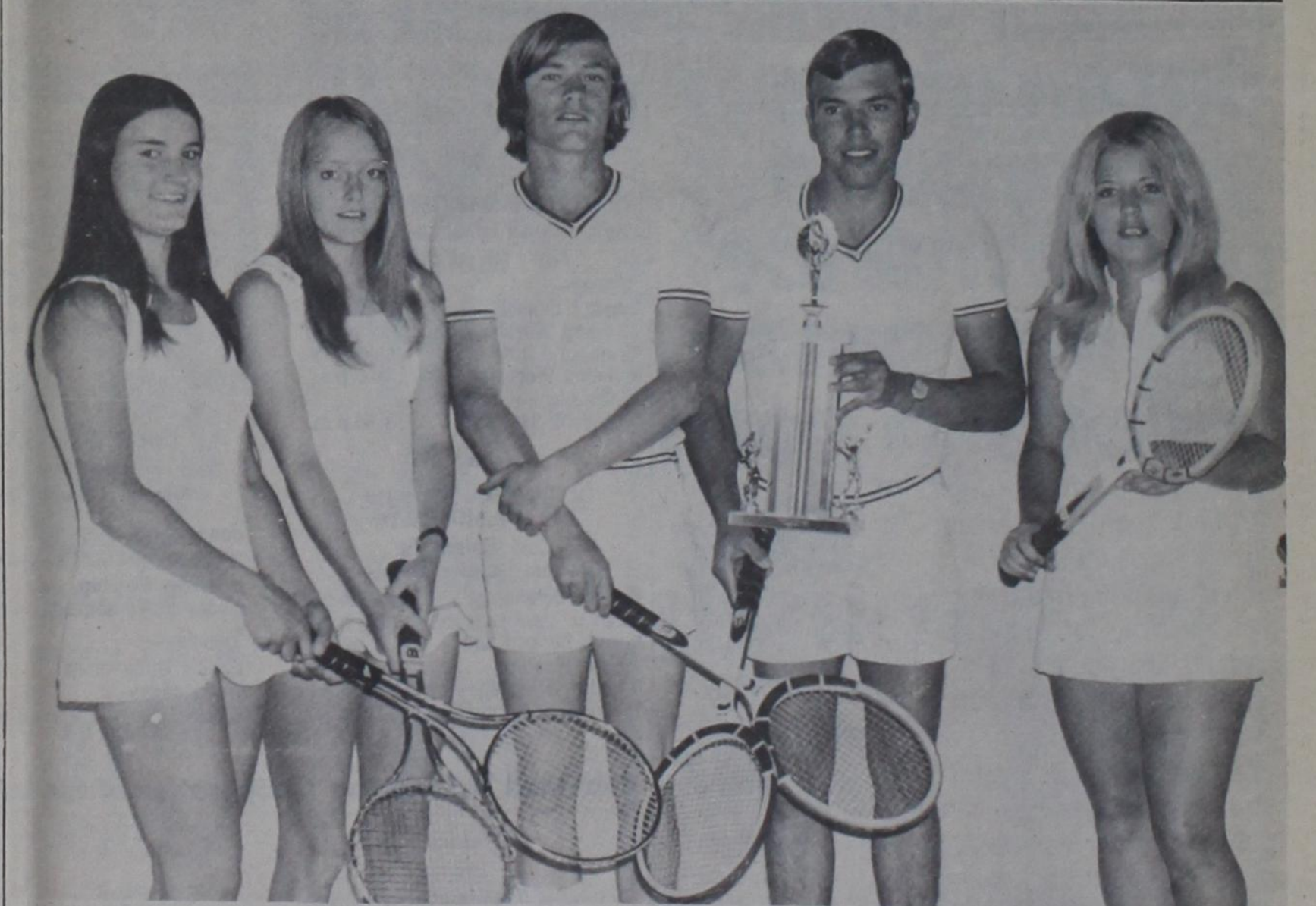
## Clubs will honor teachers tonight

## 'Beef vs. politics' to highlight meeting

The first annual Texas Beef Conference set for April 26-27 in Amarillo will feature the optimum mix in the cattle industry — politics and beef, according to Cal Parrott of Amarillo, area livestock specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

THE POLITICAL side of the program will feature such speakers as Congressman Tom Foley, chairman of the Livestock and Grain Sub-Committee of the US House of Representatives, and Virginia Knauer, President Nixon's special assistant for consumer affairs.

