#### Neutrality Is Costly; Will U. S. Pay Price?

When Congress takes off its gloves and gets down to work on the new neutrality law, it ought to be possible to find out whether the American people are really in earnest when they say they want to keep out of the next war, no matter how much it costs them.

The argument over the kind of embargo law we shall have-whether it shall apply automatically to all warring nations or may be applied to one side only, at discretion of the president-is really secondary, important as that issue is. The crux of the matter depends on what we are going to embargo.

Munitions, of course. The old law cuts off the shipment of guns, shells, explosives, and fighting planes to warring nations; the new one unquestionably will do the same. Since very few of us own munitions company stocks or work for airplane manufacturers, it is easy for us to applaud.

But that hardly scratches the surface.

Suppose a new world war should break out in Europe tomorrow. Both sides immediately would turn to the United States for supplies. But what kind of supplies would they be after?

Munitions? Yes, if they could get them. But every great power in Europe has been devoting the last decade to putting its own muntions plants in order. England, Germany, France, Italy-all these countries can make their own guns, shells, and airplanes, if they have to.

What they can't possibly make for themselves is the bulk of the great raw materials without which a war cannot be fought-wheat, beef, oil, cotton, and the like. Those are the things they will be really anxious to buy from the outside; and those are precisely the things which America has to sell.

Shall we have the courage to put an embargo on them? It would be expensive; make no mistake about that. It would touch all of us in that sensitive pocketbook-nerve. A year's embargo on the shipment of such commodities would cost us stupendous sums.

But there is one thing that would cost a great deal more. That would be for us to get into the war ourselves. And just as oil, wheat, cotton, and beef helped to get us I into the last war, they could help to get us into the next

In 1917 Germany made a desperate attempt to starve G England into surrender by cutting off those supplies. As a result, we had to fight. The attempt to starve England to failed, but it failed by the narrowest of margins.

Have we any guarantee at all that a similar attempt would not be made in another war? And is there any chance that we could keep out of that war if the attempt H were made, with American ships, cargoes, and seamen being sent to the bottom by daily submarine attacks?

We have not yet thought through this neutrality problem. There is infinitely more to it than munitions. Unless we have the courage to see that the basic commodities are as explosive as gun cotton, any neutrality law we get will be sadly imperfect.

#### Number of Colds Cut In Half By Work of a Clinic

GREENSBORO, S. C., Jan. 19 Sickness from colds was cut in half and school absences due to colds were cut considerably more than half in what was said to be the greatest clinic of its kind ever held, directors of the clinic announced here today.

A total of 17,353 men, women and children participated as subjects in this "colds-clinic," which consisted of a series of tests of a plan for better control of colds. Although the clinic started during the winter of 1932, the final test was not completed until last March.

As an additional check on the results, the last two series of tests were supervised by practicing physicians. Records, kept under their direction, were tabulated and certified by a well-known firm of public accountants. And the results of these tests under independent medical supervision were better than ever.

Reports covering the entire clinc show that, in addition to reductions of 50.88 per cent in sickness and 57.86 per cent in school absences due to colds, followers of the plan escaped one out of every four colds, and the colds they did have were shorter by considerably more than one-fourth.




