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Roosevelt's Followers Met Test Nobly, Too

There has been many a review of the last four years in the papers of late. No one could read of the second Roosevelt inaugural without looking back at the first one and thinking of all the things that have happened between the two.

The general consensus is that Mr. Roosevelt has done a first-rate job and that we are all deeply indebted to him.

That is probably very true. But it occurs to us that the man who deserves the biggest bouquet of all these days is nobody but John Citizen himself, the ordinary man of these United States.

Mr. Roosevelt gave us leadership, of course, and it was like the shadow of a mighty rock in a weary land. But a leader has to have followers, and in democracy the followers have to be wide-awake, level-headed people who know what the score is.

Without them, the leader quickly finds himself heading a one-man parade to nowhere.

And the way the plain people of the country responded to leadership at a time when such response was needed is something for the record books.

All of which is just another way of saying that neither Mr. Roosevelt nor any other president can do it all. In the long run, the way we solve the tremendous problems of the twentieth century will depend on the good sense and the good will of the average man.

Let's go back to March 4, 1933. Mr. Roosevelt took charge of a nation that was out on its feet. It had been gypped and misled and taken up dark alleys; many of its factories and all its banks were closed, and its leading citizens were afraid to walk past cemeteries late at night.

There was one, of those ever was one, was country ripe for change. The false gods were on the scene, too, begging to be chased—the Huey Longs, the Father Coughlins, the Doc Townsends, and the Keraid K. Smiths, flanked by the death's head hussars of the Liberty League.

But the country somehow kept its head. It listened to all these people, trailed along for a while, and then let them go their way alone. And in the end the tremendous vote rolled up for Mr. Roosevelt last year was simply the country's vote of confidence in—itsself.

And if we have recovered our confidence, dispelled the shadows, and climbed out of the valley of the depression, don't forget that it was pretty largely the doing of the ordinary American.

He has shown that he is the sort of person who can breed good leaders, recognize them when they show up—and follow them without losing his head.

Sport Glances. . . . .By Grayson

NEW YORK—If Don Lash learns to distribute his effort uniformly, he may this winter lower Paavo Nurmi's indoor two-mile record of 8:58.2 and 3000-meter board track mark of 8:26.4.

Lash established the outdoor two-mile figure at 8:58.3 last summer on the lightning-like Princeton path. Fighting a wind which blew rain in his face, the Indiana University boy came within one-tenth of a second of Nurmi's mark, the fastest ever made indoors or out.

Lash recorded his first indoor victory in three years the other night by anking 3000 meters, 240 yards less than two miles, in 8:32.4 to beat Joe McCluskey by half a lap in the Brooklyn K. of C. meet.

Critics agree that Lash goes out too fast in the early stages. "Maybe they are right, but a runner knows himself better than an outsider can and I've found by experience that I make my best time when I crowd my best running into the first half," says Lash.

LASH had begun to suspect that he never would beat anybody indoors when he hooped it home first in the 3000-meter event at the 106th Infantry Armory in Flatbush. "I need solid footing," asserts the Hoosier flyer. "Most indoor tracks—the Millrose strip in particular—are too springy for me. Those jouncing boards tire my calf muscles and I tie up after a mile or so. The flat armory floor suited me better than the more resilient Garden track. The surface felt firmer under foot. It was more like the solid cinder or dirt tracks to which I'm accustomed."

Unlike Glenn Cunningham and Gene Venke, Lash is chiefly an outdoor legman. Although he weighs only 145 pounds, he is tightly knitted and pretty rugged. Wind resistance has to be very strong to bother him.

Lash had Nurmi's 3000-meter record in mind when he started in Brooklyn. He felt that he could come close to it if his legs could stand the board track pounding.

Nurmi wore spikes when he made his record. The field in which Lash competed had to use sneakers.

LASH did 2:10.8 for the first 800 meters—almost five seconds under Nurmi's record time at that stage. He hit the 1500-meter mark in 4:06.2, only three seconds behind Mel Sheppard's Olympic figure in London in 1908.

"Up to that point I was running easily and had Nurmi's schedule beaten, but the fast pace told on me," explains the Indiana star. "My legs began to tie up. It took me 21 seconds to run the next 100 meters. I had lost my drive and was laboring a bit."

"I finally got striding again and finished strong, but my second half time of 4:32.2, contrasted with my first 1500 meters in 4:06.2, shows how I slacked off. Nurmi ran his two halves much more evenly. He would have nailed me at 2000 meters or so."

Experts contend that a runner of Lash's ability can save yards and seconds on an 11-lap banked turn indoor track where there is no wind resistance. They declare that the turns are an asset rather than a handicap to a skilled board track runner.

It would seem that Lash, the finest American distance product in history, has only to gait himself to wipe out the last two of all Nurmi's indoor records.

SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

FRUIT cake is one good thought, but cake with fruit on it, baked together, is a second good thought. It's some times a lot better than the first.