On the beef side will be Tom Herrick, president of the Texas Cattle Feeders' Association,

and Bill Donnell, president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association.

Up for debate between the two sides will be the issue of politics and beef and consumer concern about beef.

SPICING THE round of presentations will be a discussion of cattle death losses on the High Plains by Dr. John E. Hutchison, Extension Service director, and more technical subjects ranging from new diseases in cattle to hormones and substitutes.

The meeting gets underway Thursday evening with a steak dinner at the Amarillo Civic Center. Representative Foley will be keynote speaker. His

subject will be "Politics and Beef." Herrick and Donnell will respond.

Registration begins the next morning at 8 o'clock with Hutchison addressing the group at 9.

Dr. Glen Loggreen of the University of California and president of the American Society of Animal Science, will speak on handling light calves on arrival. Research in new diseases in cattle is the next topic by Dr. John Coleman of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

THE CONSUMER'S concern about beef is to be expressed by Virginia Knauer. Responding to her presentation will be Herrick and Donnell.

The afternoon session takes a different turn, with five speakers presenting more technical information on the subjects of energy-fiber-protein relationships in feedlot rations, antibiotics and substitutes, and hormones and substitutes. In respective order they are Dr. R. Hollis Klett of Texas Tech University Center at Amarillo, Dr. Willard J. Visek of Cornell University, and Dr. H. H. Cole of the University of California.

Responding to these presentations will be Dr. Charles E. Deyhle of the Academy of Veterinary Consultants and Ross Cooley of the Plains Nutrition Council, Inc.

Rex McAnelly, president of the Southwestern T-Bone Club, will preside during the evening dinner session. Presiding for the three sessions the next day are Dr. Charles Smallwood, dean of Agricultural Sciences at West Texas State University; Dr. Anson R. Bertrand, dean of the College of Agricultural Sciences at Texas Tech University; and Dr. Jarvis Miller, Experiment Station director.

SPONSORS OF the event include the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station of Texas A&M University, the Texas Cattle Feeders' Association, Texas Tech University, and West Texas State University.

## Feed grain set-aside reduced; wheat-barley deadline is May 1

By CHARLEY E. HILL, County Executive Director

The set-aside requirement for those producers enrolled under the 25 percent set-aside plan has been reduced to 10 percent of the feed grain base. Those producers who elected to participate under the zero set-aside plan (Option B) may not change their intentions.

The set-aside acreage reduction is automatic. The sign-up period will not be reopened.

Program payments are unchanged regardless of whether you choose the 25 percent or zero set-aside.

There is no change in the grazing and haying provisions.

If you have already had your set-aside acreage measured and/or inspected, we will come back and do it over for you if requested.

### Drivers reminded of school-bus law

A reminder on the state law about motorists stopping for school buses was issued this week by Col. Wilsor E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

SPEIR SAID the law, which applies on city streets as well as rural highways, requires motorists moving in either direction on the same roadway or street with a school bus to stop and remain stopped as long as the flashing top red lights on the bus are in operation.

There are only two exceptions to the law on stopping for loading or unloading a school bus: Those vehicles on another roadway of a divided highway (divided by median or physical barrier) are not required to stop, and stops are not required if the bus has stopped in a loading zone of a controlled access highway where pedestrians are not permitted to cross.

TEXAS sheep and lambs on feed as of March 1 totaled 237,000 head, which is down nine percent from a year ago and 50 percent below Jan. 1. Sheep and lambs on feed are those intended for slaughter being fed a ration of grain or other concentrates or on succulent pastures and expected within the next three months to produce a carcass which will grade good or better.

## WTSU to host driver course for teachers

A driver education and traffic safety study program for state approved supervising teachers will be held at West Texas State University beginning June 4.

THE PROGRAM sponsored by the Texas Education Agency and WTSU, with support from the Texas Traffic Safety Fund, will consist of six-hour classes, Monday through Friday, ending June 29.

