'G-Men' Inefficient? Look at the Record!

Because a kidnaper killed little Charles Mattson after the G-men had taken charge of the case, the smoldering criticism of that much-publicized outfit is beginning to break out into actual flame.

The dumbest police force in America, we are told, could hardly have brought the case to a more tragic conclusionthe death of the kidnaped boy. Indeed, it is argued that the arrival of the G-men actually caused the killing, by filling the kidnaper with such fear that he hastened to dispose of the body of his captive without trying to collect the

And this, in turn, brings to a head other criticisms of the federal operatives. We are reminded that they recently arrested a crook in New Jersey with a maximum of gunfire and display; that local police generally hate the sight of them; and that this, that, or the other kidnaping case of the past was really badly bungled by the "headline-crazy hirelings" of Uncle Sam.

It would be foolish to try to soft-pedal this sort of talk. It might as well be brought out into the open and examined for what it is worth.

Now the only fair way to come to a verdict on the Gmen is to look at the record-not just the record of this last case, but the record that goes back over a term of years and takes in their work as a whole.

If we do, what do we find?

We find, first and foremost, that the "big league" crooks of a former day have vanished from the scene. The Capones, Dillingers, Floyds, Nelsons, and that crew-one and all, they are behind the bars or under the sod.

And if the G-men have been getting a lot of headlines, we ought not to forget that a few years ago it was the underworld rat who was getting them. The G-men didn't take the spotlight away from the police; they took it away from the criminal, and an everlastingly good job of work

That they have aroused jealously and enmity in certain quarters is not surprising. That this jealousy and enmity should come out into the open as a result of the Mattson tragedy is only natural.

But we as a people would be exceedingly foolish, if we let ourselves be persuaded, as a result, to put a crimp in the activities of Mr. Hoover and his men. We owe them altogether too much for that.

TEORGE HARVEY definitely has established six-day George racing as a nation-wide sport.

Harvey first weaned the riders away from John M. Chapman, who for years ruled pumpers of the iron steed. And now, after much pioneering in a nine-year struggle, Harvey has a bankroll.

The men behind the little bespectacled man, who as a rider in The men behind the little bespectacled man, who as a rider in 1928 launched an outlaw movement to break away from the tyrannical reign of Chapman, are Joseph A. Tobin and Charles F. Wolfe. They are Fittsburgh promoters who have been highly successful in operating dog tracks in Pennsylvania, Ohio, Florida, and California. It costs from \$12,000 to \$30,000 to conduct a six-day bike race, according to the class of the field and the size of the building, but his alignment with Tobin and Wolfe puts Harvey in position to go full blast in Milwaukee, Jan. 22-28; Miami, Feb. 12-18; Detroit in late February; Memphia, March 20-26; Louisville, March 31-April 5; Pittsburgh, April 9-15; Montreal, April 28-May 4; and Toronto in May.

DOWN through the years, six-day bike racing has been big business only in New York and Chicago. It reached its peak along about 1928, when one grossed \$250,000 at Madison Square Garden.

Harvey's superior showmanship and the promotional ability of Tobin and Wolfe promise to make the rides to nowhere important money getters in the hinterlands.

But Harvey, Tobia, and Wolfe will not be content to remain out of New York and Chicago, still controlled by Chapman, whose financial arrangement with the Sarden makes him little more than its agent. Their plan of attack is to control the stars of the game and with them force their way into the Garden and Chicago on an

In his Cleveland production, Harvey again demonstrated that the customers will respond to cleverer direction of jams and sprints and all other things that tend to keep the addicts from falling to sleep. Harvey says that Chapman still runs his races as they were

Six-day racing has been conducted outside of New York and Chicago before, but by fly-by-night promoters in most instances. The best they did was to leave unfavorable aftermaths.

THE new lineup perhaps is the most important move in six-day racing since its inception in its present form at the old Madison square Garden in 1899. Little has been heard of Tobin and Wolfe nationally to date, but

hey are likely to stir up a lot of excitement in major sports promo-ion from now on. They have ideas and ambitions and, what is more nportant, they are far from being anemic in the way of ready cash. They have been partners since they opened a billiard room in ittsburgh in 1928, and got their first real chunk of coin out of the Kensington Kennel Club, which was situated 21 miles outside of e Smoky City.

Harvey, Tobin, and Wolfe will introduce something novel in their wasion of Miami. It will be a six-day race under a circus tent. They are considering doing the same thing in Hollywood on the neory, no doubt, that motion picture people will grasp any excuse
