## Liberty League Ending Its Blundering Career

A melancholy little anniversary passed by quite unnoticed the other day. January 25 came and went, and hardly anyone remembered that just a year before Alfred E. Smith of New York had stood up at a Liberty League banquet and announced that he was going to take a long and lonely walk, come the presidential election.

It is not so much Mr. Smith who was forgotten in this oversight as the Liberty League itself. For the league has tallen on dark days. Its publicity organization has been liquidated, its offices contain only a handful of employes, and its \$30,000-a-year president, Jouett Shouse, has gone off the payroll.

And thus comes to an unhappy close one of the most bizarre chapters in all the history of American politics. For sheer, blundering ineptiness, it is doubtful if the record of the Liberty League will ever be surpassed.

The league came on the scene at a time when the nation was trying to think its way through a perplexing conflict between property rights and human rights. The league immediately managed to reduce the claims of property rights to a gross caricature.

By dressing up the richest men in the land in the shining armor of the defenders of liberty, it made it very hard for the man who really had something sensible to say about property's rights to get a hearing.

But that was only a starter.

America is essentially a conservative nation. At the dawn of 1936 the nation was seriously uneasy about the direction the New Deal was taking It wanted to see abuses corrected, but it was beginning to be pittery lest the baby be thrown out along with the bath water.

And just at that point the Liberty League elbowed its way up to the table. It stamped every form of conservatism with the stamp of blind reaction. It convinced a steadily-increasing section of the public that the opposition to Mr. Roosevelt was a selfish and stupid Tory opposition.

Nor did the league stop there. It managed to find another delicate situation to upset-that involving the supreme court.

. Among the problems of the New Deal was the question of the conflict between the legislative and judicial branches of the government. It was most decidedly a question requiring unbiased thought, careful study, and an appeal to the best intelligence that could be brought to bear.

But the league set up its own private supreme court of corporation lawyers and undertook to pontificate solemnly on pending legislation before the real supreme court could make itself heard. In this way it succeeded in per-'sunding great masses of people that the supreme court was little more than a bulwark for entrenched greed and sullen reaction



Rep. E. F. Harrel of Paris is ready to introduce in the Texas House of representatives a bill releasing all penalties and interests on tax suits provided that payment of the delinquent taxes is made by Nov. 15, 1937.

He believes the loss in penalties and interest would be far offset by lump payments of back taxes, and gives a number of arguments on the point. One is that the benefits of better times have not yet spread sufficiently to allow Texans about to lose their homes in tax suits to come to immediate terms. Another is that taxpayers deserve a "breathing spell" in which to wipe their tax slates clean.

"Many deserving home-owners are about to lose their property because of delinquent taxes piled up in depression years. The added penalties and interest make the burden well nigh unsupportable. "Now if the state will release the penalties and interest, these people can pay up their back taxes and save their property and the state will be better off for it," the Paris legislator said.

He set the mid-November date to allow farmers to move their crops to market before the payment deadline nears.