According to information supplied by university officials, the purpose of the study program is to prepare supervising teachers to supervise teaching assistants to teach driver education using advanced techniques.

Teachers presently certified as driver education teachers who are in good standing may be recommended as candidates.

Recommendations may be made by the executive directors of service centers, superintendents of accredited school districts, or by supervisory driver-training instructors of commercial driver-training schools licensed by the Department of Public Safety.

Fifteen stipends of \$75 each will be awarded to candidates qualifying by the above standards, officials said.

Lonnie Nichols, instructor of physical education at WTSU is director of the upcoming program. G. L. Peavy of the Texas Education Agency, will serve as associate director. Consultant for the program will be Gene Wilkins, also of the Texas Education Agency.

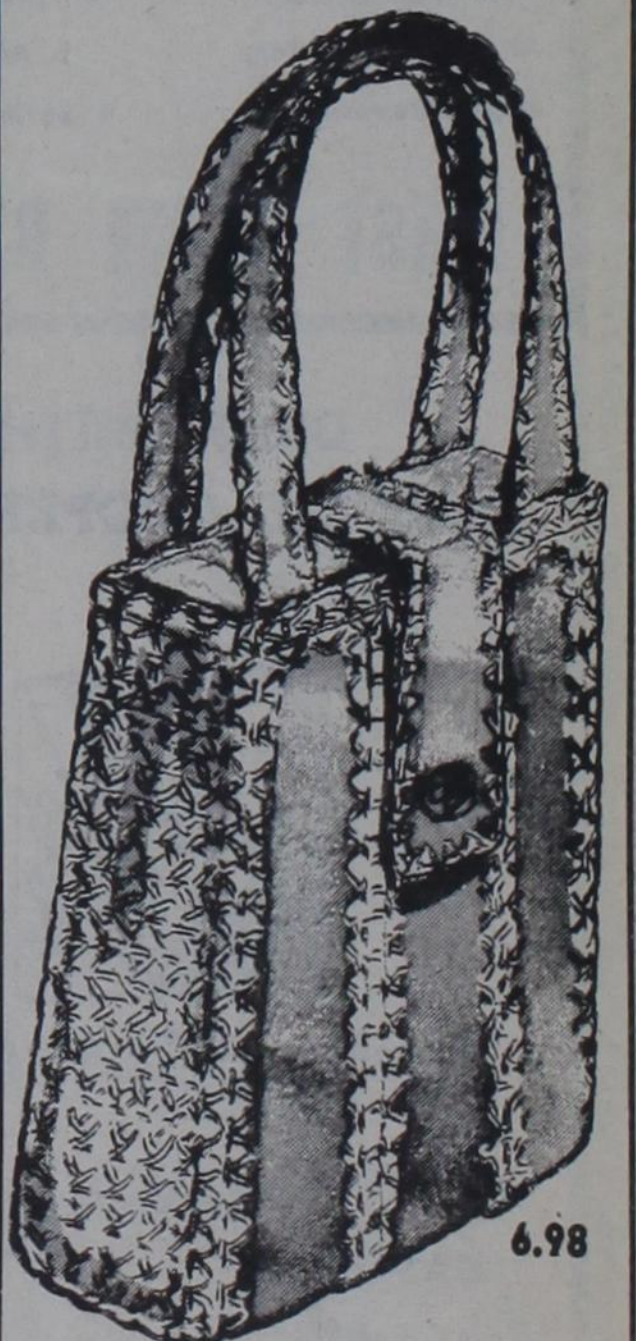


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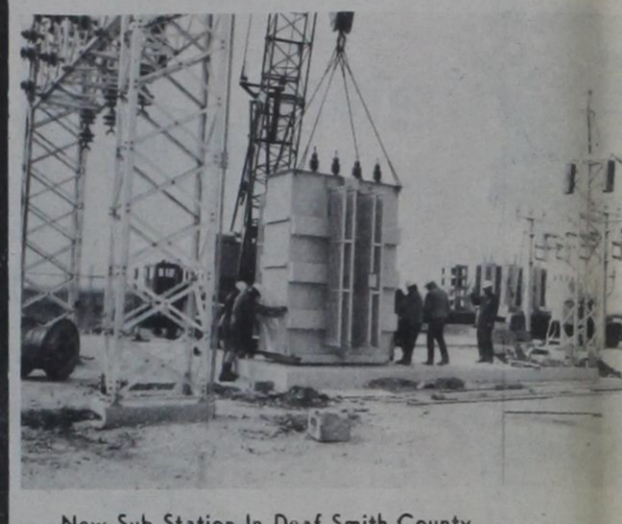


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## DEAF SMITH REC IS AREA BOOSTER

Deaf Smith Rural Electric Cooperative is your partner in growth, agriculture and service.