Prune and Apricot Cake (6 to 8 servings)

One and one-fourth cups sifted cake flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 3-4 cups granulated sugar, 4 tablespoons softened butter, 1 egg, well beaten, 1-2 cup milk, 1 teaspoon vanilla, for the fruit part—4 tablespoons butter, 1-2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed, 13 cooked apricots, 6 prunes, cooked, halved and pitted.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, salt and sugar and sift together three times. Add butter. Combine egg, milk and vanilla. Add to flour mixture, stirring until flour is completely dampened. Beat vigorously for one minute. Melt 4 tablespoons butter in pan 8 by 8 by 2 inches. Use low flame. Add brown sugar and stir and cook until thoroughly mixed with the butter. Into this caramel mixture place the prune halves and apricots, cut side up, neatly in order, a prune half alternating with an apricot. Over this pour the cake batter. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for about 50 minutes, until done. Loosen cake from sides of pan. Serve upside down, with fruit peering into the hungry eyes of your family. A dash or two of whipped cream on top of each serving won't hurt anybody's feelings.

BREAKFAST: Apple juice, whole wheat muffins, bacon, plum jam, coffee, milk. LUNCHEON: Spinach and cheese souffle, buttered toast, ginger pears, tea, milk. DINNER: Roast olive cage, sauted veal chops with mushroom sauce, baked potatoes, buttered Brussels sprouts, escarole salad, apricot custard cake, coffee, milk.

Apricot Custard Cake

(6 to 8 servings) Cake batter: 2 cups flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 3-4 cup milk, 1 egg yolk, 3-4 cup sugar, 1 1/4 tablespoon butter. For fruit custard: 1 can apricots (No. 2), using all apricots and 3-4 cup syrup, 4 egg yolks, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup sour cream. Cream butter, add sugar, then cream until fluffy. Beat egg yolk well, and stir into butter mixture. Sift flour and baking powder together, adding alternately with milk. Beat. Pour into greased ring mold with spring sides, lined with buttered wax paper. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) about 40 minutes, until done. Beat egg yolks until lemon colored and fluffy. Add sugar and sour cream. Then beat until mixture becomes fluffy like whipped cream. Stir in the apricot juice, then add the apricots. Pour this over the baked cake. Return to oven and bake until top of custard mixture browns lightly. Remove from oven, cool, and remove sides of spring mold. Serve with whipped cream. That's a dessert!

**W. Carter Has Interesting Career**

Number one among U. S. News-magazines is Philco's Boake Carter. In Russia, son of a British agent to Bakur, educated at Cambridge, member of the Royal Flying Corps during the war, oil dealer, world traveller, and newspaper man in many countries, his writing on the heights of America's life has been almost without precedent in the annals of radio.

Carter's big chance in broadcasting came when he was assigned to cover the Lindbergh kidnapping. Fifteen thousand letters of congratulation and a new star was born. In 1932, after listening to a broadcast over a local station for some time, Philco sponsored him over and he has remained with the company ever since. His fearless comments and intelligent reporting made his program one of the outstanding commercial successes in broadcasting.

Carter writes his own scripts, and about eleven hours a day, he estimates that he has dictated out four million words since he started over the air. Since sponsors give him a free rein never see his scripts, he has no worries and can say what he likes. He has been called a Communist, New Dealer, Reactionist, Fascist and whatnot, but he smiles merrily on his way, fearlessly expressing his views.

Carter lives in typically American style on a farm in suburban Philadelphia and is a naturalized citizen. He is married and has two young children. Although his work keeps him pretty busy, he finds time to indulge in his hobbies of painting, gardening and yachting.

**Canned Fruit Is Gaining Popularity Yearly In London**

LONDON—The English market for canned fruit apparently is unlimited, according to a report issued by the Imperial Economic Committee.

The report shows that the aggregate imports of canned and bottled fruits preserved in sugar, and fruit pulp preserved without sugar, into the United Kingdom in 1935 reached a record total of more than 254,000 tons, valued at \$26,000,000.

"It seems probable that the extent to which this market will expand has yet to be discovered," the report states.

Total imports for 1935 were 21,000 tons higher than those of 1934. Empire supplies have been gaining a larger share of the market, but in 1935 this share dropped a few points in percentage. Imports from Canada reached a new high level, but supplies from Australia and Malaya were slightly smaller. Peaches and pineapples were equal first, with 24 per cent of the total each, while pears came next on the list.

Imports of dried fruits in 1935 amounted to about 160,000 tons, or 6 per cent more than in 1934, with a declared value of \$28,000,000. Shipments of currants from Australia were the heaviest since 1930, and represented 23 per cent of the total imports of 57,000 tons.

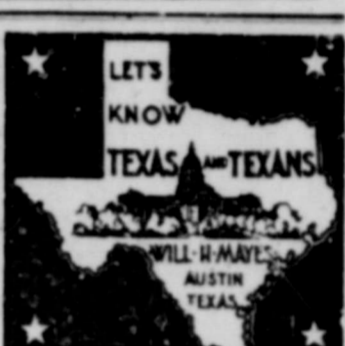

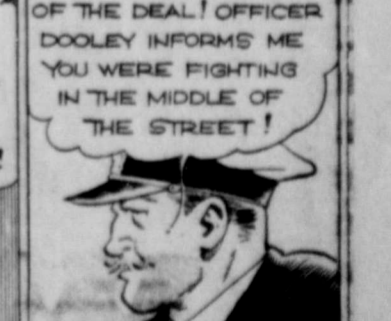