The cooperative began supplying electric power to Deaf Smith, Castro, Parmer and Oldham Counties in 1937.

Last year its membership voted to delete County from the original name, Deaf Smith County Rural Electric Cooperative, to better reflect its growth in the four-county area.

From its original six employees, the co-op has grown to 42 employees and returns nearly half a million dollars to the local economy yearly. It serves 64,036 meters and has 26,058 miles of lines in the area.

The co-op's largest user of electricity is the area's feedlot industry. Thirty-four feedlots in the area now use REC power, and an addition is anticipated when a new feedlot is completed south of Dimmitt. Red meat from these feedlots supplies 10 million people across the nation.

The plant value of the farmer-owned cooperative is in excess of \$10 million, and 12 sub-stations are scattered across the area. In 1972, a new sub-station was put into service in northwest Deaf Smith County. On completion its cost will be near half a million dollars and will have the potential to serve a community of 5,000. Service from the new station is underground, reflecting a trend to underground service lines for electricity supply.

Richard Montgomery, industrial relations manager, said "Electricity is used to produce and process sugar beets, vegetables, milo and corn. Electricity furnishes the power for irrigation to make farming possible to supply our agriculture-related industries."

REC sponsors several continuing programs for its customers and their families. Each year it selects two students to tour Washington, D.C. through its government in action program.

"We are now trying to establish a program with area colleges and universities to count our summer food fun program as field work for credit for our instructors," Montgomery said.

The co-op also works closely with 4-H and FFA groups and is active on several committees who work with these programs.

The co-op has a new plan for work with consumers. "We changed our organization to a degree in an effort to expand and grow with the area. We now have one person working directly with the consumer to build better programs—in developing total electric homes and better knowledge of appliances, though we don't sell or service appliances.

"I now deal directly with industries," Montgomery continued. "What used to be a member service job responsibility has changed into an area development responsibility for two people."

When remodeling the main offices in Hereford last year, the Medallion Room was added for community and club meetings and programs.

The annual stockholders meeting is set for April 26 in Hereford's Bull Barn. Full details of the meeting will be announced later.

Beat cream cheese with salad dressing, lemon juice and salt until smooth. Stir in pineapple, walnuts, and bananas. Whip cream whip and fold into mixture. Fold in cranberry chunks. Turn into a 9 x 5 x 3" teflon loaf pan and

freeze. To unmold place pan in warm water and remove salad. Place salad in refrigerator 30 minutes before serving. Serves 8.

- 6 pork rib chops, cut 1 inch thick
- 2 tablespoons cooking oil
- 1 can (17 oz.) apricot halves
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1/2 cup catsup
- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
- 2 tablespoons chopped onion

Cut pocket in each chop, cutting from fat side almost to bone edge. Drain apricots, reserving 1/2 cup syrup. Put two apricot halves in pocket of each chop. Cut up remaining apricots. Cindy Schacher won two firsts, two seconds and a fourth to pace Nazareth Junior High in the district girls' track meet.

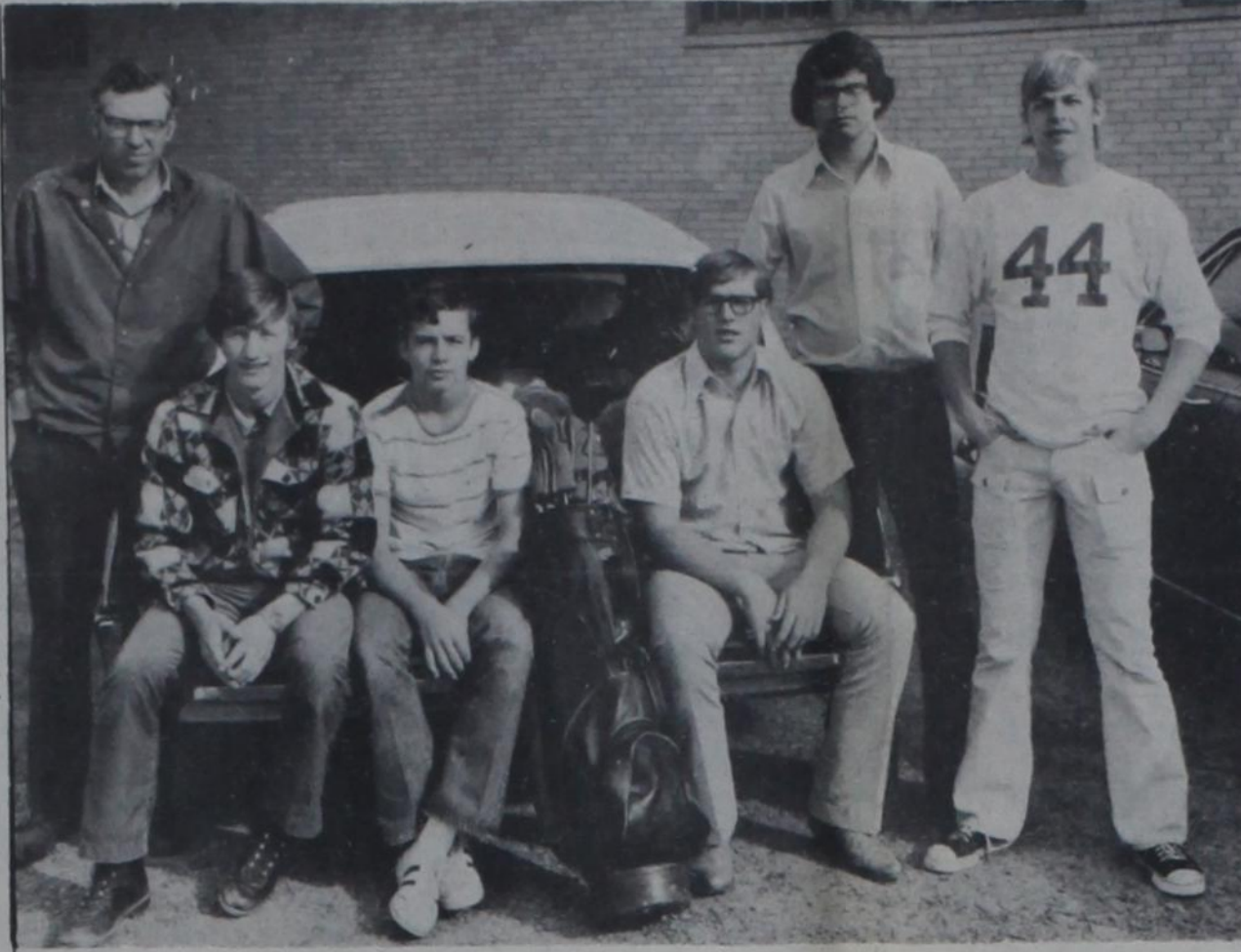

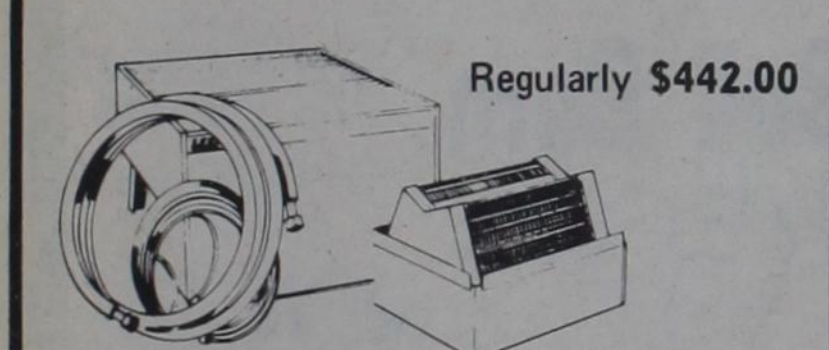
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## Notaries are up for term renewal

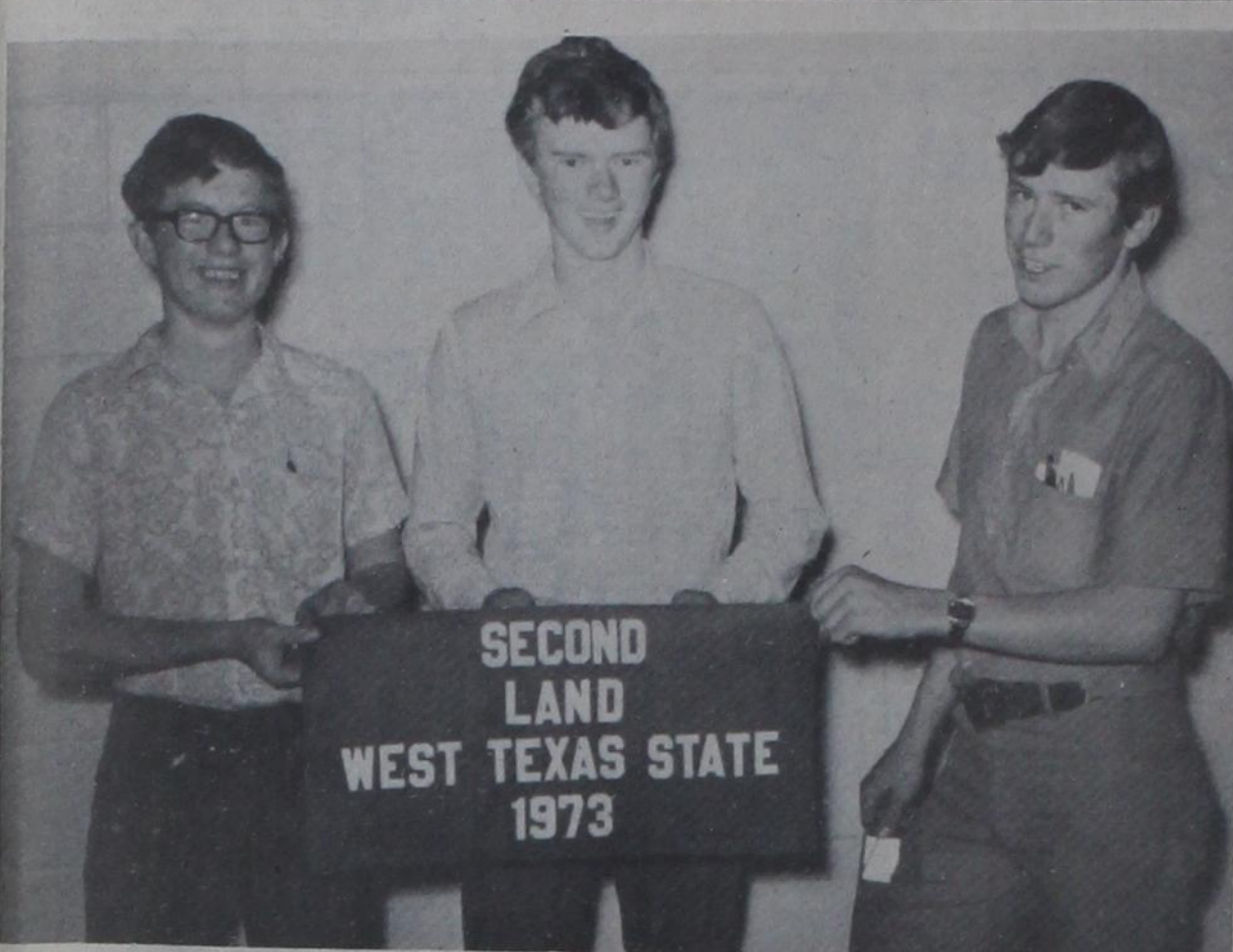

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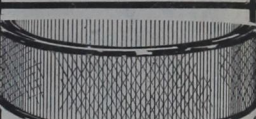
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
